

Oklahoma Lions to Vote Saturday, April 25 on Redistricting

The Council of Governors in October 2014 approved putting the resolution to redistrict on the ballot at the State Convention in Tulsa, April 24-25. The Redistricting Task Force, chaired by PDG Terry Woodruff (Ponca City Noon) recommended the Council approve the resolution to go on the ballot for a vote by certified delegates from all Oklahoma Lions Clubs.

District 3-O held an information session at their district convention in November, and 3 -H will have an information session at their mid-winter on Feb. 7. Hopefully the other 3 districts will have information sessions at the mid-winter conventions as well.

The resolution cites all five districts in Oklahoma (Multiple

District 3) are under the numbers required by LCI for districts in good standing (!,250 Lions in a district). Some of the districts are also under the required 25 clubs per district required.

The resolution, if passed, will divide Oklahoma into 3 districts, roughly east, central and west. The 3 districts would comply with LCI number requirements, as figured by Woodruff in late 2013-2014. The 3 districts would carry the names 3-O, 3-K and 3-L.

Lions of Oklahoma, please note that procedures to endorse applications for the Dr. Briggs scholarship are changed this year. Since endorsement has to be on-line at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, only board members can endorse applications. In the past the applicants were asked to go to their local Lions Club for endorsement.

Applicants will be asked to call the closest Briggs Board member; that Lion will interview the applicant(s) by phone and then give them their name and email address to list on the www.occf.org online application website

The Briggs Board member then gets a notice from OCCF on-line application website (Academic Works) that shows he/she has an applicant needing

Lions reference. The Board member then logs onto the OCCF online application website and answers the reference questions. (Note: Board members were trained in the procedure on Jan. 10, 2015.)

If you, as a Lion or as a member of your local Lions Club, know the applicant(s) personally, please contact your closest Briggs Board member; your information is valued but cannot be directly input in the new on-line application system.

District Governors are currently asking for your help in submitting names, biographical information and photos of deserving Oklahoma Lions in each district for consideration as that district's *Lion of the Year*.

Annually District Governors will select a "Lion of the Year" for their respective districts in accordance with their Sub-District Constitution and By Laws. The award will be given to Lions who are considered outstanding Lions and whose identity should remain confidential until presented. The recipient of this award must be an active Lion in good standing. District Governors are excluded from consideration. A Lion may get this award only one time in the district.

Leaving a Long Lasting Legacy with the Oklahoma Lions!

Building the Foundation and the Legacy Campaign are two of the ongoing efforts to secure the future stability of the Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation. We would like to build a strong support base to assist the OK Lions State Projects as well as assisting clubs with individual service projects. Raising the monthly support is one way to build revenue that encourages additional corporate and foundation support. Foundations encourage matching funds for specific projects; therefore, it is our desire to have a fund set up to assist clubs in this area when opportunities for projects arise.

Building the Foundation currently has approximately \$1,800 in monthly donations. While this is much needed, it is not enough to set aside funds for larger service projects. OLSF encourages you to consider a small monthly donation towards BTF. For just a dollar a day, less than a coke in most places, you can help to build this endeavor. You may specify what you want it to go towards, such as Club projects, OK Lions Eye Bank, or OK Lions Boys Ranch. While pass-through funds do not build this activity fund, it is much needed to support State Projects!

Legacy Campaign The Oklahoma City Community Foundation (OCCF) is one of the Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation's (OLSF) partners in planned giving. The endowment held by OCCF brings in a constant stream of revenue that continues. OLSF currently has a balance of \$192,230.12 in the endowment. In 2014, the balance in the endowment increased by \$11,481.34. In addition, OLSF received unrestricted funds of \$8,435 last year in interest from the principle.

Since 1995, endowment donations have been close to \$142,588. The total distribution received by OLSF over the years has been \$123,911. There is an increase in market value of \$49,642.12 plus the distributions of \$123,911, which totals \$165,734, which is more than the original donations received. THIS PROVES THE VALUE OF PLANNED GIVING OVER TIME!

A Charitable bequest in a will or trust is one of the simplest ways to make an estate gift. OCCF can customize a fund agreement that allows donors to change the charitable intent of their bequest without having to change their will. Many donors do not realize the tax

benefit of including a charity in a trust or will. The OCCF website has several ways of helping the donor learn including a calculator that creates a presentation showing the income and tax benefits of several planned giving vehicles such as gift annuities, annuity trusts and more.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation's: A Guide to Planning Your Will and Trust is designed to encourage donors to think about how their assets are to be distributed at death. The guide assists in gathering information needed for an attorney to prepare a will or document the donor's wishes.

Please consider planning your gift for the future! This encourages individuals to think about how they want their assets distributed and provide for others to *leave a legacy* for many years to come. If you are interested in planned giving please call the OLSF State office to make an appointment to visit about giving options. OLSF and the Oklahoma City Community Foundation can help provide you with additional information for giving options that best suit your needs.

Barnsdall: Third annual Chili Cook-off is set for Sat., Feb. 21 from 11am to 1pm. Shooters Training Education Program is set for June 20, 2015.

Bartlesville Tuxedo: Lions sell Christmas trees for their major fundraiser. It took about 48 man-hours to setup and take down the tree lot while 16 Lions helped sell the trees, working about 190 hours. Seven Lions helped ring the bells for Salvation Army for 20 hours of service to the community.

<u>Dewey</u>: Gave \$900 to the OK Lions Boys Ranch at the Christmas Party.

Henryetta: Over 300 area families had a brighter Christmas thanks to an over 60-year tradition that the Lions have led. Families who are approved receive a box of food and presents for the children. It's a \$23,000 community-wide effort, from the VFW loaning their building to prepare the baskets, to the elementary students who collected over 1,000 canned goods, and a variety of groups and volunteers to put together and deliver the baskets.

<u>Muskogee County</u>: Stephen Kearney was named the Lion of the Year.

Porter: Donated \$500 to OK Lions Boys Ranch; packaged 225 bags of apples, oranges and candy for the Porter Christmas parade.

Sapulpa: Donated \$250 to help the girls' basketball team go to tournament; collected 50

pairs of used eyeglasses; donated \$400 to OK Lions Boys Ranch Christmas!

Tulsa Metro-McCullough: Four members attended Cowboy Cadillac drawing in Muskogee. Five members attended the OK Lions Boys Ranch Christmas Party and brought the club donation of \$200 to be presented in the parade of checks; pther members took articles for auctions. Collected toys that were given to the Tulsa County Sheriff's office for distribution for underprivileged children.

I have made an effort for clubs to "partner" with nearby clubs in fundraisers and projects, to share the Lions Spirit, and to get to know fellow Lions.



I want to thank each of you for the time you give to your service projects and your commitment to help your community.


