Skills leaders need to succeed 2017 and beyond.

Take your leadership from good to great by focusing on these key skills every day.

Earlier this year, leadership development consultants Jack Zenger and Joseph Folkman published the results of a study they conducted on the skills that leaders need to succeed in their current positions. They asked more than 330,000 bosses, peers, and subordinates to rank the top four competencies from a list of 16 key leadership skills. After working through the results, Zenger and Folkman came up with a ranking of the leadership skills that are most important for success. Here are some examples.

Start by inspiring and motivating others, create a vision of the future that is vivid and compelling, and motivate your teams to want to achieve it. Everyone wants to work on projects that make a difference in the world. As a leader, you are best able to help the members of your team connect what they do to the impact it has on customers and communities.

Perform everything you do showing high integrity and honesty. Great leaders are honest and transparent, and have high integrity--they do what they say they are going to do, and they walk their talk. Provide answers to every question your members have. That doesn't mean they're going to like the answers. But it's going to be truthful, and I know they can deal with the truth. This might create additional questions, but we'll get through them. And we should.

Solve problems and analyze issues at the lowest level possible. Since leaders are recruited, trained, and chosen to solve organizational problems, and to take advantage of opportunities. This requires not only excellent analytical abilities, but also above-average people skills.

Drive to obtain results. Some people are happy to sit back and watch the world go by, while others aren't unless they are making things happen in their organizations. Great leaders have a higher level of perseverance, stick-to-itiveness, and drive than most anyone else, and they can be counted on to get things done.

Communicate powerfully and prolifically their people often, and in a variety of different ways. Whether it's by means of one-on-one conversations, team meetings, email messages, phone or video conference calls, or any other such medium, leaders don't talk about communicating--they just do it.

Builds relationships on a solid foundation of relationships and trust. Without these two things, you can't have a business, or at least not a successful business. Take time every day to build relationships with the members of your team, your customers and partners, those above you and with you in your community. The stronger your relationships, the better a leader you will be.

Above all, develops others. Just as they work to continuously develop and build their own technical and professional expertise, the best leaders set aside time (and money in their budgets) to develop their work force. They look for the most promising person, and provide them with the training they need to become their company's next generation of great leaders.

With that in mind, I would like to remind you that our GLT/GMT Team is doing everything possible to bring Leadership Training to our backyard. Do not miss the opportunity to build your skills. Let's forge ahead and continue serving our communities, because working together we serve better.

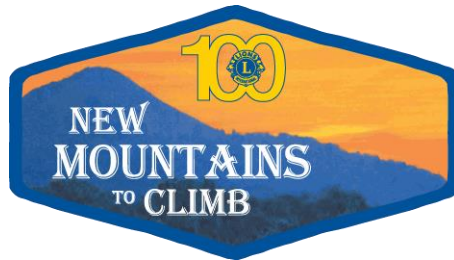


Dear Lion,

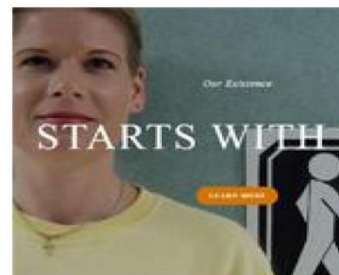

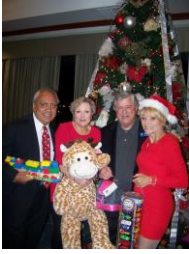

GRANT MATEO WINS LOCAL COMPETITION IN LIONS INTERNATIONAL PEACE POSTER CONTEST

Grant Mateo, a 7th grade student at St. Brendan's Elementary School in Ormond Beach, has taken the first step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by winning a local competition sponsored by the Ormond By the Sea Lions Club. Mateo's poster was among more than 450,000 entries submitted worldwide in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the program to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere.

"Faith and love cleanse the earth of all evil and sin, as all different cultures celebrate a peaceful world" the 12-year-old from Ormond Beach said. The poster was selected by Judges Ormond By the Sea Lions Peggy Bull, Katie Hamlin and Chasity Dietlin for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the contest theme, "A Celebration of Peace." The judging was held at the school.

Ormond By the Sea Lions Club President Bobbie Cheh said she was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students at St. Brendan's School. "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions."

Mateo's poster will advance through the district, multiple district and international levels of competition if he is to be declared the international grand prize winner," Lion Bobbie said. One international grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners will be selected. The grand prize includes a cash award of \$5,000.00 plus a trip for the winner and two family members to a special award ceremony. The 23 merit award winners will each receive a certificate and a cash award of \$500.00. "Our club is cheering for Grant as his poster advances in the competition, and we hope that his vision will ultimately be shared with others around the world," Lion Cheh said.

Locally, third place winner Emma Tiplady, second place winner Flynn Baliton and First Place winner Grant Mateo were honored for their participation by the Ormond By the Sea Lions Club on at an assembly at St. Brendan's School.
