Finger Lakes Region Lions Hearing Foundation

"Blindness cuts us off from things, but deafness cuts us off from people" -- attributed to Helen Keller.

In existence since the mid-1980s, the Finger Lakes Region Lions Hearing Foundation (FLRLHF) provides used hearing aids for those who fall between the cracks: they are not eligible for one through Medicaid, but also cannot afford to pay the thousands of dollars a professional new one costs. The Foundation has provided close to 4,000 hearing aids in the decades it has been providing this service.

In just the last 15 months, since contracting our geographic coverage to remove District N and even with the pandemic closing our hearing center partner locations for several months, we have handled 102 requests for hearing aids from people in the following locations throughout the 29 counties included in the Lions MD-20 Districts E-1, E-2, and Y we serve:

Our primary expense is the up to \$300 per client/hearing aid we reimburse our hearing center partners to cover both material and labor expenses in testing and fitting our hearing aids. We rely mostly on donations to cover those expenses, although we ask clients to contribute as well if their income is between 139% and 200% (our max. served) of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

To keep our expenses low, volunteers do much of the work of the Foundation. Lions members handle the applications process. The Foundation Audiologist and his staff stock and send out the hearing aids ordered by our hearing center partners. Hearing center partners also contribute as we are clearly not reimbursing their full costs, and some do not ask for our full reimbursement amount. You help by finding and sending in used hearing aids for us to reuse with our clients. We see that the *number* of Lions Clubs donating to the Foundation has been declining, even before the pandemic hit. Once it did, we know you have had limited fundraising options, so we understand why we are receiving fewer and smaller donations, because your primary focus needs to be on basic needs in local communities. *We do thank those clubs which have been able to send us any donation.*

However, if your club has not been donating to the FLRLHF, please consider putting us into your annual donation list, even if for only a relatively small amount for now. With over 125 clubs within the 3 Lions districts we serve, *any* donation from *each* club can help us continue to provide hearing aids to those in need.

If you know of other organizations (seniors' clubs, other service organizations, churches, etc.) that might be willing to donate to help us provide hearing aids to those in need, please ask them to do so, particularly if they are in areas not currently served by a Lions Club. Please also encourage them to let their constituents know of our service regardless of whether they donate to us. Our current application form is always available online at https://tinyurl.com/FLRLHF-Apply. Finally, and as importantly, we ask that you continue to collect and send us used hearing aids, however old and in whatever condition. Please add "and hearing aids" to your Lions eyeglasses donation boxes if you have not already done so. Please let senior centers, funeral homes, churches, and other organizations know we need used hearing aids. We clean and/or refurbish the newest ones to give to our clients. We send the rest to an organization that will give us salvage credit, which we in turn use to defray expenses.

In recognition of his service, Director Hunt has received several International President's Awards, an International President's Leadership Award and the Life Membership Award.

Always one to prioritize fellowship and community service, Director Hunt has held offices in several community organizations including president and chairperson of the board for his local YMCA as well as president and board chairperson of the Chilliwack & District Seniors Resources Society.

Director Hunt is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow and his wife, Sonja M. Hunt, is a Melvin Jones Fellow. Their daughter, Kristen, and son-in-law, Chad, are also Lions and proud parents to the Hunt's granddaughter, Ella.

And lastly, if the donation is sent to our Texas Lions Foundation, designated for this disaster relief, we will apply it towards Emergency Disaster Relief grants that we issue to Lions Clubs around MD 2.

Board of Directors take steps to help our clubs

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic is continuing to impact the work of Lions around the world. As you know, it has also created financial hardships for our Lions and the people for whom we care.


To support the incredible men and women serving with us, the International Board of Directors unanimously passed another resolution to help our clubs.

Here is an overview of the new resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

- Charter and entrance fees waiver We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2021.
- Flexible payments No clubs in good standing on December 31, 2020 will be suspended or canceled through June 30, 2021 for late payment of dues. Full payment is required to be received before June 30, 2021 to avoid suspension or cancellation.
 - Please note that clubs placed on financial suspension on December 31, 2020 will remain on suspension until the full balance is paid. Those
 clubs will still need to address their outstanding dues or make arrangements for repayment with the Accounts Receivable Department at
 Lions Clubs International to avoid cancellation scheduled for March 1, 2021.

These additional measures will help Lions facing financial hardships and give our clubs the support and encouragement they need during these challenging times. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity, and together, we will overcome this.

The world needs Lions now more than ever, so thank you for your outstanding service and commitment to our communities and the world.




Brockport Lions Club

First line of business was the Club's annual Easter Egg Hunt. After much discussion those in attendance decided to do an Easter Egg Hunt/drive thru. Organizing this took work to get approval from the towns parks and recreation and Irondequoit Police Dept. but after approval the two school districts were notified, gave their thumbs up and agreed to distribute the Egg Hunt/drive thru flyer electronically to the K-3rd grade families.

So we are happy to report that the 62nd Annual Easter Egg Hunt/ drive thru will take place on Saturday April 3rd at Camp Eastman at 1301 Lake Shore Blvd. beginning at 9am sharp. Lions and helpers will hand out bagged Easter candy and other items, some of which were donated by Reliant Bank, which is one of the Club's proud supporters. Also at the meeting Lion Secretary Bev Bloss shared the award our Club received from the Association for the Blind. Called Partners in Leadership it represents the many years of financial support that we have given the Agency. We recently did a zoom meeting with a virtual tour conducted by Tracy Schleyer, VP of Community Engagement, Jennifer Lake new President and CEO and other staff on the work that the Agency is doing. The tour consisted of their sensory playground, the kitchen located in the rehab. department and one of the manufacturing departments. Because of Covid, departments had to make adjustments financially and physically. Many staff worked from home and the Goodwill stores were closed for many months. The stores are back open and staff is coming back. Financially they took a large hit like many other agencies but they continue to serve the community. One example that was given was the Call Center 211 phone line that received over 100,000 calls for help in getting assistance which was at least 3 times more than normal. Our Little Free Library has been decorated for St. Patrick's Day. Use has slowed down a bit because of the weather but books are rotated for a better selection. The Club also continues to make financial donations to the Irondequoit Community Cupboard which helps families in need within the town.

Finally our tail twister Lion Karl Bloss has reported that even though our Club is small we have 396 years of accumulative service to our town. Through our existing members we have continued to reach out to the residents and helped where it is needed .

Tremendous demands for medical equipment stimulated the need to accept donations, especially because of depleted wheelchairs and a low bed supply. Lion Hancock reminded volunteers to continue to adhere to the COVID-19 rules using masks and gloves to receive and sanitize equipment.



On February 23, board members Lions Ann McElwee, Jim Hancock, and Jim Punch stressed the on-going need for medical equipment, <u>especially</u> wheelchairs, walkers, and hospital beds.

A newly added service recently developed. President Billy Roman suggested having one set of bed sheets available, for only those in need, when someone borrows a hospital bed. The sheet sets are now available.

Our special guest speaker for the general meeting was District Attorney Joe Cardone. He spoke about criminal justice as it relates to three topics. He spoke about the discovery of evidence to defenders, bail reform, and the legalization of marijuana.

COVID Vaccine and Vision Screening

Lion Christine Thompson shared information from a January 27, 2021 email from Joe Gorman District 20E SEE vision screening program. Joe wrote the following.

" All vision screening in MD 20 is basically on hold due to Covid school restrictions until the fall since public schools are closed to visitors until then" (January 27, 2021. Update for 20E1 SEE Vision Screening Committee. para. 1). " It is suggested by SEE and Kidsight USA that all screeners that will be Vision Screening in the future get a covid flu shot because it will be a requirement by school systems that all visitors have proof of receiving a Covid flu shot. There should only have at the most 3 Lions on sight [cite] for the Screening"

Lions Ann McElwee or Christine Thompson ask all Medina Lions members to inform them of their completed COVID vaccinations if planning to participate in future public school vision screenings. Remember to keep your COVID vaccine card accessible to present when the school allows a scheduled screening.

As Kodak downsized, I felt I should look for another position and transferred to Kodak Office where I supported their e-mail system and worked on their hot line. I spent 7 years on the board of the Association for the Blind/Goodwill, where I headed up their consumer advisory board. Hamlin Lions Club Loan Closet Co-Chairmen PDG Tim Crawford and Lion Dan Hicks had recently received many donations and were willing to share. Early on a Saturday morning , Lions Tim Crawford and Dan Hicks started sorting what would be shared and what they wanted to keep.

Helped by Hamlin Lions PDG Marvin Hankinson and Lion Diane Hankinson several load were selected and sent to West Avenue in Rochester where Lion Bing Reaves is organizing a new loan facility. Much work cleaning and identifying items is now needed but we anticipate equipment to be ready soon.
