

collectible coin to celebrate our organization's 100th birthday in 2017. Together, we are close to making the Lions Clubs International Century of Service Commemorative Coin Act a reality.

We're just a few weeks away from the House of Representative's vote on this bill. Because all commemorative coins created by the U.S. Mint require an act of Congress, your support is vital to

this bill's success. The bill requires 290

Representative co-sponsors. To find out if your U.S. Representative supports H.R. 2139, check our map. States shaded blue have 100 percent support for the bill.

Without any cost to taxpayers, the sale of the coin would provide the Lions Clubs International Foundation with \$8 million. Officers Training

A meeting was held at the Finkelstein Auditorium at Nova Southeastern University on Saturday, June 9th for the 13 Zone Chairs. DGE Juan J. Tejera asked all the Chairs to be on the lookout for new faces with fresh ideas

to act as Zone Chairs for next year. He feels it is important to change and get fresh input and move forward to keep clubs active.

A training session for the incoming presidents, secretaries and treasurers started immediately afterward. DGE Juan unveiled to the attendees some of his plan to change how things are done in the District. First, the "Cabinet Meetings" will have a new name. They will now be called District Meetings be-

cause they are not for just the Cabinet, but for *ALL* Lions in the District. He also mentioned that the format for these meetings will be a little different and will be shorter (did I hear a cheer?!). Each meeting will include some sort of training session. Only one or two of the entities will speak at the meeting, but all may have a table outside the meeting room to hand out material or speak one-onone with Lions. The Zone Chair reports, flyers, etc. will be included in a booklet, which will be given to everyone in attendance.

The Zone Chairs will see some changes too. They will now be able to view the Club Health Assessment and Recap of Accounts reports so they know how the clubs in their Zone is doing both financially and membership wise. This will help them to help struggling clubs.

The District is about to launch their own website, which include the District calendar, District roster (in abbreviated form), District newsletter and other important information. The link will be posted soon. He is also working on a District phone number, and Facebook page.

DGE Juan explained that we are now entering the third year of our new District format, which he calls the year to "focus." The first year was the year of implementation—never

easy, lots of resistance, challenging, and similar to a company merger. The second year is a "getting to know you" year when Lions are beginning to realize that we are all good people doing good things for the community, but some just do things a little differently. The third year is the time to refocus on objectives and work together. He issued a challenge to everyone there to become service clubs again for our communities.

PDG Richard Vidal, training coordinator, went over some of the resources available online to all Lions, including Webinars. (For those of you who are not familiar with that term, they are actual seminars that are filmed and you can view them over the internet.) Lions can now pay online for supplies and even your dues!

And speaking of dues, just a reminder that International dues have gone up slightly.

DGE Juan emphasized that he is open to suggestions and comments (good or bad!). If you see something that you think can be done better (or easier), he asks that you don't complain to other—tell him! There's always ways to streamline things and make them better for everyone. We are all about helping one another and the community. Together, we can do anything!

If you are a chair, you will be asked to provide a short article for the District newsletter. This will keep everyone informed with what's going on in the District and/or your entity. Thanks for your help.

Dear Fellow Lions,



Proper Disposal of Medicines



Proper disposal of prescription and over the counter medications is very important. Flushing them down the toilet or sink can introduce dangerous and environmentally damaging substances into the water system. Throwing them in the trash can also introduce them into the environment and runs the risk of them winding up in the wrong hands.

Look for insurance-based or county disposal programs or ask your pharmacist to dispose of them for you. Take precautions to bring your medications in the prescription bottle to show proof the prescription is legitimately theirs. Technically, it is illegal to carry prescription medications around without proof it is prescribed to you.

Let's keep the environment safe!

When Preparing for a Hurricane...

Don't forget about your medications and first aid items. Most of us know to stock up on food, water and batteries, but we forget about the medicine cabinet items.

At a minimum, you should have the following stored in a watertight container:

Band-aids (assorted sizes)
Adhesive cloth tape
3" gaze pads
Gloves
Antiseptic wipes
Antibiotic ointment
Rubbing alcohol
Hydrogen peroxide
Scissors

Tweezers
Pain medications
Allergy medications
Antacids
Burn ointment

First aid kits are important after a storm due to injuries caused during the clean up efforts.

Beware of heat exhaustion and heat stroke. On average, you should drink one quart of water per hour if you are outside working in the heat and sun. That's a lot of water! Most people don't drink one quarter per day!!
