November 15th 990 Tax Facts

From the Legal Division September 29, 2020.

Lions, please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at <u>IRS.gov</u> prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

2019-2020 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and total assets less than \$500,000	990-EZ or 990
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by November 15 each year. Please note that an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may apply for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an EIN online, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.




Kendall Lions Club

was awarded to Lion Julie Bunn. Lion Julie was presented this award by her father and Lion sponsor Lion Mike Cusimano.



Artist Unlimited was founded to offer a unique expressive experience to those individuals who may not otherwise have an opportunity to participate as actors in other venues. The Webster Lions Club is proud continue our long history of supporting Artists Unlimited in 2020 and hopefully beyond.



Our second Zoom board meeting in September went well. Though we are not physically together, Zoom offers us the chance to socialize and continue to make plans on how we will serve those in need.

Our first "dinner" meeting will take place via Zoom on Monday, October 26.

St. Peter's Soup Kitchen has been serving the West Side Community of the City of Rochester since 1982. Their mission is to strive to build a stronger community by welcoming all in need, treating everyone with love, and attempting to eradicate hunger in downtown Rochester NY.

The kitchen started out as a once-a-week Saturday soup and sandwich program. Today it serves a wellbalanced and nutritional lunch, including all the recommended food groups, to an average 130 people a day, Monday through Friday. The kitchen benefits from a partnership with Food Link and the generosity of area grocers such as Wegmans, Trader Joes, the University of Rochester and individuals in securing food for our lunches and pantry. Guests come from all walks of life; many have troubles with addiction, mental illness, physical illness, lost homes, and low wage earnings. St Peter's is a non-referral agency meaning anyone who walks through our doors is welcome to share in a meal.

During this time guests are welcome to take food off the neighbors table, and each guest leaves with some sort of sweet treat that has been donated to us by various grocery stores throughout the Rochester area.

Guests are also able to use the phone and request copy or fax services, as well as inquire about other services and resources available to them throughout the Rochester area.

During the Covid-19 shutdown, the kitchen is prohibited from opening our dining room, but that hasn't stopped them from serving our neighbors who are hungry. They are serving on average, about 130 lunches per day and operate a walk-up service in the parking lot. In addition, they are still operating the Pantry program to provide groceries to those in need.

While food donations have continued during this time, in order to provide the lunches, the kitchen has had to purchase take out containers using almost 1 case per day costing about \$70.00 a week and other supplies.

If you care to donate, they need napkins, 10 oz. soup cups with lids, paper lunch bags and individual packets of salt and pepper, ketchup, mayo and mustard. They were not prepared to do daily takeout meals but have had some wonderful donations that have given them the ability to serve in this fashion. Please call ahead if you plan on donating items so they can confirm the need.

District 20E1 Lions Club Challenge

Lions,

During this time of Covid-19, many individuals and families are impacted by growing food insecurity. While our clubs have been consistently working to help those in our immediate areas, there are many families in the Rochester area that do not have the benefit of Lions support. As harvest begins, I would like to challenge our 39 clubs to reach out in a small way to make a big difference in the fight against hunger.

St. Peter's Kitchen is a 503c nonprofit organization working to meet the needs of those people in the city of Rochester experiencing hunger. For over 30 years they have been providing nutritious, balanced lunches to the needy in Rochester. With the advent of Covid-19 they have had to switch from serving inside to take out only. This has created an additional financial burden to the kitchen. If within the next 3 months each club could pledge to donate at least \$100 we could fund the purchase of take out containers needed to provide lunches for a year!

Used eyeglass process up to 2017 | PDG Greg Lund

We sent our collected used eyeglasses to Dr. Warren Riegel, Optomoligist , 14 S Mill Ave, Ridgeway, Pa. Dr. Riegel (814-773-3197) scheduled work parties of volunteers to sort, clean ,categorize and box the eye glasses for shipment to South or Central America countries. These glasses are scheduled for shipment to other countries by ship and in support of trips of eye professionals going to provide eye exams etc.



How did the glasses get to Ridgeway, Pa?

Hilton Spencerport Express (HSX), Tom Cole- 659-8442, trucking

company located in Kendall, NY accumulated our used eyeglasses over the months until they reach a full tractor trailer load, 16 pallets (100,000 pairs of glasses). The trucking company coordinated with Dr. Riegel to truck the eyeglasses to a storage facility near his office. HSX trucking worked to share the load to and gain a paying load to be trucked back to the Rochester area so that they were not coming back empty. HSX provided this service to our district at no cost to the district.

What's Changed?

The number of used eyeglasses we collected was increasing each year and we exceeded the pace at which Dr. Riegel could process them. Dr. Riegel was 84 years old and could only get so many volunteers to process the glasses. Our last shipment of 11 pallets was about a 4-year supply. There are other eye glass processing centers we investigated in Virginia and Georgia but none had a trucking customer near by or could handle pallet loads of glasses.

What did we do next?

We found a company, ReSpecs that would take glasses in any condition, frames, cases etc. and recycle 100% of the metal, plastic, and glass. We continued to collect glasses and ReSpecs picked up 11 pallets and another 6 pallets from 2018 to Jan. of 2020. Then Covid came to be a big issue for collecting glasses.

What do we do now?

We found that of all the glasses we collected only 10% of the glasses in useable frames were able to be reused. So, if we shipped 11 pallets, 10 were tossed in the garbage, landfill. We also found there are many more glasses being sent to places to sort for reuse than there is a demand. We also found that companies like Sterling Optical send optical staff on missions to third world countries and supply new eyeglasses. Our trucking company cannot store, or ship used eyeglasses in their facility, or trucks as they use the warehouse and trailers for shipping foods, so not with Covid.

A great Environmental project

Lions are well known for collecting eyeglasses so lets make this a 100% environmental project and use ReSpecs. By the way, we received over \$1700 from the 17 pallets we shipped to them for the value of the recycling, about \$100/pallet. It is a win win. Lions keep collecting eyeglasses recycling 100%, we may receive some \$ for the value of metal, plastic, and glass, and none of it goes to the landfill. So far, the \$ we got came to the District just like the value we got 30 years ago from metal frames. Our DG will be looking at using these \$ to fund a District project.

How Do We Begin again?

Kendall trucking will donate one trailer in their yard for used glasses. Lions will get the glasses there and put them in the trailer or I will meet them there to help with that part. I will go to the trailer monthly and put the boxes of glasses on pallets, wrap them and move the pallets to the front of the trailer. Once we get a truck load, we will contact ReSpecs for a pickup.
