Select them to the board of directors of your club, and get them in line to be president of your club. Encourage them to complete leadership courses offered by Lions Clubs International online. Try targeted recruitment. All too often we are so hungry for new members that we will take any warm body that indicates a willingness to join. Think about targeting those people already possessing or demonstrating leadership abilities; the successful lawyer, doctor, business man, department manager, people who are already in a leadership role in their community. What is the worst that they can say? No.

Also, encourage club members to get involved in your district, as a zonechairperson, or serve on one of the many state committees as your district representative or one of the district committees. This can be challenging and rewarding at the same time. Behind every successful person you will find a mentor. The benefits of mentoring cannot be over-stated, and our organization has an excellent program .The New Lions Mentoring Program check it out on the LCI website. The benefits are well-informed Lions, many of who will go on to become Lions leaders, and their mentors have the satisfaction of being able to share their knowledge and know they helped ensure the future of our organization.

those that do, our new Independent living program is there to be a lifeline. At 18 or High School graduation it's not kick you out the door and wish you good luck! Here it is a continued relationship with mentors and a case manager who guides them through the process of housing, school, jobs and medical issues. Some maintain a relationship with the staff and we are glad for that. None of this would be possible without the leadership and guidance of our Board of Directors and our Executive Director Brvan Larison. The Boys Ranch continues to evolve and grow just as our young men do! Most of you know about our new project, a Foster Care Community.

It has been sad through the years to see boys with as many as 35 placements come here with broken dreams and broken sibling relationships. Our goal at the OLBR is to be the first placement, keep sibling groups together and use the training, resources and facilities of the existing program to be a stable, loving, familiar environment for these kids. Some of our guys lost contact with siblings when they were taken out of the home. Young ones get adopted, teenagers suffer loss after loss and enter young adulthood with no biological ties. But what if we kept them together, supported the foster parents and raised a "family" of children connected by blood as well as history. We believe with all our hearts this will make a difference. Would you like to be a part of not only changing one boys life at a time, but a family of children's lives and future of growing up together with the bond of kinship? It's about giving them a future and being a part of it. Here is an update on our fundraising efforts.

We received \$33,638.50 on Saturday, toward our goal of \$60,000. Clubs continue to send in donations. \$208,688 has been raised toward our goal of matching a grant from Paul Milburn for \$250,000 for our foster care community. That leaves a need of \$41,312! Wouldn't it be great to reach this and build 2 new houses to begin our Foster Care Facility? Let's make reaching this milestone the goal of our hearts! We thank you again for your care and concern for us! Blessings from the Oklahoma Lions Bovs Ranch!

and his Lawton Noon Lions. Lion Daniel must have gone that extra mile, because I received many positive comments about how great the workshop was.



Miami Lions: Welcomed new Lion Mike Reece.


<u>Muskogee County</u>: Volunteered 5 hours at the Muskogee Honor Heights Garden of Lights and received \$1,079 in donations for the park.

Dean McGee Eye Institute is currently enrolling patients for a new treatment that may greatly reduce the need for corneal transplants in the future. Ophthalmologist, and corneal specialist, Don Stone, M.D., who serves as Interim Medical Director for the Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank has confirmed that DMEI is currently looking for patients for the trial study. The treatment involves removing the patient's corneal epithelium (a thin protective layer), placing drops of riboflavin, a B vitamin, on the cornea, and then exposing the cornea to ultraviolet light. A bandage contact Oklahoma Knights for Sight New Treatment For Corneal Degenerations May Greatly Reduce Need For Transplants In The Future By Mark C. Gibson, O.D.

lens is then placed on the patient's cornea; antibiotic and steroid drops are used until the epithelium completely heals itself. The treatment is intended to stop the progression of keratoconus, pellucid marginal degeneration, and possibly other corneal degenerations, and works best when the patient is in the early stages of these diseases. This procedure has been used in countries overseas for almost ten years, and is currently being done in Canada. Once the FDA approves this for use here in the United States, then patients with these sight threatening diseas-



es can be treated, and greatly reduce their need for corneal transplantation. It is reasonable to assume that once this procedure is approved, that the need for transplants may drastically decrease over the next ten to fifteen years.

If you or someone you know has been told they have one of these corneal degenerations, then you can contact your optometrist or ophthalmologist, or call DMEI at 271-6060 to set up an appointment to see if you qualify for the trial study of this new procedure.





- 3. The pin must represent Oklahoma Lions and not an individual area or region.
- 4. The design (drawing) will be submitted on an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper or art board.
- 5. The design will be no smaller than 3" x 5" or larger than 4" x 6"- this will provide the pin company with an adequate sample to produce the pin. Actual size will be determined by the designing company and pin coordinator,
- 6. A short narrative will accompany the design explaining the meaning and color representation.
- 7. The initial design will be selected by the state pin committee and be submitted to the incoming governors at the state convention or at their March training.
- 8. The winning design will be announced at the State Convention.
- 9. The winning design will be given to the appropriate pin committee member and sent for final art development and production. Upon receipt of the finished pin the Lions of Oklahoma State Office will have them avaliable (following the 2014 International Convention).
