I am still learning about the App and cannot give you information on using it at this point, but our District will provide training in the near future. There is much excitement about this being useful for our clubs and members. Another part of technology we all must face is using email and the Internet to communicate and receive information. All Lions should have an updated working email listed with their Lions profile on the MY LCI site. I recently tried to send an email to all Presidents in our District, and unfortunately, there were 13 clubs whose Presidents did not have an active email. Your District communicates to you with your e-mail, the District Website, Facebook and a digital magazine. Even if your President doesn't use email, an active email should be listed with a person that gets the information to your club in a timely matter. Please make sure all your members have access to an email address so they can be receiving the information they need to succeed.

For training from LCI, I also noticed it is in the process of being changed some and it is not clear yet where to direct you for online training. As we receive more information, we will pass this on.

Lastly, I hope to see you in a couple days as our District Governor "Tito" and his wife and partner in service, Miriam, host a great Council of Governors Conference in Orlando with a nice list of seminars and learning classes. See you there.

So, let's examine every stage of one's Lionistic career and how I can help. The first stage is becoming a new member. When I became a new member 43 years ago, I suddenly felt as if I had left my hometown and become a man of the world. This year, I want every member to download our new mobile app. This will connect all our members on one global platform.

The next stage is beginning to serve. As a member of the Batala Smile Lions Club in Punjab, India, I was proud of how the community began to respect me. This respect depended on the number of people I served and how many people were aware of this service. We now have a new Global Service Team. Your District GST leader will identify projects that serve the maximum number of people per dollar and per hour. The last stage is now. I want to give every Lion the same goal for the next 12 months. My dream is that every Lion will serve 10 people each month. If this happens, we will serve 170 million people this year—a big increase from our current level of 100 million and a big step toward our goal of serving 200 million annually by 2020. This is the focus of all my meetings around the world.

Phishing Protection for Lions

At Lions Clubs International, we pride ourselves in service to others. Our efforts bring notoriety and respect from communities worldwide. Unfortunately, this notoriety can also attract individuals that misrepresent themselves in order to gain access to personal or financial information. When individuals use the internet or phone to commit this type of fraud it is commonly known as "phishing."

LCI systems are password protected for your safety, and restrict access to personal information including email addresses and phone numbers. Outside of our LCI systems, Club information is widely known in our local communities through the media or non-LCI websites, and it is quite easy to obtain. This visibility also increases the chance of being contacted by a phisher.

To protect yourself, your club, and the Association from phishing:

- As a general practice when receiving unsolicited emails, do not follow embedded links in emails, especially if there is any mention of updating credit card information, personal data, PIN numbers, or passwords. Delete these emails immediately.
- If you should be redirected to a website, verify that the URL address starts with https://. The single letter S after http indicates that it is a secure site, and is likely legitimate. If the URL is not secure, close your browser immediately.
- If contacted by another club member or the Association Headquarters via email, mobile text message or social media, and there is a request for financial assistance, wire transfer, etc. do not reply to the message. Contact the club member or Association staff separately via email, phone, or through the MyLCI Communications Center to validate that the request is legitimate.
- Always use virus protection software on your PC or MAC.
- Exercise caution when using public Wi-Fi systems in a coffee house, restaurant, or internet café. These public systems offer no protection from unauthorized fraudulent monitoring.
- Create strong passwords for your email, social media and other online accounts, and update your passwords often.
 - Never store passwords, banking information, or credit card numbers in your email.



Beware of phishing scams. Don't take the bait! Be suspicious of anyone that asks for your personal information.

My PTSD is from military sexual trauma. It's important to me that people know that because it's so huge. So many women have suffered from it. Having a dog has made such a difference for me this last year, and Suriel will help make it easier in the future. I'm just really, really thankful for everybody at Southeastern Guide Dogs.

Suriel has been hanging out with me a lot and has been so loving and caring. Having somebody by my side has helped me already. Just being a comforter that I can love on and rub her ears when I start being really anxious. I can take out some of my stress on that. Not very many people will let you hug them for very long but I can hug Suriel for as long as I want to!

My husband is a late shift police officer. I can cuddle with Suriel when he doesn't get home until midnight. I live daily with paranoia—listening at doors and windows—so I rely heavily on my dog to let me know if somebody's there, especially when I'm taking a bath or shower. If my dog is calm, then I know that what I'm hearing isn't really there. That is a huge comfort for me. If I am panicking, she will be a great asset.

Serving those who cannot see and those who have seen too much.

When people lose vision, it's easy to lose hope. When veterans lose hope, it's easy to give up. It's easy to let the darkness define life instead of living life to its fullest. That's why we develop extraordinary partnerships between our dogs and the people who need them, and offer our dogs and services at no cost.
