Why do District Governors make "official" club visits?

The International Association of Lions Clubs (LCI) requires every District Governor or other member of the DG team under the Governor's supervision to visit each Lions Club in their district once every year to facilitate successful administration of the club. The visiting district officer must submit a District Governor's Meeting/Club Visitation Report to LCI for each visit. The purposes of a club visitation are to:

- Ensure the visited club is functioning within the rules and policies of the association (LCI) and are conducting meaningful humanitarian service on a regular basis.
- Convey messages from the LCI president and board of directors as well as the district.
- Promote membership growth, leadership development and service activities within the club.
- Explore, together with club members, the club's future growth plan and improvement.
- Discuss difficulties, if any, and possible solutions. *Taken from the International Association of Lions Club's Board Policy Manual (revised 10/13)*

History a look back Beginning in 1917, [Melvin Jones](#), a 38-year-old Chicago business leader, asked a simple and world changing question – “What if people put their talents to work improving their communities?” Many of the original Lions clubs (Founders club) are still serving their communities. Just three years after our founding, Lions became Lions Clubs International when we established the first club in Canada. Mexico followed in 1927. In the 1950s and 1960s international growth accelerated, with new clubs in Europe, Asia and Africa. Almost 100 years later, Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service club organization, with 1.35 million members in more than 46,000 clubs.

Our History, Oklahoma has been part of the Lions clubs since the early beginnings. We have several Founders clubs serving their communities. Starting with the 1947-1948 term the districts of O, K, L, A, came into existence. This district configuration existed until membership increased, redistricting and introduction of Districts H, and M in 1963-1964 term. The membership continued to grow and starting with the 1979-1980 term, redistricting created District N, making a total of **seven** districts in Oklahoma. The seven districts would remain until membership had dwindled and redistricting became necessary once again.

Oklahoma went from seven to five districts. The start of the five districts would be the 1994-1995 term. We have remained with the five districts as membership continues to decrease. Unless we dramatically increase our state wide membership, the possibility of redistricting is looming over our state, and once again dropping to four districts O, K, L, A the original 1947-1948 four districts, maybe even dropping to three, in order to have 1250 members per district. If the rate of the loses continue we will drop into the 4400 range for total membership by the end of 2013-2014 term. Are we willing to let membership decrease?

How do we fix this? First a THANK YOU to the Lions responsible for the 327 new members this year. Retention has to be part of the membership effort. It seems that we can bring in new members, but retaining members is not a priority. Starting at the club level we need to do a better job of retention working hand in hand with recruiting new members. By working together, communicating, let the other clubs know about your club upcoming activities, talk about Lions to others (people know about Lions, **just ask**) and it is up to members to be active. Together we can make a difference. Start today. Keep yourself and other members informed. Who has visited LCI web site lately? How many clubs have web site? Do other clubs know about your web site? Has your membership committee initiated a plan for increasing membership, and shared it with your club? Is you club active in the district and state activities, Zone meetings, conventions, etc.? Is your club actively participating in other club functions and activities? Somewhere along the way I feel we have lost the club interaction, and communication up and down the chain. We have cell phones, email, texting, web sites, social media, and snail mail. Yet the information about club activities seems to remain in the clubs corner of the world. Family time is important, why not make Lion activities part of that family time, let the next generation know the importance of giving back to the community, family time can also be time for children to see the benefit of belonging. As we are starting the last six months of the Lion year., we continue to loose members. A look back over the last 20 years (1994-2014) reveals a drastic and disturbing trend. It is the responsibility of each Lions member to help increase membership. If history was to repeat itself let it be the part pertaining to membership growth and increase in the number of districts.

Guidelines for the Oklahoma Trading Pin Contest for 2014-2015

1. Only Lions may enter; each Lion may submit only **one entry**. The Club may submit an entry as a group effort, or hold a club contest of individual designs selecting the representative design.
2. All entries must be received no later then March 1, 2014; mail all entries to Lions of Oklahoma, 4123 NW 10th St., Oklahoma City, OK 73107-5801
3. The pin must represent Oklahoma Lions and not an individual area or region.
4. The design (drawing) will be submitted on an 8 ½ x 11 sheet of paper or art board.
5. The design will be no smaller than 3" x 5" or larger than 4" x 6"- this will provide the pin company with an adequate sample to produce the pin. Actual size will be determined by the designing company and pin coordinator,
6. A short narrative will accompany the design explaining the meaning and color representation.
7. The initial design will be selected by the state pin committee and be submitted to the incoming governors at the state convention or at their March training.
8. The winning design will be announced at the State Convention.
9. The winning design will be given to the appropriate pin committee member and sent for final art development and production. Upon receipt of the finished pin the Lions of Oklahoma State Office will have them available (following the 2014 International Convention).

Guidelines for Oklahoma Leo Trading Pin Contest 2014-2015

1. Each Club may submit only **one entry**. The Club may submit an entry as a group effort, or hold a club contest of individual designs selecting the representative design.
2. All entries must be received NLT March1, 2014. Mail or give all entries to PDG Bill Middleton, 2106 Constitution Ave., Enid, OK 73703
3. The pin must represent Oklahoma Leos and not an individual area or region.
4. The design (drawing) will be submitted on an 8 ½ x 11 sheet of paper or art board.
5. The design will be no smaller than 3" x 5" or larger than 4" x 6"- this will provide the pin company with an adequate sample to produce the pin. Actual size to be determined by the designing company and pin coordinator,
6. A short narrative will accompany the design explaining the meaning and color representation.
7. Only Oklahoma Leos may enter the contest.
8. The initial design will be selected by Leos at the State Lions Convention. Judges (Leo's) will be selected at random from registered Leos at the State Convention. Lions from the Oklahoma Pin Trading Club will be selected to **assist and advise** the judging. The winning design will be announced at the State Convention.
9. The design will be given to the appropriate pin committee member and sent for final art development and production. Upon receipt of the finished pin the Oklahoma Lions Pin Trading Club will forward the pins to the Oklahoma Leo Clubs on consignment with suggested selling price and method to reimburse the trading club.

I trust all 3-H Lions had a great Christmas/holiday season and have a great start to 2014. Mine was treated with family time together and it doesn't get any better than that!

So here I am half way through my term as your governor. Your governor team met several times before July to plan and prepare for the 2013-2014 year. I thought we had the year all mapped out and we could just click it right off-one project, one new club, new Lions-all scheduled and ready to follow our blueprint for success. Well, that got scrapped even before the term started with the series of tornadoes. My "plan" back in April called for establishing a new club in Moore in July/August. If those transferring members had been processed in December we would have shown a "plus" membership for the district.

So we have really done a great job of reversing our national trend of losing many more members than we add. I still have many more

Governors One pins that I want to hand out. Keep looking for those new members and let's finish the year strong.

I also didn't realize what a great personal opportunity I was given as governor to meet all our clubs and members (I'm still working on the list). WHAT A GREAT DISTRICT! I have so enjoyed interacting with our clubs and members and seeing what great service events and fundraisers they have in their community. I will put our 3-H Lions up against any district. Thank you, 3-H Lions.

Our clubs were very busy during December meeting the needs of their communities and in particular those who might be less fortunate than many of us. This was a great time of the year to show others what Lionism is all about, and as that song goes, "nobody does it better" than 3-H Lions. Almost every club has some project or event reaching out to those in need.

Most of January has been spent preparing for our District 3-H Convention. As I write this, we have had a great response to preparing for the convention. I thank the clubs and members in advance for helping us make this a success. I certainly hope you were able to attend.
