REACH THE CENTUARY

On August 16, the Van Buren Lions Club will reach and celebrate their 100th year of service. They are only the second club in the district to reach that achievement. The Fort Smith Noon Lions having turned 100 in 2019.

To celebrate it's 100th anniversary, the Van Buren Lions Club is working with the city to create a park where the old police station used to be. Ground-breaking for the park, to be named for former mayor and Lion Gene Bell, was held in late March.

When completed, Gene Bell park will have a playground, picnic tables, benches, landscaping and a walking trail. Everything will be handicapped accessible.

Four other district Lions clubs are nearing that mark. Fayetteville and Russellville will achieve that distinction in 2023. Harrison reaches 100 in 2024 followed by Clarksville in 2025.



Annual District Convention

The annual District 7-I convention was held in late March, hosted by the Russellville Lions Club. The Saturday convention was preceded by the fourth quarter cabinet meeting and a western themed get-together on Friday.

DG Carol Allen made a few opening remarks at the cabinet meeting and previous minutes and the financial reports were given and approved. Early last month, the Arkansas State Lions held their annual convention in Jonesboro, Arkansas. The attendees were made up of members and club officers from all over the state. Special convention guests were International Director John Youney and his wife Lion Karol.

Preceding Saturday's actual convention the Council of Governors held their fourth quarter meeting Friday afternoon. Director Youney spoke to the council about several upcoming items to be discussed at the next directors meeting in Montreal, including the possible dues increase and name change. The Council also accepted bids from different clubs to hold state events for the next several years and Don Young was elected Council Chair for next year.

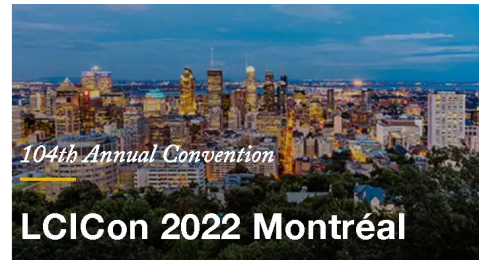

In just a few weeks the Lions Club International convention, the first live convention is several years, will be taking place in Montreal, Canada. This years event will include all the fanfare of past conventions including the parade, business and training, elections, vendors, banquets and more.

Newly elected district governors from around the world will complete their last couple of days of training in Montreal prior to the convention's opening and in a unique ceremony, one of the last sessions of the convention, will be inaugurated to their office by the international president.

The international board of directors will hold a meeting in Montreal also. One proposal, almost sure to pass, is an increase in the international membership dues by \$7 over a three year period starting July 1, 2023. If approved, the increase that year will be \$3 followed by a \$2 increase each of the next two years. Another proposal is to change the name from Lions Club International to simply Lions International.

Election of international officers will be part of the business conducted as part of the convention. If you are planning to attend the convention, you must be appointed by your club as a delegate and register ahead of time with LCI as an appointed delegate. Delegates must be present in Montreal to vote. Incoming and outgoing district governors are considered special delegates and do not count as a club's delegate. If someone in your club will be attending the convention, you may want to go to the LCI website for delegate information.

This year's convention takes place June 24 through June 28.

Gravette sisters, Snooky Garrett and Sue Rice have been fixtures at the Billy V. Hall Senior Activity Center in Gravette for the last twenty years, providing monthly oxy-pulse and blood pressure checks and quarterly blood sugar testing.

Lion Sue spent her thirty-year nursing career in Tulsa while Lion Snooky remained in Gravette working at the local hospital. The hospital, next door to the senior center, would allow Garrett and several others to come over and do health screenings. The hospital closed in 2003, shortly after Rice had retired, returned to Gravette and joined the group. After the hospital closed the sisters continued their monthly screening with the support of a local physician. Four years ago, they joined the Lions and continue the program with Lions Club support.

They screen anywhere between 15 and 25 individuals a month and have suggested several times that an individual should go immediately to the emergency room because of unusually high blood pressure combined with other symptoms. Because of the blood sugar screening, two individuals discovered after following up with their health provider that they had diabetes.

Each month, the sisters have little gifts for participants. This month it was baggies of fresh fruit, other times it may be a ball-point pen with an American flag or maybe a handcrafted marshmallow turkey.

Both Sue and Snooky have been Gravette Lion of the Year and both will be holding their first elected club office next year. Sue is a Melvin Jones Fellow.

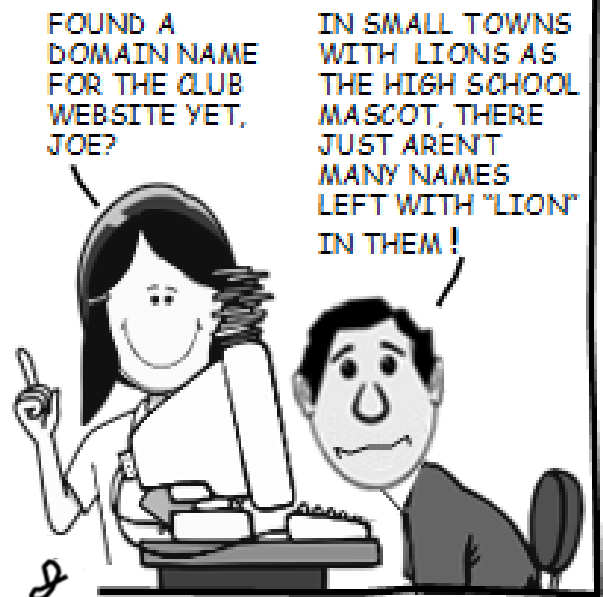
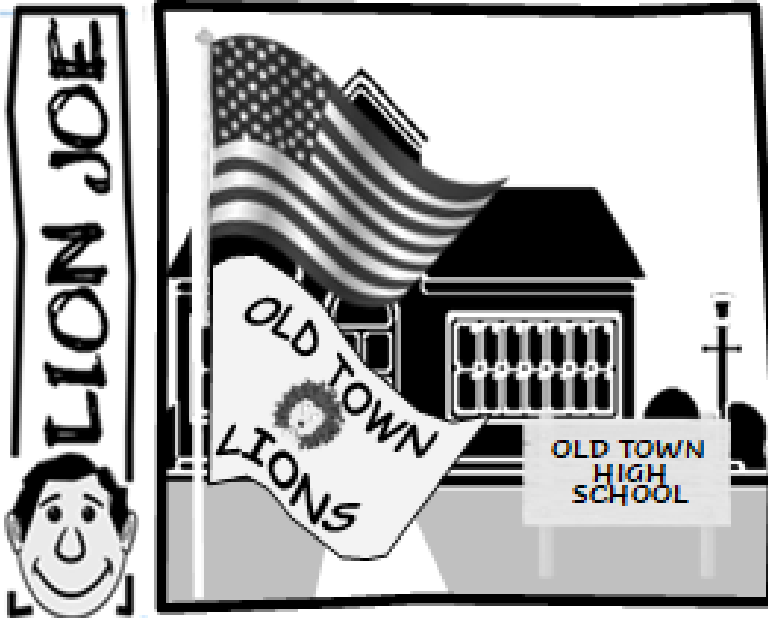
