Club participation in Cowboy Cadillac helps to restore sight through our Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank and provide children with a safe environment at the Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch foster care community. We will still be asking each Lion member to sell a minimum of \$30 in tickets per member. This will be rewarded with a CC pin to wear proudly on your vest and the honor of helping those in need.

We will be holding the drawing thanks to the contacts made by our devoted highest salesman Elmo Castle in Enid this year. Stevens Ford, 3101 W. Garriott Rd., Enid, OK 73703. The drawing will be at 1:00 pm on the main showroom floor on Sat., Dec. 12, 2015. The OLSF Cowboy Cadillac Committee, chaired by First Vice-President Terry Woodruff, is heading the planning for this special event. We are excited to be offering a higher-priced Ford F-150 with more options. Along with a high quality Ford F150, comes better alternate prizes! We hope everyone will be pleased with the campaign this year and the changes. We hope to have all the information and tickets available by the Aug. 15 Oklahoma Lions State Council Meeting.

Remember all the clubs who participate receive recognition, but that is not the main reason why we hold this annual event! The most important reason is how these funds help those in need. The two OK Lions State Projects are vital to the community and state at large. When you visit the Meadows of Hope in Perkins Oklahoma and see

all the little feet running around and tiny voices laughing and having fun, it puts all these efforts into perspective.

The Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch has been serving the youth of Oklahoma for over 60 years. With over 9,000 in Oklahoma DHS custody at the end of FY12, and over 5,500 entering "out-of-home" care, OLBR needed to expand the services offered. The Meadows of Hope can reach children at a younger age, both boys and girls and keep sibling groups together. The ultimate goal is to work towards breaking the cycle of abuse from one generation to the next by providing a safe and loving atmosphere for *Oklahoma children*.

The Meadows of Hope is the logical next step in our serving the youth of Oklahoma by reducing operational costs, increasing oversight, training, and support for foster parents. Through the support of Paul Milburn and the rest of the Oklahoma Lions, as well as the support of corporate and private partners, this model allows us to increase the number of children we can help.

The Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank was established in 1957 and is Oklahoma's only dedicated tissue recovery organization with the sole purpose of recovering corneal tissue and restoring sight through trans-

plantation. The Eye Bank office opened that year with one employee, a Medical Director, and the ophthalmology residents who performed the eye removals. The first eye enucleation course was given at Central State University through the Department of Mortuary Service for Funeral Directors. In 1981, the Eye Bank was certified by the Eye Bank Association of America and we are charter members of this group. This is a non-profit organization collaboration of eye banks dedicated to the restoration of sight through the promotion and advancement of eye banking.

Throughout the years over 20,000 corneas have been recovered assisting those in need for cornea transplant. In 2014, the OK Lions Eye Bank opened a new facility thanks to the dedication of its leadership and Oklahoma Lions. Oklahoma Lions are a driving force in both state projects and Cowboy Cadillac is one of the main fundraising campaigns we do to assist with these efforts.

Please remember it is about "Service" to aid those who have suffered and benefit from your hard work. Every ticket sold puts HOPE in their hands.


Lindsay Lions



There were many introductions as community members and Lions came together for one important cause. The atmosphere was electric with excitement, but the love that permeated that event was palpable! The one-on-one conversations, stories, questions about the future were meshed with plans, drawings and photo-ops! All donors, from the greatest to smallest, were thanked and recognized. Our Executive Director Bryan Larison showed a video depicting child abuse and violence in our society today. It made us all cry but emphasized the point that now, if ever there was a time, we need to protect and be

After a great meal together, all who were there were met by many others at the Paul and Ann Milburn Meadows of Hope campus to tour the new homes and meet the families. 
The highlight of the day was the official ribbon cutting for the project! The drizzle did not dampen the spirits and it was such a wonderful gathering.

At the luncheon earlier we were able to hear from a former resident, now a husband, father, minister, and *author who had lived at the ranch during his teen years. He was honest about the (not at all) therapeutic treatment he received while a teenager here, but was quick to acknowledge that lessons learned there helped make him the man he is today. Having met Alton Carter personally and knowing his story, I was overcome with emotion when he

called Bryan to the front to give him a gift, an old worn faded brick that represented the lifetime of hurt and fear that had strengthened Alton as he determined to make his path one of success. The old brick had sat on his desk as a symbol of the past; now it was given to Bryan as a symbol of the future! It was a visual representation of the firm foundation of love and family that the new Foster Care Community would offer.

For those who have put so much hard work, prayers and money into this project, it was more than an old brick changing hands; it was a vision of a new way of loving and living for many children and youth who in the future can be safe and strong and successful all because they found a home and they found a future and they found HOPE.


