

Lions of Oklahoma Disaster Relief/Recovery Update

As we approach the first anniversary of the May 2013 tornadoes, the Disaster Relief Committee continues its work in helping with the long-term recovery efforts.

Currently, our committee members are attempting to attend as many LARC and VOAD meetings as possible to ensure awareness of possible needs we might serve. Through the donations and grants from LCIF, we funded the music program at Briarwood Elementary (\$25,343), and just received the funding to replace the Redcat Audio devices and two-way radios at both Briarwood and Plaza Towers Elementary (\$60,310). In the past week, we also submitted a request to fund the building of two safe rooms at Canadian Valley Technical Center in El Reno. The request was to cover the cost to build the safe rooms exceeding the normal building cost per square foot (estimated at \$53 per square foot). We requested to cover the Daycare safe room in Building 100 and the sole safe room in Building 200 for a total cost of \$77,009.

Beyond the long-term recovery efforts, we are still putting together the final touches on the Disaster Relief plan for the committee. We hope to have a tentative plan in place by May 15, 2014. As the new storm season approaches, we refuse to be caught unprepared. The purpose of the committee is to put together a trainable, repeatable plan of action so we do not find ourselves

attempting to figure out what to do after the fact. It is imperative that we know our roles and responsibilities and perform them to the best of our abilities.

Please reach out to your clubs and ask them to start thinking about a Disaster Relief Liaison that would essentially serve as our local contact in the case of an emergency. If they can identify somebody now, they could likely serve in that role for the upcoming year. Also, please ask your clubs to let us know if they have Optometrists and/or Ophthalmologists and could provide contact information. From there, we can reach out directly to these Lions to see if they would be willing to help with our Focometers to determine eyeglass prescription in our future relief response.

Also, please think about what other skills/professions would be important to identify within our membership (e.g. CDL drivers, contractors, electricians).

Finally, we continue to feel our way on how our response will fit in with other agencies to avoid duplication of services, etc. Our membership application to OK VOAD was submitted about nine months ago. Understandably, the organization has a full plate and has taken no membership action in that time. However, they know who we are and what we offer, so we should be in the loop for the next event.

Thank you to everybody who has worked so diligently in these efforts. We will continue to refine the process, the plan, and the committee.

OLSF Thanks You!

First of all, there are so many people to say "thank you" to for the service and dedication towards humanitarian efforts and "Lionism" across the State of Oklahoma. Every gift that is given to help those in need serves an additional purpose by offering hope to others. Whether it is a monetary gift, a gift of service, or the gift of prayer, they are given with the hopes of having an eternal effect.

Lions across Oklahoma have dedicated their lives to serving others through acts of kindness that have everlasting value. White Cane is one of the fundraisers that OK Lions Clubs participate in every year. The history and purpose of White Cane began October 6, 1964, in an effort to make Americans more aware of the meaning of the White Cane and the need for motorists to exercise special care towards the person who carries it. The United States Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the United States to annually issue a proclamation designating October 15 as National White Cane Safety Day. Each spring, usually in April, The Lions Service Foundation encourages every Lions Club in Oklahoma to be a part of this tradition and host a specific White Cane project. The Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation is keeping the tradition alive by encouraging clubs to raise awareness and funds through the White Cane Campaign. Many Oklahoma Lions Clubs have already raised funds toward helping with this effort.

Seminole Lion Secretary Les Walker, PDG, sent the OLSF an excerpt from the local newspaper. The Club is challenged to raise at least \$2,000 each year for White Cane. The club mails out letters to businesses and conducts a White Cane auction. This year the club collected over \$1,200 from the letters and \$647.29 from the auction. Other OK Lions Clubs that have sent in donations are: Lawton Noon \$1,000, Ardmore \$250, Nash \$25, Altus \$1,000, and Langston City \$200. A much deserved thank you to those clubs that have taken charge to raise awareness and funds to give eyesight to others.

Used Printer Cartridge Recycling has also brought in over \$646.05 for the month of March. A big "Thank You" to all the clubs who save and bring by used cartridges for recycling. Thanks to <u>Tinker Federal Credit Union</u> as well for their faithful donations. The total amount this fiscal year is \$3,735.95 from used printer cartridge recycling.


The Cowboy Cadillac Fundraiser results have been calculated for each of the districts. In 2013, the OK Lions Service Foundation Cowboy Cadillac campaign raised over \$72,000 for State projects. Note: Results are still pending audit, so may change. Congratulations to top selling Lions Club member Raymond Valdez from Midwest City Lions Club. A big congratulations also goes to the top selling club overall: Garber from 3 -A. Thanks also to the top selling clubs in each district: 3-O Tulsa Downtown, 3-K Ardmore, 3-L Lawton Noon, 3-A Ponca City Noon, and 3-H Midwest City. The award recognition was at the State Convention April 26. The planning session with OLSF Cowboy Cadillac Committee will take place soon after the State Convention. The OLSF will need a vehicle donated; therefore, if anyone knows a contact for this event, please call the State office. This year we must raise our goal to \$120,000 to assist our state programs as they continue to grow. If each of the 173 clubs and 4,458 members would commit to raising at least \$700 per Club or only \$27 per member this could make a significant contribution towards sustaining that growth.

In an effort to assist the **OK Lions Boys Ranch**, Lions can participate in the fundraisers to help with much needed operating costs. The Boys Ranch is growing and will need increased support to subsidize funding for expenses not covered through state or agency contracts. The capital campaign for the foster care community was a huge success; however, the Boys Ranch is in need of unrestricted funds or general operating funds.

The OK Lions Mobile Health Screening Unit is also very busy attending Lions Club sponsored functions with 3 events in March screening over 337 people and 7 events scheduled in April. Additional funds will be needed to continue this project for next year. The OLSF goal is to continue to research foundational and funding support for this unit to continue activities and meet the growing needs of Oklahomans.

The OK Lions Service Foundation is proud to represent the Lions of Oklahoma and continues to raise funds for gifts that keep giving. In an effort to continue this task, OLSF-in partnership with the Oklahoma City Community Foundationwould like to remind Lions of the OLSF Legacy Club. Planned giving provides Lions Legacy members with a variety of gift and estate planning services to make charitable giving simple and flexible. The Oklahoma City Community Foundation has knowledgeable staff that works alongside OLSF staff to help each member determine the best personal giving option. Chelsea: Lion Jenan Alderman was selected as 2013 Citizen of the Year, receiving the award on Mar. 20 at the annual Chelsea Chamber of Commerce banquet. Lion Jenan will be club secretary for 2014-2015, and is also Chairperson for the Peace Poster contest.



Dewey: Preparing for 2 car shows on back-to-back weekends in early May. Will be sponsoring the *Vic-tim's Impact Panel* at Dewey Public Schools before prom night.

Jay: Annual Membership Drive brought in 3 new members. Club held fundraising cookout on April 22; monies raised will be used for scholarships. DGE Randy Keller and Lion Jacob Wiese attended training in March and are now certified Guiding Lions. Annual White Cane Day is May 15 at the stoplight in downtown Jay from 11am–1pm and May 17 at the Jay Wal -Mart from 10am–6pm. Club will sponsor new Grove Lions Club. Lion Forrest Hinderliter is the mentor to the new President, Lion Jacob Wiese is the mentor to the new Secretary, and Lion Chastity Cochran is the mentor to the new Treasurer.

<u>Muskogee County</u>: Donated \$500 and competed in the Junior Achievement Bowling fundraiser.

Muskogee Noon: Dr. Richard Creed stepped up to the plate one more time and will serve the club as president. His primary goal this year was to refine/ reform the annual Pancake Breakfast so it can run with more volunteer help outside of the club. First time in over 5 years that 100% of the pledges made were collected. Club held auction this year and raised an additional \$300 while giving away \$300 as cash prizes. One of club's newest partners was Dal-Tile and they donated tile as a prize valued at over \$600. Total funds raised: \$11,063.00. Club collected 389 pairs of used eyeglasses, provided 5 pairs of new eyeglasses to Muskogee citizens, and gave left-over pancake supplies to the Ark of Faith Foundation (who feeds the homeless). Reportedly the club's donations were enough to provide meals for 14 days. The John Rogers Trust Fund has increased by \$20,923.00 since Lion Wayne Wilburn has been on the board as Trust Advisor.

The club and District 3-O welcome new Lion Sandra Waldroup, who seems to have a very strong volunteer work ethic, serving at both the Public Library and the Chamber. Marie Burns, OLSF Director has agreed to emcee club's Installation Banquet June 11. At that time club will present 3 scholarships (\$850 each), and give away over \$9,000 to our long-time benevolent partners.

Porter: Donated \$1,500 at the Wagoner County Junior Livestock Show premium sale and \$1,000 at the Muskogee County Junior Livestock Show premium sale. NOTE: Porter will meet on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 5:30pm at the Porter Civic Center from April thru July.

Sapulpa: Donated \$7,000 to Sapulpa High School athletic dept., \$500 to LCIF, \$210 to Creek County Literacy Spelling Bee to sponsor a team from Oklahoma School for the Blind, and supplied eye exam and eyeglasses to 1 person. Welcomed a new Lion for the month.

South Grand Lake: Third Annual Grand Dam Run, held on April 5 across the historical Pensacola Dam was a huge success. A total of 676 runners took part and raised \$8,882, which creates scholarships for Ketchum High School students and provides maintenance for the Veterans Honor Park in Langley. Next will be the Grand Lake BBQ Festival to provide funding for the Ketchum Warrior Backpack Program; it will be held May 16-17 at the Langley Ball Fields. This hugely popular event will bring Kansas City Barbecue Society Grillmasters from all over the country to compete for the title of Grand Champion, with a total purse of \$10,000. Friday night will be Adult Night with Don White performing from 6:30 to 9:30 pm. Saturday (Family Day), during the competition, the Darrel Lee Band will perform from 11:00 to 2:30. The Lions will serve BBQ meals 11-2. Tickets can be purchased at the gate. Everyone is invited to come out and support this worthwhile project.
