MD-20's Letter to Gov. Andrew Cuomo

Governor Cuomo;

On behalf of the almost 15,000 lions members and 510 Lions Clubs in the state of New York, I have been authorized by their 11 District Governors representing our members, to offer our member's services to assist in the state's efforts to vaccinate the citizens of our state.

Understanding the enormity of this task, we know that government cannot achieve this alone but it will take civil society to make this happen.

Depending how the immunizations are distributed, our members can be available to assist with administrative duties such as filling out forms, helping with organizing the areas where people will come for immunizations.

Lions Clubs of NYS are no strangers to working in NY during challenging times. During 911 we mobilized our membership with the assistance of our International Association and Foundation in providing food, clothing and converted shipping containers serving as shelters within the disaster area acting as areas for rescue, for recovery workers a place to rest and get out of the weather. Also providing counseling and survivor camps for families effected for up to 5 years after the attacks.

During super storm Sandy, Lions again mobilized immediately providing needed goods to those who lost their belongings and generators for community centers and others and because of that, we now have a warehouse at our camp in Spencer NY stocked with emergency supplies to be dispensed, when needed to areas of disasters.

During the pandemic, our members have provided respite meals to health care workers in several hospitals, provided food to food pantries, and sanitized vehicles of health care workers and ambulances throughout NYS. These activities are a small part of our 100+ yrs. of service throughout the world and in NYS.

Since 2018, over 1,800 teachers and staff members have been trained in Lions Quest. These training sessions have been delivered in conferences and multi-day training sessions. Training has been conducted in 87 Districts and BOCES programs across the state. We estimate that Lions Quest has had an impact on over 15,000 students over the past three years and continues to climb.

Governor Cuomo, thank you for your efforts during these difficult times and we look forward to assisting in any way possible.



A few years ago, many of you may remember, super storm Sandy hit Long Island and NYC particularly hard and Lions all over the world were very generous with their donations to the rebuilding effort. LCIF was also generous with grant money. We are using that money to build a warehouse and stock it with emergency supplies.

After many years, the MD20 council finally agreed to build a warehouse at Camp Badger to house supplies for any future emergencies. That building was completed almost four years ago and we have been working since then to put supplies into the wonderful space that we have in Spencer, NY. DG Rick Brisee from District W has been spearheading the job of purchasing equipment and supplies. He inventories the purchases, stores them safely in the building and he has worked up a plan for distribution of items should the need arise. We have also purchased and wrapped a small trailer (thanks to ID Gary Brown for finding us a bargain). We have also ordered a larger trailer that will be wrapped once we take delivery.

Currently we have many different items in stock, for example blankets, generators, dehumidifiers, shop vacs, brooms, gloves, tarps, emergency lighting, extensions cords, tents, shovels, cleaning buckets, etc... If anyone has more ideas of items to stock on our shelves, please let us know.

In addition to all of the activity at the building, we have been forming a MD20 Alert Foundation to hold the assets of the committee and shield the MD. We are in the final phase of the Foundation set up and so we hope to have people join the team as directors from all over the state. We need more help and we will be holding formal elections at the MD20 convention in Syracuse May 14-16, 2021.

Please monitor the MD20 website for a link to the MD20 Alert Foundation. We hope to have this up soon and the information will include a complete inventory of the warehouse as well as the procedure to request emergency supplies.

We hope that every MD20 Lions member will consider whether this may be their passion for service to the whole MD20 community. Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the <u>e-Postcard</u> (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

2019-2020 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and total assets less than \$500,000	990-EZ or 990
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by <u>November 15</u> each year. Please note that *an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N*.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may <u>apply</u> for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an <u>EIN online</u>, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.

The club is preparing for their 70th Anniversary in April 2021.








Avon Lions Club



Medina Medical Equipment Loan Closet

In the past month, Medina's medical supply closet has been bustling as they fielded phone calls, loaned out numerous items, and received donations.

Here is a sample of available equipment. Medical items are listed by mobility, bed-ridden, bed related accessories, and treatment associated items.


Some mobility items include splints, braces, and crutches; straight canes or quads (four-legged) with curved or straight handles; plain walkers without wheels, rolling walkers with or without seats; and wheelchairs in various width and height with or without elevating leg-rests.

If bed-ridden, there are hospital beds in different heights operated by cranks, electric controls or a combination of the two. There is also an alternating air mattress to help reduce bedsores.

Other bed accessories are over-the-bed stands, commodes and a few bedpans (regular and fractured pans); and foot brackets for keeping bedding off lower extremities.

Treatment related equipment such as intravenous (IV) pole that attach to a hospital bed or stands alone with wheels. These IV poles can make someone's care easier if receiving meds, fluids, or other items such as tube-feedings. See more pictures on the Orleans HUB at https://orleanshub.com/? s=medical+equipment

Referred more than two dozen children to pediatric ophthalmologists for specialized care



I have been the Town Clerk for the Town of Clarendon, Orleans County, New York since September of 1989. Our Town has grown over the years, but remains a small community. Since I've been in service of the Clarendon Community, one organization has and continues to go above and beyond in caring for the people in our Community through its volunteers. That is the Clarendon Lions Club, currently 21 members strong. These residents volunteer their time to the community by holding fund raisers throughout the year so they can fund scholarships and different needs in the community. The Clarendon Lions hamburger/sausage stand and annual Geranium sale are most popular to the residents. The Clarendon Lions Club has set up a "Little Free Pantry" at the Town Hall for residents in immediate need. Community folks have been very responsive to donating non-perishable foods and products to be placed in the box. Kevin Johnson, President of the Clarendon Lions Club, says "sometimes folks just need a little something to get them by when times are tough. The Little Free Pantry is a way for folks from the community to help each other. If the box is empty; it is because someone needed it ... if it is full; it is because someone donated." The Lions newest project, 911 Signs, is an Orleans County Area Fund Raiser. The cost to purchase a house number sign is a donation that will be returned to the community through projects and



support. These signs help emergency services locate a residence. These dedicated volunteers spend much time setting up, working and tearing down for each fundraiser, giving to their community. Annually, the Clarendon Lions Club offers three \$250.00 scholarships to area high school seniors. Criteria includes being accepted to a college and plan to have a career in the health/medical/public service field. The student submits a letter explaining their goals and why they should receive the scholarship. Over the past five years, Clarendon Lions have donated \$4,250.00 to-ward scholarships. The Lions also helps to fund a 'Christmas Shop' at the school where children are allowed to shop for inexpensive items for family gifts. ARC of Orleans, Blind Student Activities, Camp Abilities, Camp Badger, Canine Helpers, Challenger Miracle Field of Rochester, Genesee Ministry of Concern, Guiding Eyes for the Blind, Community Library, Hospice of Orleans, Mercy Flight, NYS & Bernuda Poundation, Orleans Adult Learning Services, Project New Hope, United Disciples Church, VA Bingo, West Side Challenger Tennis, Brady Buggy Wagoon, Holley Community Garden and VA-WNY Rec (health care). Donations over the past five year period total \$22,750.00. The Clarendon Community is blessed with the volunteers of its Lions Club. Such dedicated volunteers are hard to find today. These citizens are worth their weight in gold and so appreciated by the Clarendon Community. The Lions Club has recently received
