For Boys and Girls

One of my many memories after 8+ years here is the conversation I had with one of our boys several years ago. As we were getting to know him we cautiously asked if he had siblings. With a lost look in his eyes he said..."I think so." He went on, "I remember there being some little kids and a baby in our house but after I got "taken" away, I can't remember their names or anything". It was a source of great sorrow for many of our guys who had basically raised their younger brothers and sisters themselves, to all of a sudden be separated and not sure of the little ones safety or well-being. Most of the time, they were never able to live together again. Their family was lost, along with their memories and history. There have been a whirlwind of changes going on at the Ok-

lahoma Lions Boys Ranch! In the past 6 months we closed our doors as a group home facility and opened new doors as a Foster-Care Community. This change was inevitable with the vacillating political and economic climate in our state and nation, but was implemented a bit faster than we had originally planned. Some folks have had a hard time with the idea that we are not a "boys ranch" per say, anymore. Some donors have stopped giving and some clubs have not yet come on board with the idea. One day this last week Bryan and I were poking around in the archives & records room in preparation for moving some things around. Against the far wall, was a large plaque with the names of about 60 organizations & donors including 30+ Lions Clubs.

The plaque we think was from around the time that the "Whitecloud" lodge was built circa 1960's? This plaque has a brass piece at the top in the shape of a triangle with the name "I O A Ranch" and underneath was written "for Boys & Girls". H.F. Donnelley's daughter Lorine Reed was a great friend and historian of the ranch. She taught me to love the whole concept and appreciate her father's philosophy. When we were contemplating this change from Boys Ranch to Foster Care, I visited with her about it and she said her dad would have been so pleased. It seems that he always wanted it to be for both genders, but at the time (1950-ish) when he was developing this plan, it was not well supported to have girls on the

So it seems like we have come full circle. Mr. Donnelly’s desire was for all youth to grow up to be productive successful adults. Though his concept of “family-style” living

and teaching moral and ethical values was so different than the ideas of punishment and reformation at the time, there is no regret that we operated as a boy’s ranch for over 63 years. Our commitment to youth in our care was always for their good and most of the time demonstrated with compassion. There have been successes and heartaches but always the desire to do our best. I’m pleased to know that Mr. Donnelly’s dream included girls also and when I visit the other foster homes and see the brothers and sisters growing up together and the moms and dads being such fine examples and mentors, it just feels right. We had some volunteers from Life Church in Stillwater come and help set up our clothes closet. It was such fun to see the

little kids clothes along with the big kids. Lots of pretty dresses and coats and princess comforters and “Frozen” pajama’s. All children deserve a safe loving home and the chance to grow and blossom into happy successful members of our society. The legacy of the I.O.A. Ranch was and is that (all) Individuals have the **Opportunity to Achieve**. And here at the Lions Meadows of Hope, a project of the Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch, that happens every day thanks to all of you and your continuing support.
