#### Attention, all 3-K Lions!

Our District 3-K Mid-Winter convention will be January 23-24, 2015, at the Days Inn and Suites in Poteau. Thank you to Poteau Evening and Pocola Lions Clubs for hosting this important event for us. Registration form is available online at www.oklahomalions.org or by calling the OK Lions State Office 405-947-6540. Friday evening, have dinner on your own and then participate in the fun karaoke session hosted by Lion Marshall Brence at the hotel from 7-9pm. Saturday's meetings and trainings start at 9am and will include the speech contest. At the noon Awards luncheon, Past International Director Pat Shurley will be our guest speaker. There will be a silent auction, so bring your items to contribute plus your checkbook (or we will take cash) so you can purchase that special auction item you cannot live without! At approximately 2pm the required District 3-K cabinet meeting will occur, with elections of our 2015-2016 district governor team and representatives for our state project boards, plus those important reports from each club will be given. Immediately following the cabinet meeting and elections. PID Pat will be able to answer any questions or concerns you have about the Lions of Oklahoma or Lions Clubs International.

Let's make an effort to have at least 1 member from each of our 36 clubs represented at the district convention. Your club may want to consider a "scholarship" to help a Lion or Lions attend the convention.

One very important issue that will be discussed during this convention is the plan to redistrict from 5 districts to 3 districts in Oklahoma. Those 3 districts would basically be eastern Oklahoma, northwestern Oklahoma, and southwestern Oklahoma. The official vote on redistricting will take place at the MD-3 Lions of Oklahoma state convention, April 24-25, 2015, at the Wyndham Hotel in Tulsa. I ask that every 3-K Lions Club send their certified voting delegates to the state convention.

#### **District 3-K Club Activities**

Blanchard: Lions are parade marshals for Veterans Day Parade and also the Christmas Parade, providing assistance to get entries lined up in correct order, and to issue numbers and write down the name of the organization sponsoring the floats. The club collects used eyeglasses and used cell phones for recycling, delivering them to the state office in OKC. They club awards scholarships, buys eyeglasses as needed, and helps distribute Christmas food baskets.

<u>Durant</u>: Lions will hold their spring spaghetti lunch and supper. They help with Toys for Tots in December, with meals on wheels throughout the year, and award 3 scholarships every year in May. They also collect used eyeglasses, hearing aids and printer cartridges to recycle and purchase eyeglasses as needed. The Lions are selling OLSF Cowboy Cadillac tickets.

Holdenville: Welcomed 3 new Lions-Michael Dockery, Martin O'Donnell and Jerry House. The club sponsored the OK Lions Mobile Health Screening Unit for the back-to-school health fair, and they are selling OLSF Cowboy Cadillac tickets. The club will partner with Holdenville Fire Department for Toys for Tots. They donated \$200 to the OK Lions Boys Ranch and awarded \$600 scholarships to 2 Holdenville HS seniors.

<u>Idabel</u>: Lions donate \$100 per month to food bank, and are giving out Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets as well as participating in the DHS Adopt An Angel program.

<u>Lindsay</u>: Collects used printer cartridges, hearing aids and eyeglasses for recycling. They award at least 2 scholarships each May to graduating seniors. The annual fundraiser BBQ dinner is at the school, 5-7p.m., just before the football game. All the Lions Club members and volunteers of the community assist with this BBQ dinner; normally, 300 tickets are sold.

<u>Sallisaw</u>: Has 39 active Lions and are selling OLSF Cowboy Cadillac tickets. Lion Matt Bauer sponsored a new member-welcome, Jud Maxwell.

**Shawnee:** Lions welcomed **6 new members.** They are Justin Beaver, Matt Miller, Mason

Wilson, Oz Mitchell, Steve Matthews and Courtney McLaughlin. Note that 4 of these new Lions were sponsored by Lion Tom Hennigh. Club held a chuck wagon special cookout with about 70 family, friends and potential members. Lion Jerry Ball received his 45-year membership pin; Lions Paul Milburn; Katie Landes, and Tom Hennigh were recognized for their recruiting efforts. Shawnee Lions are selling OLSF Cowboy Cadillac tickets. They collect used printer cartridges, eyeglasses, and cell phones for recycling. 


#### **MHSU**
