INVOLVE A U.S. VETERAN PROGRAM

Ask now! The program is available to the first 5,000 certified U.S. veterans and runs from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2015 (two years). Qualifying veterans receive an entrance or charter fee waiver when joining a Lions club. Eligible veterans include retired U.S. military personnel (i.e. Air Force, Army, Coast Guard Services, Marines, National Guard, Navy or Reserves) or those honorably-discharged from these services. Eligible persons may still be enlisted in the National Guard or Reserves. Veterans can be certified by completion of the Involve a <u>U.S. Veteran Program Certification Form</u>. Clubs will receive a credit for the entrance or charter fee once the certification form has been approved by LCI. Instructions are on the Certification Form.

HOLIDAY MAIL FOR HEROS

Each year the Red Cross collects cards and distributes them at military installations, veterans hospitals, and other locations. Every card received will be screened for hazardous materials and then reviewed by Red Cross volunteers working around the country. Please observe the following guidelines:

Ensure that all cards are signed and Use generic salutations such as "Dear Service Member." Cards addressed to specific individuals can not be delivered through this program.

Only cards are being accepted. Do not send or include letters.

Do not include email or home addresses on the cards: the program is not meant to foster pen pals.

Do not include inserts of any kind, including photos: these items will be removed.

Please refrain from choosing cards with glitter or using loose glitter.

If you are mailing a large quantity of cards, please bundle them and place them in large mailing envelopes or flat rate postal shipping boxes. Each card does not need its own envelope.

HOW TO SUBMIT YOUR CLUB ACTIVITY/NEWS TO THE MD35 MAGAZINE

News stories, photos and other information are accepted from all MD 35 Lions Cubs and are used as space permits. MD35 official activities and articles have first priority should space for any publication become an issue. The magazine is a 24 page publication. Photos and stories will be used only if the quality and content are suitable. Do not submit anything by fax machine.

PHOTOGRAPHS: Only send one picture or two at most per article. The editors like to see pictures of lions in action, rather than posed pictures.

- •Photos must be of high quality; at least 500K, but the bigger the file size the better the quality.
- •Photographs must be clear and in focus; photos that are too dark or washed out will not get used.
- •Identification of all Lions in photos must be included.
- •E-mail color photographs as JPEG attachments.
- •Prints must be mailed on high quality photo paper (no plain paper). Do not send negatives or slides.
- •All photographs submitted become the property of the MD35 Lions Magazine.

ARTICLES: Submit your articles ready to be published.

- •Articles must be written in the third person (do not use "we" or "I") and remember that your audience is the entire state of Florida & the Bahamas.
- •Articles must be submitted as plain text typed in the body of an e-mail or as a Microsoft Word attachment with a .doc or .docx file extension.
- •Round all dollar amount to the nearest whole dollar and check for spelling and grammatical errors.
- Don't forget to Include your contact name and phone number.
- •Make sure you identify all Lions in any photos that are submitted.

Lastly, pictures and articles tend to show up in the magazine from two – four months after you submit them, so be patient and don't wait to see your article in print before you submit your next one. Deadlines for future issues are posted on the inside cover of the magazine.

LCIF DONATING \$500,000 TO RELIEF EFFORTS IN PHILIPPINES

Oak Brook, IL, Nov. 11, 2013 – LCI has mobilized \$500,000 through its foundation for relief efforts in the Philippines in the wake of Typhoon Haiyan. On Friday, November 8th, as early reports of the destruction filtered in from hard hit areas of the Philippines, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) made \$130,000 available to Philippine Lions to provide immediate relief. That amount increased to \$500,000 through donations from Lions Clubs members in neighboring countries and around the world.

When the typhoon struck, LCIF Chairperson Wayne Madden was in Singapore attending a regional Lions leadership conference, which included Lions from the Philippines and other East Asian countries. Within one hour, attending Lions had raised \$370,000 earmarked for disaster relief in the Philippines.

"I am humbled by the generous support of our Lions," said Chairperson Madden, of Auburn, Indiana. "We are now focused on mobilizing our relief efforts and working with local agencies to assess the greatest need in the short-term. Our motto is 'we serve' and that's exactly what we intend to do for the people in the Philippines."

More than 12,000 Lions members in the Philippines will work with government officials and other agencies to send food, water and other supplies to the disaster area. Lions will base their local support operations in Cebu. Anyone wishing to contribute to disaster relief efforts may donate to LCIF's disaster relief fund. This note is from a Camp Mom: "This was our first year coming to camp and I can't say how wonderful it has been for our son! He has come back as a different child. He is now much more responsible managing his diabetes and seems to have so much more hope for the future than before. It proved to him the great quality of life he can have when he chooses to take care of himself. He told me that camp felt... like family and he belonged. The first night home from camp he said "Mom, I can't believe I would ever say this, but I'm glad I'm diabetic so I can belong to such a great group of people and go to a camp that makes me feel so special!" 
