I am so excited for the 2022-2023 year. We have so much to do! Just remember, Together We Can! I hope to see you all at the district convention in Ozark.



Comments from Vice District Governor Russell Bryan

That system is made up of research, planning, weather stats, travel, timing, exposure, wildlife, trail exhaustion, and the list goes on. Each of these are a process and a piece of the overall system. As you probably realize, I like to climb mountains. 14ers to be exact. I've successfully climbed over twenty so far. One being Mt. Whitney, the highest peak in the lower US. There's a system for these climbs and when executed, it gives the best chance for a successful summit. One might think that the summit is the destination or the goal. However, the summit is the halfway point. The goal is to return home safely, while enjoying the thrill, excitement, challenge, and triumph of the climb. There will always be setbacks, challenges, lightning or maybe some type of animal biting a hole in a water bottle (yes, it happened). And sometimes.....well you just don't reach the top. Mt. Personally, I believe everyone's recruiting abilities can be improved with the right system, tailored to their individual personality, lifestyle, work and family. That system will change and grow over time. And therefore, not static. We all gain experience, knowledge, lowered anxiety levels and should become more comfortable with sharing how much Lions have enriched our lives thru service to others. Yet, are we hesitant? At the Mid-Winter Forum, a presentation was given on membership and the outlook of our District if we don't take action. It was not a good statistic, and it prompted me to start improving my system for recruiting. A system that I can easily follow and works along-side and in harmony with my long work hours, busy family life and supports my clubs overall membership goals. But the system can't stop with the new member initiation, it must carry on as a good sponsor. I can relate to new members being at the summit of the mountain we're trying to climb. However, that's not the destination. We must continue moving forward as a sponsor to develop and grow a new Lion. In the process, we will grow ourselves. The system is a success when a new member becomes a Lion in service to others.

MULTI CLUB WORKDAY **HELPS FELLOW LION**

Several months ago the back deck on PCC Myrna McGee's Bella Vista home collapsed. With the city and her property owners association both on her case to remove the debris. A call to fellow Lions was put out with members from four different clubs

1st QUARTER **CABINET MEETING**

On August 20, 2022, the first quarter district cabinet meeting was held using Zoom. The meeting opened with welcoming comments from District Governor Dean Rowland. The previous meetings minutes were approved as was the final financial report form last year.

The district governor presented this year's budget, going over the details and ex-

plaining his reasonings. It too was approved. CC Don Young and PDG Rene Roberts explained the *FLAG* program, intended to teach youngsters about flag etiquette and respect. The other three district have supported this program. A motion to support the program with a \$350 donation was approved.

DG Dean Rowland then explained his goals for this year. He is asking each club to set membership goals in order to end the year with a 45 member positive gain district wide. One new club by the third quarter is also part of the goal.

According to the district governor, clubs completing service reports is quite low

and has set a goal of 70% of our clubs reporting service this year.

The meeting concluded with reports and comments from the zone chairs, GAT leaders and committee chairs, as well as comments from our vice district governors, Russell Bryan and Bonda Moyer.




Snack Program:

Recognizing the Van Buren Lions Club's 100 Years of Service

HON. JOHN BOOZMAN OF ARKANSAS July 27, 2022

Mr. President, I rise to recognize and congratulate the Van Buren Lions Club as it celebrates 100 years of service to western Arkansas.

The Van Buren Lions Club was chartered on October 10, 1922, only five years after the creation of Lions Club International. Since its founding, its members have committed themselves to making a difference in the lives of people in the community and around the world.

While it began as a club to support local causes and provide networking for businessmen, a larger mission came into focus after Helen Keller spoke at the Lions Club International convention in 1925. She challenged all Lions to be "Knights of the Blind" and her eloquent plea transformed the organization, making support of sight-related programs the group's primary mission.

Throughout its 100-year history, the Van Buren Lions Club has worked tirelessly to make a difference for this cause. It hosts annual fundraisers and works with area eye doctors to recycle glasses, donating them to people who cannot afford them. In addition, members support local eye examination programs as well as the Arkansas Eye Bank and Laboratory, Lions World Services for the Blind, Mid-South Sight and Hearing Service, Leader Dogs for the Blind. Lions Clubs International Foundation. Diabetes Education and Prevention, Sight First and the Lions of Arkansas Foundation.

As an optometrist, I am proud of the great work done by this club and Lions chapters around the world. I congratulate the Van Buren Lions Club on its 100th anniversary and hope these Knights for the Blind continue to prosper in their mission for years to come.
