It was a wonderful evening and relationships are already being built with people from college freshman to great grandmas. I was able to share with them from a foster parent's perspective. There were many whose desire was evident on their faces, and want to proceed on with the program. Thank- you Lions for being such an outstanding example of service and love for our families and children. This past week The Lions Meadows of Hope received an award from the Perkins Chamber of Commerce as the "Best Organization" and Bryan personally received the "Delmar Niles Community Service Award". OKLAHOMA LIONS SERVICE FOUNDATION Oklahoma Lions White Cane & Vision Programs!

Throughout the world, the long white cane is used by people who are blind or visually impaired as a tool for safe and reliable navigation. The white cane is a symbol of the user's skills and talents, mobility and independence. It also allows the sighted person to recognize that the user is visually impaired. Several countries have traffic laws designed to protect the person using the white cane. International White Cane Safety Day (October 15th) gives Lions an opportunity to increase awareness of the white cane traffic safety laws. "White Cane Day is observed worldwide to recognize the movement of blind people from dependency to full participation in society." (Lions Club International. 2016. White Cane Safety Day. While White Cane Safety Day nationally is October 15th however, Oklahoma Lions have traditionally observed this effort in April. The Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation strives to bring awareness to fellow Oklahomans



regarding the issues visually impaired individuals face as well as raise funds to support Oklahoma Lions vision programs.

SPECIAL NEED: This upcoming year we have a special need at the Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank (OLEB) for a new Laser machine. This project could potentially save the eye bank processing fees over time freeing up funds to assist more individuals. The total project cost is roughly a little over \$171,000. This includes items needed to begin the process through two phases. Currently, OLEB pays \$750 per cornea for this service resulting on over \$66,000 processing fees for last year. The project would pay for itself in approximately two and a half years. This is not only exciting but beneficial for the self-sustainability of the Eye Bank.

Endowment grant for OLEB: Beginning in June, 2016 OLSF will also be raising funds for the matching grant to the Kirkpatrick Family Fund to establish an endowment for the Eye Bank. We will need to raise a minimum of \$25,000 from clubs and individuals

> for this matching amount. It is vital that we as Lions recognize this effort and show strong support for the sustainability of this much needed program.

Oklahoma Lions Vision Programs: The Oklahoma State Office receives several phone calls a day from fellow Oklahomans desperately needing assistance with vision needs. While we have several agencies and clubs that support this effort, we need to improve our ability to provide services. This year OLSF would like to increase awareness of this need and organize a growth strategy for increasing services. OLSF recognizes and appreciates Lions Clubs that provide services in cooperation with local health care providers. It is our goal to increase these services with the help of Lions all over the state.

Personally, I have had a scare with almost losing an eye to a serious infection. I was completely blind and could not see anything for over a week. I am still not able to see well yet. I could not believe how much of my life was affected. It was not only painful physically, but difficult because I had to rely on others for assistance. As an independent person, this was very difficult. Everything we go through is a learning experience, and for this reason I am grateful. I have small understanding of what it is like to those who are visually impaired and cannot get help.

As Lions, we need to remember our challenge by Helen Keller, to be "Knights for the Blind". We need to focus our energy on making this year's "White Cane", the best year yet!

By now most of you have heard the election results from the special State Convention concerning redistricting. The vote to delay the start of the new districts carried by a 45 to 23 vote. The new districts being called E, NW and SW carried by a 44 to 23 vote. Now the State and Districts along with the State Boards need to get started revising their constitutions and bi-laws. Of course, the above delay is assuming that International will approve MD3's request at its March Board meeting.

Special State Convention Update

A special State Convention, as requested by Lions Club International, was held on January 9, 2016. The purpose was to determine the names of the three districts in MD-3 and for the date which this redistricting was to be implemented.

PDG Russell Wright, Chair of the Credentials and Elections, along with the rest of the members of the committee , conducted the election. There were 68 delegates registered. The results of the vote for Multiple District 3 Redistricting Plan to be implemented on July 2, 2017 was Yes 45 votes and No for 23 votes.

The results for the names of the three new districts was:

Option 1: District E (East) District NW (Northwest) and District SW (Southwest) received 44 votes.

Option 2: District O, K, and L received 24 votes.

A letter to Lions Club International along with this information is in the process of being prepared and will be sent to the LCI Board at their meeting in March for approval.

A special thanks to ID Bill Phillipi and PID Ed McCormick, from Kansas, who attended the State Council meeting and answered questions about the proposed redistricting.






