



The <u>election</u> of new officers for your club should be soon (April). Hopefully your club has a nomination committee in place. Serving as a club officer is very rewarding. Many of your club members would be willing to serve if they are asked. It's time to step up and be actively involved as it is important that we grow our leaders. Encourage members to utilize the leadership courses offered by Lions Clubs International (LCI). LCI has some of the best seminars and training to help you become a better leader.

Clubs that allow the same members to serve year after year are less likely to envision new projects and new ideas, and often the club becomes less effec-

tive in growing new leaders. A healthy club's vision for the year belongs to all members, combining talents and individual efforts, so that all members feel ownership in the club.

I encourage the new leadership to embrace the Club Excellence Process (CEP), and LCI provides a good club evaluation tool called, "How Are Your Ratings?" (www.lionsclubs.org) which is used as part of the CEP. Clubs that utilize these resources increase membership and are able to better serve their community. Like the living organism that a club is, every club would benefit from an annual check-up. Most clubs are comprised of Lions with varied professional backgrounds who each bring a broad base of expertise and experience to the club. CEP Pro utilizes an outside, unbiased facilitator working with the club during this CEP, allowing every club member to be an active participant and voice their opinions.

All officers should be fully trained in their upcoming new positions. It is amazing how many clubs get a new member and in the next year they are talked into being the President or Secretary and do not fully understand what they are going to be doing. The new officers may be trained by experienced members. Some offices will take more than one session. Here again, LCI has some of the best material that you can get in training the new officers. I cannot emphasize enough the importance of making sure that all officers are fully trained at the beginning of the new Lions year.

Keeping members involved is very important, and for larger clubs members can work on committees or as board members to work and grow as Lions and as leaders. An involved member will want to invite prospective new members into the club.



Is it April already? I am glad that we are out of winter but where has this term gone? April means OLSF White Cane campaign, our Oklahoma Lions state convention, individual club elections, and spring service projects. Be sure you let me know what you have planned for the next 3 months and when your events are so I can try and make them. next day we met according to our pre-arranged group number and we worked on our project in person. Each day was a new attendance schedule.




