

Inspiring Your Club
Members Into Action.

Inspiration is an important part of any volunteer's journey. It's what makes people want to give back to their community and what motivates them to stick around, week

after week, giving their time, energy and skills to a good cause. As its title suggests, this message is all about inspiring action.

A common theme across all workshops, panels, discussion groups, clubs, and zone meetings should be about 'Inspiring Action'—how to get volunteers interested, keep them motivated and make sure you have a dedicated, driven team. In the months to come we would delve into this topic a little deeper, but to get you thinking about inspiring action in your volunteer Lions program, let's take a closer look at what can be done in the meantime.

Tell the Volunteer Story - Nothing is more inspiring than hearing about regular people doing amazing things. Learning about your current volunteers' impact can help potential volunteers picture themselves in the role and gain confidence in their ability to have an impact in your organization. Share your examples of inspirational

volunteer spotlights.

The Mission is the Message - Volunteer programs should have a mission-based approach. That means that all of our volunteer positions should be clearly linked to our organization's mission, so that volunteers can easily see how they're making a difference and helping others.

Share Volunteer Impact - The best way to make sure that initial inspiration doesn't quickly fade once volunteers are faced with the realities of their work is to share with them the impact of the role. Make sure you track volunteer contributions and measure program outcomes to be able to tell volunteers exactly what it is they're helping you accomplish.

The common thread among these three inspiration strategies is that volunteering—freely giving your time to benefit people who need your help—is inspirational in and of self. Highlighting that through volunteer stories, mission-based roles and volunteer impact statements can help people understand how valuable volunteering can be, for themselves and for their communities.

For me, nothing is more satisfying that visiting a Zone meeting and to hear clubs accomplishments toward their communities. Please continue to share your success stories with your Zone Chairs and keep posting those Lions International Service Reports, for only then the world would know your successes.

For the majority of our organizations existence we have been "Knights For The Blind" with a major emphasis on eye care and prevention of blindness. Most of us can only imagine what

it means to be blind but we know we don't want to go there! We do glucose and retina testing to help prevent others from going there! We test children's eyes and we provide eye glasses. We do lots of things for others. But are you taking care of your own eyes like you should?

This week I've experienced how loss of sight from just one eye impacts everything you do even when it's *temporary*! In my case the chicken pox virus hid quietly for over 50 years! This week it showed it's ugly side --- shingles! The same virus the second time around. Although it can appear in various places mine is located in my right eye and on the right side of my face.

I'm guilty of the "It can't happen to me!"
mentality! (If you are too you'll know
because your head is now nodding up and
down and you're hoping no one is noticing!)
Sure, I'd heard about shingles. I'd even
heard there was a vaccine to prevent them.
But what I didn't know was it can occur in
your eye and if not treated quickly enough
can cause permanent nerve pain or yes -even blindness!

But this is about YOU! Are you taking care of your own eyes? Are you having regular check-ups? Are you wearing safety glasses

when you do anything, including spring cleaning, that could send foreign particles or chemicals into your eyes? Are you wearing sunglasses out in the bright Florida sun? Are you doing everything you can for yourself to prevent diseases that can cause blindness? How about your community? Has your club invited an eye doctors to come in and speak about what everyone can do to take care of their eyes? Prevention is important! Did you invite the public to hear?

Spring is a time for renewal ---let's all renew our "Knights of the Blind" pledge and this time let's include taking care of everyone's eyes --ours and our fellow Lions included!


