Over the last month, I have had the pleasure of attending four district conventions. As always, this is a great time to catch up with Lions throughout the state, share in some recognition, and exchange ideas. Though there were a lot of great moments, a few really stood out to me.

The District 3-K convention provided a couple of these moments. International Director Brian Sheehan proved to be informative, enthusiastic, energetic, and entertaining. One point that he really emphasized was the fact that we are not the same organization we were 50 years ago, or 20 years ago. In fact, we are not the same organization we were even 10 years ago. He encouraged all of us to be "Agents of Change," a call to service that comes directly from our International President. Those in attendance were noticeably moved by Sheehan's presentation; the room was charged with excitement. The question before us, though, is whether we will fan the flames of this excitement and carry the torch for change or, instead, let the embers fade to black and continue to hope that our drop in membership will magically heal itself.

It is no secret that as Lions, we are part of the greatest service organization on the planet. At the District 3-L convention Past International Director David Fiandt summed it up beautifully with this statement: "'We Serve' is the simplest answer when people ask 'Who are you Lions and what do you do?'" As Oklahoma Lions, we do just that. **We Serve!** We serve in our local communities, at the state level with projects like the Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank and the Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch, as well as with Briggs Memorial scholarships and the Mobile Health Screening Unit, and at the international level. Where it seems we have the most ground to make up, though, is in being Agents of Change.

In another great presentation during the 3-K convention, it was recommended that when recruiting new members, do not take "no" for an answer. Stay on potential recruits and offer to personally pick them up and take them to meetings. While this is a fantastic idea, and shows a lot of enthusiasm, what if the meetings themselves are one of the reasons some of the younger folks are not joining? The general consensus these days seems to be that the younger generation has no interest in serving their community, or in giving of themselves for the betterment of others. Anybody who has ever witnessed the enthusiasm and sheer will on display when an organization of young adults attacks a service project can tell you that this is obviously not the case! So maybe the answer lies elsewhere. Maybe the traditional club model is not as enticing to some as it is to us. To be very clear, I love my club. I am very proud to be a member of the Stillwater Noon Lions, and enjoy getting together with great friends every week (when I am not speaking to another club in the state). I enjoy the fellowship and the camaraderie with other like-minded Lions (not to mention the eating - as most of you know, this is one of my favorite pasttimes). But, as a relatively young Lion, I have a lot of friends that do not feel the same way. There may be a variety of reasons for this. Some just do not feel they can take the time away from family or work to commit to attending regular meetings. Some just feel that meetings are a waste of time; anything accomplished at a meeting could be accomplished much more quickly and efficiently using email or social media. Whatever the case, this does not mean that they do not want to serve. It just means that they want to do it in a fashion that fits their lifestyle.

The bottom line is this: the membership of the Lions of Oklahoma has dropped nearly 60% over the past 25 years or so. Instead of decrying the lack of interest in the younger generation, why not be an Agent of Change

and offer them different ways to serve? In LCI's extension material, they point out that today's volunteer is focused on service, not administrative duties, titles, or protocol. Why not capitalize on this information, and try some outside-the-box thinking to bring in new members? This does not mean that you have to change your club. The Tulsa Downtown Lions Club (a Founder's Club) recently did something really simple: they added one evening meeting a month, and immediately picked up a number of new members who could not make it to their Tuesday noon meetings.

Ultimately, being an Agent of Change has nothing to do with age; it is a matter of being open to new ideas! Think about starting an online club. It only takes five new members to get it rolling. Most clubs could probably look at Lions that dropped over the last few years and find five members that enjoyed serving, but could not make it to meetings and dropped their membership. Think about starting a branch club in a community next to yours that does not currently have a club. Like any other branch club, this can be done with just five new members, which is a lot easier than finding 20 or 30 members and starting a club from scratch. Think about holding one meeting a month at a different time or day to open up your membership to potential Lions that cannot make it to your current meetings?

Being a Lion is an honor and a privilege! Let's make sure that everybody knows it! Let's get the next generation involved and excited and ensure that the long legacy of Lions in Oklahoma continues. Don't let the embers die! Let's fan the flames of excitement and join in the crusade as Agents of Change. This is an exciting time to be a Lion in Oklahoma; our future is wide open! Do not fear new ideas, but embrace change and encourage others to join us as **We Serve!**

Greetings:

You will recall in the beginning of this fiscal year, July 1, 2012, the one thing I stressed is that we can be assured of "change." This January, we Governors and others, were informed of another "change" that is to take place July 1, 2013. We each have been aware that our terms as Governors will cease; however, an additional "change" will happen as well. Our long standing "Lions State Secretary" Virginia Rodriguez, will step down form her position. We Oklahoma Lions will miss this lady since we have come to depend on her for giving us guidance, steering us in our duties and patting us on the back when we most need that pat.

We have already had highly qualified applicants for her position. Our 2013/2014 Lions Governors will have the task of breaking in this "change" of a new State Secretary. We wish them well!

PONCA NOON LIONS CLUB has reported that their Club in conjunction with OK Prevent Blindness tested 617 children, from age six months upward, with 62 being referred for further testing by an optometrist. The Lion Vision Support Group provided transportation along with support materials for eighteen people to attend their meeting. Their "Leo Club" once a month serves meals to the needy at their weekly Friendship Feast. The Club has started a membership drive and have one new member to date. The Club continues a program of the recycling of eyeglasses, collecting 372 pairs in November and December. Also, they collected 35 cell phones for Operation Pioneer Spirit. Their Spring Fund Raiser Concert has been set for March 23, 7:30 p.m., to be held at the Ponca Theater in Ponca City.

The NORTH ENID LIONS CLUB helped man the booth at the 17th Annual KNID AGRIFEST held January 11 & 12, providing blood glucose screening. The Lions help man the gates at the Chisholm Schools BB Wheat Capital Tournament. The Club collects items for the Battered Women at the YWCA Crisis Center, good clothing, make-up, etc. The women with their children usually arrive at the Center with only the clothes they are wearing. Lion Marshall Ward received the "Rookie of the Year" award and Lion Chuck Osgood Is the "Lion of the Year." Lion Mary Bailey received a Melvin Jones Fellowship for her efforts of always volunteering for the Clubs projects. There are seventeen "Melvin Jones" Fellows in the Club. The Club is attempting to raise \$3,000 for scholarships to be awarded in May 2013 to graduating seniors. House Happenings


