The Importance of Meeting Attendance

Probably every Lion who has tried to recruit a new member has at one time or another been rebuffed by someone saying they can't fulfill the meeting attendance requirement. And can anyone even count the number of Lions expelled for failing to attend the minimum number of meetings?

A speaker at the May 2016 Lions of Florida and the Bahamas Convention in Orlando, FL asked his audience a simple but intriguing question that has haunted me ever since: "Why is a service organization like Lions so

obsessed with meeting attendance (his observation)? District 35 O PDG Carlos Ubiñas, a member of the MD-35 PDG force and my mentor, once mentioned to me semi tongue-in-cheek:

"Ah, attendance.... I look at it like a fence intended to keep people in. How many customers do we treat that way?" A central tenet of District 35 O's is that member engagement in the club and its activities and programs is more important than meeting attendance. By "engagement" we mean that a member is committed to one or more of the club's programs or activities as evidenced by his or her participation or monetary support – an investment of time, talent or treasure.

I believe good meeting attendance – if not perfect attendance – is important and a noble goal. It builds goodwill and better friendships and is beneficial to all concerned. I just happen to think that Lions should attend meetings because they want to and are attracted there – by friends, fun and fellowship – not because we beat them over a head with a rulebook! Meeting attendance is an important statistic for club leaders; it shows how much members enjoy the club and the meetings. Poor attendance should not be met with expulsion from a club. I don't think any Lions should ever be dismissed from a Lions Club for poor attendance. Instead I think Club leaders should reach out to

members with poor attendance to find out why and ask about a members' lack of interest before it becomes habitual. A useful question to ask a non-attending member is this: "what is the club not providing to you that it should be?"

It is true that members sometimes have business or family obligations that make meeting attendance difficult. But Lions makes at least four very important tools available to clubs to help members with struggling attendance. The first is leaves of absence, which can be given at the board's discretion. The second is make-ups at another club. The third is use of online Lions meetings. And the fourth is the discretion of the board to count participation in any club activity, committee meeting, service project etc. as meeting attendance. In fact, I would suggest it is that fourth factor that is the true heart and soul of a Lions club.

A well-run Lions club has meetings and events that members attend because they want to, not because they have to. They participate because they want to spend time with their friends, because the meetings are fun, because of good programs, or especially because they know they will be greeted warmly and made to feel welcome – which is increasingly unusual in our impersonal computer based world! Most clubs tend to point fingers at non-attending Lions as "bad Lions." I see clubs with poor attendance as not understanding and not giving the members what they want. And that is something clubs must recognize and fix!

Every Lion I know is very busy, with work, family demands and stresses that can be all consuming. But I have found this to be true – Lions who feel they are getting value from their membership find time for Lions meetings and activities. It means something important enough to them to balance out their activities. But those who don't see value from their membership let the other things crowd Lions out. It's not surprising – we all do the same thing with all of life's activities.

Club leaders – yes, pay attention to membership records, use them to assess the club, not condemn the Lion. And then have the courage to make the changes that the members want and will make them raving fans of the Club and all its meetings and activities. Meetings, in a not too distant future, may be history in Lions. If that does happen, is your club attractive enough – is it fun, does it provide value to members – to keep members coming to meetings?




District 35-O Lions

One of the highlights of being a 1st Vice District Governor is the invitation to Leader Dogs for the Blind. Every summer Leader Dog invites all the 1st Vices from all over the country to come visit their campus and learn about their program. It's a quick trip; fly in Thursday, fly home Saturday, and it is very intense. We are all familiar with Guide Dog programs, but each one is unique.

Leader Dogs for the Blind was started in 1938 by 3 Lions. Today's campus operates on the same property where their first graduation was held. In the

past 78 years, they have placed more than 15,000 dogs.



and are offered to those who are legally blind or both deaf and blind. The deaf and blind program is a small portion of their clients. The clients live in dorm like rooms, receiving their dog on the 2^{nd} day of the training program. The training is intended to provide not only instruction and evaluation, but time for the team to bond. There are many services and support offered to the clients after they are home. LDB also offers their program to people as young as 16 and have many



college freshmen heading off to campus with their Guide Dogs this year.

LDB also offers Accelerated Orientation and Mobility (O&M) Training which works with them on white cane training. This training is sometimes the first step to qualifying for a guide dog. It is very individualized to the clients living situation.

New technology has brought training with GPS technology. Specialized equipment is available along with the training. These advances enhance independence in both white cane and Guide Dog users.

And last, LDB offers Summer Experience Camp for 16 and 17-year olds who are legally blind.

I know we all have a fondness for "our" Guide Dog program, but with more than 220,000 blind people in this country, no one program could help all of them. So please keep Leader Dogs for the Blind in mind as you prepare you budgets this year. And please visit their website for fundraising and donating ideas.

Lions Clubs Code of Ethics

- **To Seek** success and to demand all fair remuneration or profit as my just due, but to accept no profit or success at the price of my own self-respect lost because of unfair advantage taken or because of questionable acts on my part.
- **To Remember** that in building up my business it is not necessary to tear down another's; to be loyal to my clients or customers and true to myself.
- Whenever a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself.
- **To Hold** friendship as an end and not a means. To hold that true friendship exists not on account of the service performed by one to another, but that true friendship demands nothing but accepts service in the spirit in which it is given.
- Always to bear in mind my obligations as a citizen to my nation, my state, and my community, and to give them my unswerving loyalty in word, act, and deed. To give them freely of my time, labor and means.
- To Aid others by giving my sympathy to those in distress, my aid to the weak, and my substance to the needy.
- **To Be Careful** with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and not destroy.

Notes from Donna (Cabínet Secretary)

Service Activity Reporting

As of this writing, twenty-five (25) clubs have reported service activities since July 1, 2017. Thirty-one (31) clubs have not reported any activity.

International President Naresh Aggarwal's dream for this year is that every Lion will serve 10 people each month. If this happens, we will serve 170 million people this year— a big increase from our current level of 100 million and a big step toward the goal of serving 200 million annually by 2020.



The only official recorded measurement of activity that counts towards this goal is service activity reporting using MyLCI. Members of our District can work very hard to accomplish the goal but without reporting, while it's still good and important work, it isn't being counted. If your club needs MyLCI training please ask!

There are probably as many reasons for not reporting as there are clubs that haven't done so but I venture to guess that we have unreported good deeds! For every reason, there is a solution. There is still time to catch-up. MyLCI allows reporting service activity for three months back. Catch-up now and make it a goal to report monthly going forward.

Secretaries can only report activity they are aware of. If that's the problem here are a couple ideas: 1) Pass out index cards at the second meeting of each month to each member to write down their activity & hours. Or 2), simply pass around a sheet of paper for each member to add their activity since the last reporting. Everyone has a role to play in Service Activity reporting.

And don't forget Centennial Service Challenge and Community Legacy Project reporting. A tutorial covering how to report these type activities can be found here. (http://www.Lionsclubs.org/resources/EN/pdfs/Lions100/steps-to-reporting-centennialactivities.pdf)

Let's strive as a District for 100% Service Activity reporting in 2017-2018.

Cabinet Treasurer Ríta Talks Money

Without Cash, you can't provide the programs and services that your Lions Club is designed to provide.

Are you raising enough funds? If not, checkout these ideas:

• **Company matching gifts.** Some corporations will match the charitable donations you make. That will double the amount of money you are able to give to your Lions Club.



- Try new ways to raise funds
 - **Hold a carnival.** You can run a carnival at a park or on the street, if you contact the city and pay a certain amount. However, you may also get a church building or other large community building to donate space if they also believe in the charity.
 - **Have a competition.** You can hold a competition for anything. Get someone to donate prizes, and have each person pay an entry fee (the part that raises money).
 - Try endurance competitions. That is, you can have dance-a-thons, walk-a-thons, or any other kind of marathon competition you can think of. People pay to enter. Don't forget to have prizes for the winners.
 - **Hold an auction.** Ask people to donate items or services to be raffled off. You can have an in-person event or set up an event online. Make it clear that the profit from all of the donations (minus any shipping costs if you're holding it online) will go to the Lions Club.
- Use the Internet by trying fundraising sites. Many websites are available to let you raise money. For instance, you can use Just Giving or Go Fund Me. These sites let you set a certain goal, and then you can invite your friends and family to donate. However, sometimes these sites will not give you the money if you don't reach your goal, so don't aim too high at first; you can always set a new goal if you reach your first one.
 - **Employ social media.** Once you set up any kind of campaign or event, you have to advertise your event. One of the easiest, cost-effective ways to do that is to post your campaign on social media sites you use, such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and Tumblr. These sites will help you reach out to your friends and family, who can then pass on your fundraiser to their friends, and so on. If you're lucky, your fundraiser will be passed on too many people willing to help. Don't forget to include why you're fundraising. Create a story that shows why you are passionate about it and why other people should be, too. Remember to make your posts public, though, so that they can be shared by your friends.

Keep the posts coming. It's not enough to post about it once and forget it. You need to keep in contact with the people who can help you raise money. Try posting videos of how your event is coming along to help get people excited.

• **Pay attention to sites that offer charitable donations.** For instance, Amazon Smile lets you pick a charity you want to donate to. Then, every time you make a purchase through the site, the company donates a percentage of that to your charity. Other sites offer similar programs.

Tips

Inspire donors. People will not donate money unless they believe in the cause. In any fundraising activity, clearly state your vision and why people should join you in this cause.

Be honest. If you are raffling off a \$10 gift certificate to Denny's, don't advertise a glamorous evening out for two.

Say thank you. If people donate anything, thank them profusely. If they don't donate, thank them for their time. They may donate next time.

Warnings

Don't take a "no" personally. Some people can't give, some don't want to. Either way, it is not a personal attack on you or your organization.

The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness




For more than 15 years, LCIF's SightFirst program and the World Health Organization (WHO) have partnered to serve more than 127 milLion children by working to eliminate avoidable childhood blindness. The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness is an initiative that began in 2001. Since then, 51 Child Friendly Eye Care Centers have been established and supported in 50 countries within Africa, the Americas, the Eastern Mediterranean, Europe, Southeast Asia, and the Western Pacific. The centers provide preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative eye care services for children aged 0-15 years. To date, more than 67,000 pediatric eye care staff have been trained, more than 13 milLion children have been screened for eye diseases, and more than 127 milLion children have received treatment. There have also been nearly one milLion education sessions for parents, caregivers and healthcare staff. Because of your donations to LCIF, milLions of children have been given the chance to avoid childhood blindness.

Club LCIF Coordinators Position Update



The <u>Club LCIF Coordinator</u> is an ambassador for LCIF at the club level and is crucial to the promotion of our foundation. This person shares LCIF stories, motivates fellow Lions to support LCIF, and enables LCIF to advance its humanitarian work both locally and globally. Club LCIF Coordinators will be equipped with resources that will allow them to champion the goals of the foundation to Lions.

A new policy has been put into effect to help fill this vital role at the club level. In addition to serving as mentors to the club president and vice presidents, immediate past club presidents will now serve as Club LCIF Coordinators. If he or she is unable to serve in this capacity, the position may be filled by another club member.

Chris has always struggled with vision loss. Then while he was young, he was also diagnosed with the hereditary retinitis pigmentosa (RP), causing his vision to grow progressively worse. "With RP, life is always changing," he says.

It was Chris's parents who first encouraged him to come to Southeastern Guide Dogs. "I was a 'goer'—always on the go—and my parents thought I'd be more secure if I had a companion to go with me," he says. Kathleen helps him maintain his active lifestyle. "Being able to go to work day by day, to go shopping, to do it by yourself, that's the reason you get a dog.

It's the freedom of having independence."

You know you're a busy parent when you're asked if you have any hobbies and the answer is, "Raising two kids!" Chris Chaffin's active teenagers keep this family on the go, not to mention his challenging job of managing the financial aid office for the local technical school in Plattsburgh, NY. That's why his fourth guide dog, a sweetheart named Kathleen, has her work cut out

for her in keeping up with Chris. His previous guides, Trooper, Bonnie, and Hannah, have helped him navigate for many years, and now it's Kathleen's turn.

ADAPTIVE TECHNOLOGY DONATION

Ginny Black, 1st VDG, Helene Thompson's Partner in Service, and member of the Satellite Beach Lions Club, recently made a very gracious donation to The Conklin Center. The donation was one of adaptive technology, a device which is called *Cyber Eyez*.

Cyber Eyez is an application for smart glasses that enables users with low vision and blindness to be more independent in a sighted world. Users can experience their world and get things done efficiently and independently.

By using a high definition camera and an optical character recognition engine, *Cyber Eyez* provides highly accurate text recognition. Wearers can have any text read to them in real time with no internet connection while still maintaining privacy. It can recognize bar codes to provide product information, and it recognizes colors, telling a totally blind person what color they're looking at.

The device retails for about \$2K. Often, a CCTV magnifier alone would cost more than that, and Cyber Eyez houses very sophisticated technology and puts it into the reach of blind people.

Project Right-To-Sight and The Ocoee Lions Club Foundation, Inc Need Your Help to Fund a New Facility

The sixty-eight-year-old Project Right-To-Sight and the Ocoee Lions Club oversee hundreds of thousands of pairs of glasses coming through the Ocoee facility each year. Eighty five percent (85%) of the glasses collected in FL by FL Lions go through this warehouse to be used in local communities as well as around the world. The Lions Community Eye Clinic is currently held monthly in an Orange County medical clinic. This clinic is multi-use making operating an eye clinic there challenging. While historic, the 'train depot' facility is too old for the Ocoee Lions to repair to bring it up to code and insure. A century of service has taken its toll on the old buildings. Plans for a new facility include a new Eye Clinic that can help significantly more people in need than the current clinic. Space, all on one level, will make it easier for people at PRTS to work. A new facility will enable the Ocoee Lions to offer the space for rent for events such as parties and wedding receptions. It will also provide a venue for the Ocoee Lions Club to hold meetings and host pancake breakfasts, fish fries, and other community-based fundraising events replacing fundraisers that have become outdated and are no longer viable due to urban growth in the area. The rental income will provide funds for support and maintenance of the new building.

LAKE SUMTER LIONS CLUB

It was a bustling day on that Saturday, August 5, 2017, at the Back to School Fair at John H. Bridges Community Center in Apopka, Florida. People everywhere.

It was an annual event hosted by Orange County District 2 Commissioner Bryan Nelson. Lake Sumter Lions Club was invited by Commissioner Nelson to do KidSight vision screening at the event. Our actual screening time was 3 hours. In this 3-hour period, 124 children were screened – of which 94 passed (indicating no problems), 26 were referred (indicating some problem detected), and 4 were inclusive. There were also some adults who requested screening, and we obliged. Members working this event were Lions Ralph Long, Chuck LeGare, Jon Joel, John Hanna, Doris Brennan, Esther Tranby, Carol Dargis, Diana Zahorak.

The children were very cooperative, and the parents were thankful that the service was available to them.

During the Lions year 2016-2017, the Lake Sumter Lions Club KidSight Team has screened at 43 sites totaling 2,041 children, with 1,685 passing, 245 referred, and 11 unable to be screened. Since July 1, 2017 our team has visited 18 sites totaling 403 children, with 334 passing, 62 referred and 7 unable to be screened. A "refer" vision screening result indicates that one or more readings are at or above referral thresholds. These referred individuals must be sent to an eye care professional for a comprehensive eye exam.

We started with a single PlusOptix camera and it soon became apparent that another camera would be necessary. So, we went about raising funds for a second camera, and promptly put it to use. In July of this year 10 Lake Sumter Lions KidSight screeners and assistants screened 222 children at 10 different locations identifying 10 children referred to KidSight.

Our KidSight teams go to venues small and large; The Villages Charter schools, day cares, preschools, summer library programs, summer camps, Headstart locations, Episcopal Children's Services locations, wherever the need is. Our screening schedules consist of invitations, referrals, and our KidSight Team making cold calls introducing the service to various venues.




