The 2022 District 46 Annual Convention has come and gone. It was a rousing success; I believe a good time was had by all who attended. Personally I met a lot of Lions from around the state and even locally that I hadn't met before. I truly enjoyed the time I spent chatting with everyone.

First Night. Thursday April 28. Worldwide Induction of Lions that joined in 2022-2022 was held prior to the LV Aviators vs Tacoma Rainers ballgame. Local Newsman and Honorary Lion Nathan Tannenbaum read a Proclamation from Las Vegas Mayor Carolyn Goodman Proclaiing the day as Lions Day in Nevada. DG Rex Velasquez inducted the new members who were then greeted and congratulated by ID Ken Ibarra and PID Jack Epperson.

Friday 4/29 First Cabinet Meeting Session. Weekend Fine Free Badge was won by DG Rex Velasquez for \$300. DG Rex presented FL Kristen a shirt emblazoned: "First Lady". Cabinet Meeting roll call at 10 am. Comittee Report Summaries: Budget and Finance - \$2,000 request by Women's Leadership Chair Lion Babs Cronin was approved. A registration fee will be required for upcoming retreat.

Constitution and By-Laws - Convention Management committee consisting of 3 members for 3-year terms will be voted on. Current Convention management approved proposal.

District 46 Foundation Committee - Pin design accepted; for donation of \$250 to the Foundation. Donate in increments of \$250 up to \$1,000 to recieve a plaque. Two new Directors were chosen : Lion Don Watson and Lion Paul Silva. PCC Tim Rubald accepted the position of Secretary to the Foundation. **Student Speaker Contest Committee** - Materials for upcoming contest will be in digital format. One book given to each club. Topic for next year will be "How can America find Unity during polarizing times."

First Convention Session. Call to order by DG Rex Velasquez. Convention Committee Co-Chairs Lion Marie Stamatolates and Lion Jim Egloff welcomed attendees. Honorary LV Summerlin Lion Nate Tannenbaum was introduced. DG Rex introduces PID Jack Epperson, who then introduces ID Ken Ibarra and Lion Amy Fink. A great team they make and we were honored to have them with us this weekend. LCI update by ID Ken Ibarra: just returned from Board meeting in Kona, Hawaii. ID Ken was elected 1 year ago and is enjoying his visitation to districts. **ID Ken's 5 Points:**

1- Campaign 100 has reach a donation total of \$292,646.800 (97.5% of goal). Money has been donated to refugees and those affected by war in Ukraine.

2-LCI is integrating Sales Force software into the MYLCI and MYLION websites. It will increase individual members to interact with those platforms. It will take 6-9 months and be much simpler to use and more user friendly.

3-Montreal International Convention June 24-28, approximately 6,500 expected to attend. Dues increase is on the ballot total \$7 over next 3 years: July 23 +\$3, July 24, \$2, July 25 \$2. 4-Increased funding for Lions Rose Float in the Tournament of Roses Parade. Cost for 2022 was \$110,000. LCI has approved a donation of \$75,000. For a \$5,000 donation you can ride the float, \$1,000 to walk. Theme for 2023 is "Turning the Corner". Parade will be January 2, 2023. Brian Sheehanw will be the Ineternational President. ID Ken Ibarra the host.

5-Worldwide Induction day was amazing. D46 is now over 1,000 members. 19 clubs have increased membership.

Nominating and Seconding Speeches. Letters were read by Lion Jim Egloff. Seconding speeches and demonstrations presented. Lion Babs Cronin for 2nd VDG was seconded by Lion Dahleen Kendler (she read a letter by Lion Larry Winkler). 2nd VDG Adam Hopkins was seconded by PDG Cliff Cooper. 1st DG Kimo Harward was seconded by PDG Audrey Williams.

Early Bird Registration winners Lion Dahleen Kendler & Lion Jim Macpherson. Special Presentation Award Plaque presented by Lion Esther Louie-Henry and Lion Diane "Bloom" Wild to Nate Tannenbaum.

Evening Events. \$1,500 was raised for Serving Our Kids in an Auction Surpise. Special Presentation by DG Rex Velasquez to PDG Cliff Cooper, Lion Marie Stamatolates, Lion Esther Louie-Henry and Lion Jim Egloff for their roles in setting up the Convention. Lion Dahleen Kendler GMT award for adding new members. PDG Ray Pezonella donated 100+ wheelchairs to NV Wheelchair Foundation. Introduction of ID Ken Ibarra by PID Jack Epperson. ID Ken spoke at length about what we do as Lions, paraphrasing his message: During the pandemic many clubs met only on ZOOM, people struggled physically and financially. Focus on the projects not recruitment. Non-Lions ask how to join because they see the work we do. Each member makes a committment and takes it seriously. We can partner and assist with other organizations to complete the projects that need to be done. ID Ken appointed a Membership Coordinator-that develped a member orientation that can be edited and adjusted to fit our District and Clubs. Meaningfull service is needed in additon to training and development. IP Doug Alexander encourages that KINDNESS MATTERS, and SERVE WITHOUT EXPECTATIONS. WE SERVE, WHERE THERE IS A NEED, THERE IS A LION. Continue doing what you are doing and serving your area. Build committment with service and energy. Use the available resources: officer training, train your replacement, step up to the plate, push yourself. ID Ken then answered questions from the members. He is available to us for any questions you or club might have. Or find it if needed.

A surprising event occurred during awards presentations at the District Convention in Las Vegas.

Esther Louie-Henry was presented the Ambassador of Goodwill medal by visiting International Director Ken Iberra. This is the highest honor awarded by Lions International and the number authorized each year worldwide is strictly limited. PID Jack Epperson read the accompanying letter from International President Douglas Alexander in which he thanked Esther for her exemplary work in supporting our communities for 31 years. Jack noted that to his knowledge no one in a Nevada club, except past International Directors who receive the award upon completion of their terms, has ever been awarded this distinction. He went on to mention that this resulted from a suggestion by Lion Marie Stamatolates that Esther deserves some type of lifetime achievement recognition. Since she was already recognized with all other International awards this was the natural choice.

Esther's friend and television personality Nate Tannenbaum was also present to extend his congratulations.

The award was approved by the International President after reviewing Esther's accomplishments. Having recently visited the Lions Burn Center at UMC, he was particularly impressed with her work in establishing and improving that facility. She was also recognized for her accomplishments with membership, chairing several District committees, and organizing hospitality events, including Host Night, at the 2018 International Convention in Las Vegas.








Carson City Host



The Story of Lions -Most know it, new members should learn it. A little refresher for us all.





1917 The Beginning // Chicago business leader Melvin Jones asked a simple and world-changing question – what if people made a commitment to improving their communities? More than a century later, Lions Clubs International is the largest service club organization in the world, with more than 1.4 million members in 48,000 clubs acting on the same simple idea – when Lions come together for the good of humanity, there's nothing we can't achieve.

1920 Going International // Just three years after our founding, Lions became international when we established the first club in Canada. Mexico followed in 1927. In the 1950s and 1960s, international growth accelerated, with new clubs in Europe, Asia and Africa.

1925 Saving Sight // Helen Keller addressed the Lions Clubs International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, USA, and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind." Since then, we have worked tirelessly to aid those who are blind or visually impaired.

1945 Uniting Nations // We were one of the first nongovernmental organizations invited to assist in the drafting of the United Nations Charter. We host an annual Lions Day with the United Nations to continue our partnership and identify global solutions to the challenges facing humanity.

1957 Organizing Youth Programs // We started the Leo program to provide the youth of the world with an opportunity to serve and lead with Lions. There are approximately 180,000 Leos and 7,200 Leo clubs in more than 140 countries worldwide.

1968 Establishing Our Foundation // Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) assists Lions with global and large-scale humanitarian projects. Through our global Foundation, Lions have received more than US\$1 billion in grants to help meet the needs of their local and global communities.

1990 Launching SightFirst // Through the support of LCIF, Lions are restoring sight and preventing blindness on a global scale with the SightFirst program. Launched in 1990, Lions have raised more than US\$351 million for this initiative that targets the major causes of blindness.

2017 Celebrating Our Centennial // Lions celebrate a century of service by serving more than 250 million people around the world through a special Centennial Service Challenge.

2018 Rallying Around Global Causes // Lions unite to support the global causes of vision, hunger, the environment, childhood cancer and our new global focus, diabetes. LCIF launches *Campaign 100: LCIF Empowering Service* to raise US\$300 million to increase the service impact of Lions around the world.

2020 Responding to COVID-19 // Lions found innovative ways to safely serve their communities during this global health crisis. Our global Foundation, LCIF, donated millions of dollars in emergency grant funds, providing critical supplies and equipment to hospitals, medical clinics and emergency management systems, including front-line health care workers and first responders.
