District 46 Lions Clubs 2022-2023 Annual Convention and Spring Cabinet Meeting was held May 12, 13 in Las Vegas. It was hosted by the Las Vegas Aloha Lions, home club of District Governor Kimo Harward.

Friday, after the Committee Meeting sessions, the first Cabinet Meeting Session began at 10am. Some of the highlights from the session: District Treasurer Stefanie Covert reported that our finances are doing well. \$22,236 in the General Fund, \$10,000 in the Special Activities Fund, \$1,511 in Pin Traders, Discretionary Fund \$11,502, Operating Fund \$15,775. . VDG Adam Hopkins reported on the State of the District. We have 43 active clubs with 1,043 members, an increase from the 957 at last year's event. He urged club secretaries to improve data entry of club activities. 16 members from the District have committed to attending the International Convention in Boston. District 4L in California has 4 clubs that are interested in moving in to our district. DG Kimo Harward was pleased with the activities of the clubs this year, while still encouraging the district to strive forward toward the "magic number" of 1,250 members. "Keep the momentum up."

The Constitution & By-Laws committee, chaired by PDG Cliff Cooper proposed the following: The committee met today and discussed the impending ballot measure to merge the Special Activity Funds and its operational aspects with the District 46 Foundation. With the establishment of the District 46 Foundation (the "Foundation"), there now exists two District entities that perform essentially the same function – the Foundation and the Special Activities Fund. Currently, grant requests may be submitted to the Budget & Finance Committee for Special Activities funding. Grant requests may also be submitted to the Foundation of which members of the Budget & Finance Committee also serve as Directors. This redundancy of functions may be eliminated by merging the Special Activities fund into the Foundation.

The Foundation is an IRS 501(c)(3) entity that permits tax deductions for certain charitable contributions. This is not permitted with the Special Activities Fund. Approval of this Amendment would cause the Special Activities to be eliminated with any current funds transferred to the Foundation. The District Constitution & By-Laws would be amended to permit the Foundation to receive certain excess year-end funds as currently provided to the Special Activities Fund.

This proposal is endorsed and submitted by the District Budget & Finance Committee

RAMIFICATIONS:

YES vote – The District would transfer the Special Activities Fund balance to the Foundation. The District Constitution & By-Laws would be amended to cause the Foundation to obtain excess year-end funds in the manner currently provided to Special Activities. All future grant requests must be made to the District Foundation.

The Foundation will consider all grant requests without the need for Cabinet approval. No vote – Special Activities and the Foundation will continue to function as separate entities. Grant requests may be submitted to Budget & Finance or the Foundation.

Next year's committee will update the Constitution and By-Laws after the International Board of Directors has provided the new changes.

At the Election on Saturday, the membership voted YES on this matter. If you have any questions on how this will operate, reach out to your Club President for more information. A new website for the Foundation will be built.

At 11 am the First Convention Session was called to order. PID Jack Epperson introduced our visiting ID Debra Weaverling. Deb was elected to serve a 2 year term in 2021. She is from Basehor, Kansas, where she has been a member of the Leavenworth Lions Club since first joining in 1998. Her service is defined by her desire to serve her community and "to give back and pay it forward." Her husband Ron, also a Lion, have 3 daughters and 8 grandchildren.

Nominating and seconding speeches were given for the DG and VDG candidates. 2DG Paul Silva, 1VDG Babs Cronin, and DG Adam Hopkins were all seconded and approved to be nominated. At the voting on Saturday morning, all 3 candidates were selected by the membership.

In the afternoon, training for Lions Quest was given by Lion Carol Confino. This is a great program, if your club is interested in what Quest can do for your community, be sure to contact her. The sponsoring club's service project for A Greater Hope, collected school supplies.

Dinner Friday evening was of Hawaiian theme, with the Parade of Club Banners followed by Presentation of Colors by USNSCC Van Voorhis Squadron. Entertainment provided by Na Hula Hali'a Aloha dancers. Special Presentations were given out by DG Kimo Harward. The Thieves auction went to Reno Cigar who pledged \$131,000. Lion Dahleen Kendler was presented with the PDG Excellence Award. See the photos below for more awards.

Saturday Morning began with opening of Delegate Voting from 8 to 11 am. The Cabinet Meeting Session began at 9 am. Global Action Team Reports were given. Some Highlights: District LCIF Coordinator IPDG Rex Velasquez reported that as of April \$15,865 had been donated, \$9,277 short of the \$25,143 goal for 2022-2023.

GST South Coordinator Glo Watson reported that we are going strong, keep those reports coming. Increasing the reporting is good for the District.

GLT North Coordinator PDG Barbie Hertz reported. Starting June 7 Officer training will be held online each Saturday night via online apps.

GMT North Coordinator Dahleen Kendler reported:

“When I gave my first GMT report in August of 2020 our District membership was 964. Today we are at 1,044. Over the last three years we are up 80 new members. Our goal for next year is to reach 1250+ for membership. If we could get at least 20 clubs to add a Club Branch, that would add 100 new members or more. Remember, it is every member’s responsibility to bring in new members and the membership chair to set up new members’ events.

Over the last 3 years we dropped/transferred a total of 476 members and added 315 new members. Please make sure you are conducting exit interviews. Why are they leaving? What changes could your club make to retain the membership. Since Covid in 2020, our clubs have had to go through a lot of changes to keep their membership. How many members do you have attending each meeting and what do you do with those members? It doesn’t matter how many meetings you hold a month whether it be weekly, twice a month or once a month. I would rather they show up to a service project than a meeting. BUT you need to start planning more service projects and events, start attracting new members so you have more help. If we aren’t out there, we will always be the best kept secret.

With the new Lions Portal program starting soon, all club members must have an individual email address, no shared emails can be used, plus they should have their birthdates updated. The Lion Portal will only accept email addresses to sign on. So, if you use a phone number, you will need to change it before they upload the Lion Portal. You can go into MYLCI under reports and run “Member Information Update Report” print it out and have your members update their information.

Looking at the most current Club Health Assessment, we have a lot of clubs in the Red...Why aren’t the monthly reports getting reported? Why aren’t service hours being added? Why do we have 4 clubs still owing Dues from January or longer to LCI? With the new year quickly approaching, I challenge all of you to get on MYLCI and go onto the learning center and no matter how long you have been a Lion, take time to review your training. Trained leaders and members make for stronger clubs

In closing I would like to share a quote from Benjamin Franklin ***“Without continual growth and progress, such words as improvement, achievement, and success have no meaning.”***

Thank you for allowing me to be your GMT for these past three years. Let’s continue the growth together.”

West Charleston Lions made a donation of \$2,000 to Camp Dat-So-La-Le.

Camp Lots-A-Fun has a new location in Alamo, NV to start accepting campers in 2024.

The Student Speaker Foundation had raised \$11,000 this year at the time of Convention. Please keep the Foundation in mind as you raise funds in 2023-2024. The Final Contest was held Saturday afternoon, with 4 great students from around Nevada giving wonderful talks on “How can America find unity in polarizing times.” The winner was Robert McInney (I hope the spelling is correct ;-)) representing Spring Creek Ruby Mountains Lions. Robert is a senior, planning to attend Oregon State University. Congratulations! But all the speakers are winners and we wish them well in their future endeavors.

This is a great program that needs your support to continue.

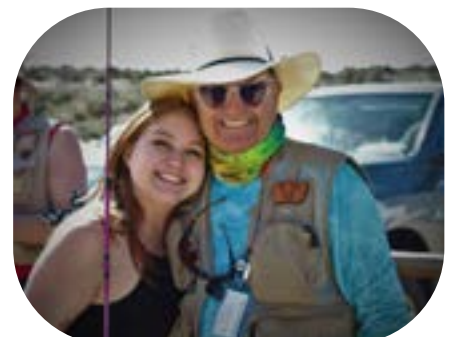

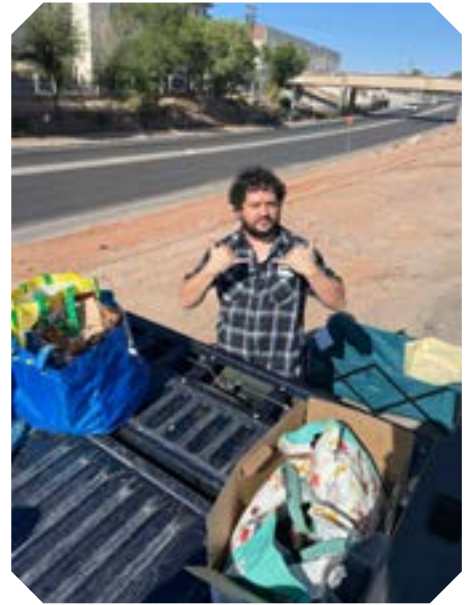

Truckee Lions Will Host June 30th Benefit Concert

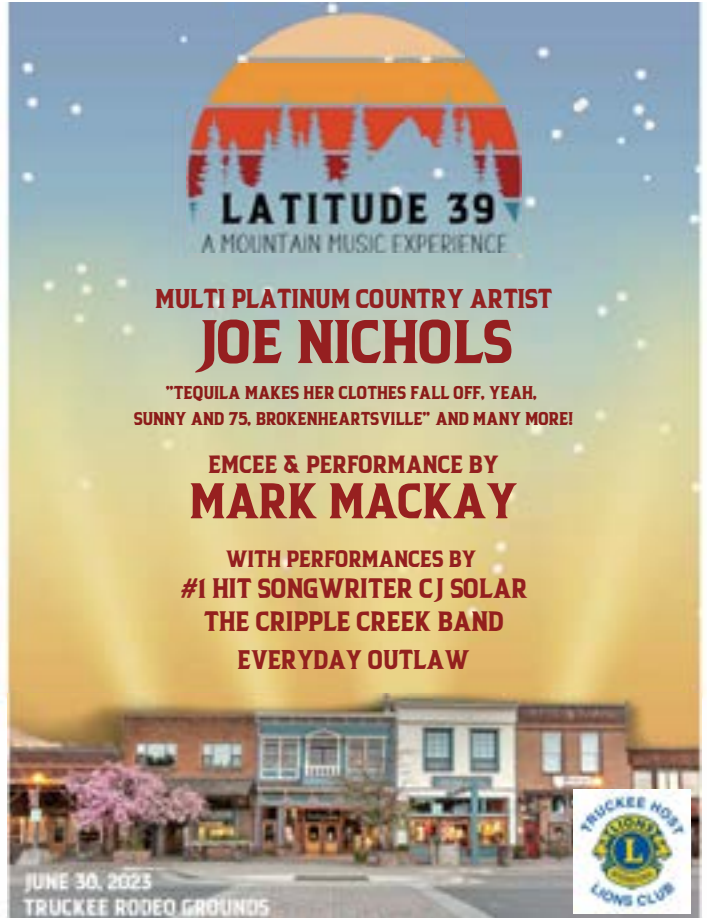

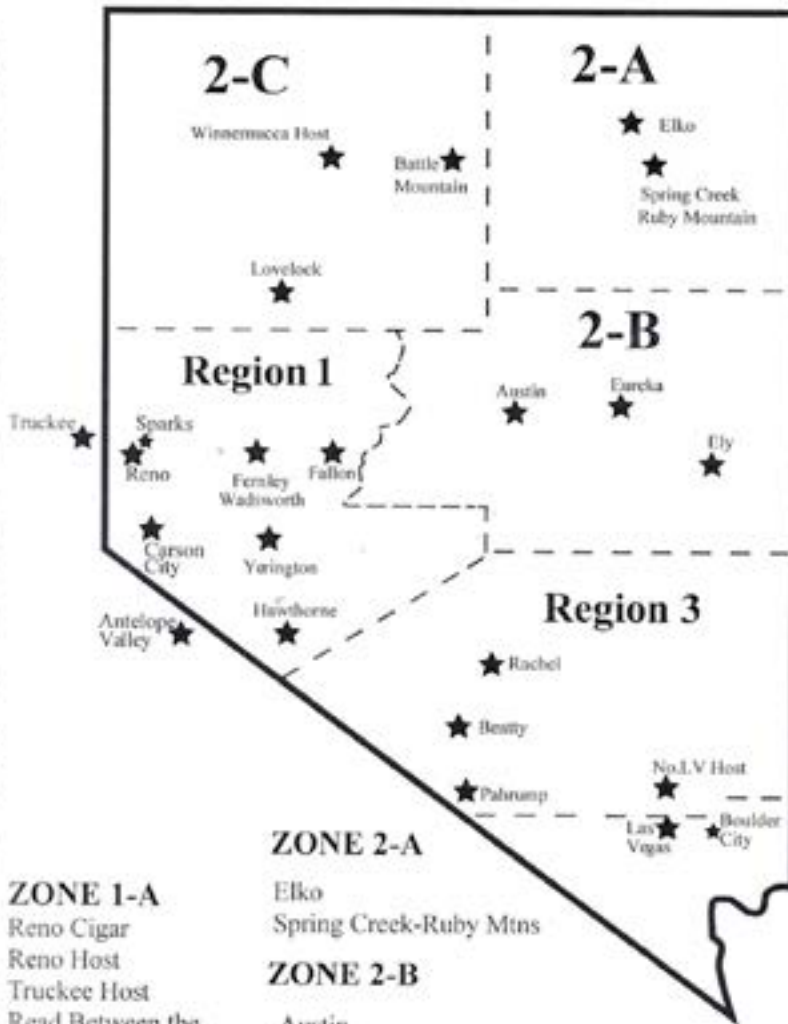

***The Story of Lions -
Most know it, new members should learn it.
A little refresher for us all.***



Our Story

1917 The Beginning // Chicago business leader Melvin Jones asked a simple and world-changing question – what if people made a commitment to improving their communities? More than a century later, Lions Clubs International is the largest service club organization in the world, with more than 1.4 million members in 48,000 clubs acting on the same simple idea – when Lions come together for the good of humanity, there’s nothing we can’t achieve.

1920 Going International // Just three years after our founding, Lions became international when we established the first club in Canada. Mexico followed in 1927. In the 1950s and 1960s, international growth accelerated, with new clubs in Europe, Asia and Africa.

1925 Saving Sight // Helen Keller addressed the Lions Clubs International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, USA, and challenged Lions to become “knights of the blind.” Since then, we have worked tirelessly to aid those who are blind or visually impaired.

1945 Uniting Nations // We were one of the first nongovernmental organizations invited to assist in the drafting of the United Nations Charter. We host an annual Lions Day with the United Nations to continue our partnership and identify global solutions to the challenges facing humanity.

1957 Organizing Youth Programs // We started the Leo program to provide the youth of the world with an opportunity to serve and lead with Lions. There are approximately 180,000 Leos and 7,200 Leo clubs in more than 140 countries worldwide.

1968 Establishing Our Foundation // Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) assists Lions with global and large-scale humanitarian projects. Through our global Foundation, Lions have received more than US\$1 billion in grants to help meet the needs of their local and global communities.

1990 Launching SightFirst // Through the support of LCIF, Lions are restoring sight and preventing blindness on a global scale with the SightFirst program. Launched in 1990, Lions have raised more than US\$351 million for this initiative that targets the major causes of blindness.

2017 Celebrating Our Centennial // Lions celebrate a century of service by serving more than 250 million people around the world through a special Centennial Service Challenge.

2018 Rallying Around Global Causes // Lions unite to support the global causes of vision, hunger, the environment, childhood cancer and our new global focus, diabetes. LCIF launches *Campaign 100: LCIF Empowering Service* to raise US\$300 million to increase the service impact of Lions around the world.

2020 Responding to COVID-19 // Lions found innovative ways to safely serve their communities during this global health crisis. Our global Foundation, LCIF, donated millions of dollars in emergency grant funds, providing critical supplies and equipment to hospitals, medical clinics and emergency management systems, including front-line health care workers and first responders.
