From the Desk of the Governor



I will have awards and recognitions for almost all of our District 14P Lions Clubs and I want to encourage all of you to attend our "Day of Discovery" District Convention on Saturday April 13th. We will be at Trinity EC Church, 250 Swinehart Rd. in Boyertown and registration will begin at 8AM. There will again be a morning memorial service for Lions who passed away last year. This will be followed by training sessions for club presidents, secretaries, and treasurers. We will have short presentations by some of the many exhibitors who will be present and more substantial

presentations on the new My Lion App, campaign 100 for LCIF, childhood cancer and the Four Diamonds Foundation. During lunch we will have presentations on our peace poster contest winners, our district Leo of the Year, and other recognitions for our clubs that I have received from LCI as mentioned above. In the afternoon, we will have our caucus and election of District 14P officers for the new Lions year beginning July 1st.

Again, I hope that all of you will attend this district convention.

Our State Convention will be held at Kalahari Resort in the Poconos from May 17 to the 19th. The keynote speaker will be our Lions Clubs International President, Gudrun Yngvadottir. I encourage you to attend this convention which is relatively close to us. A registration form was in the March issue of Lion Eyes and again in this issue. Delegate forms are also included in this issue of Lion Eyes.

There will be a resolution for an amendment to the constitution to be voted upon at the state convention. This amendment would change the manner in which the State Council Vice Chairman and therefore the Council Chairperson would be selected. A copy of this resolution was in the March issue of Lion Eyes and again in this issue. It needs a two thirds vote to pass. I encourage our Lions Clubs to name delegates for the state convention and have them knowledgeable on this proposed amendment.

Currently the State Council Chair is selected on a rotational method among the 17 districts in our state. The current District Governor from District N should be vice chairperson this year (actually he is acting Council Chair due to a resignation) and then Council Chairperson next year as the Immediate Past District Governor from District N. Our District 14P DG would be Council Vice Chairperson next year (there is no District O) and then Council Chairperson for the 2020-2021 Lions year. This will follow in order for districts T, U, and W.

The proposed amendment would change this selection method after the current cycle of rotation is completed. The proposed amendment would change the selection method to one in which the Vice Council Chairperson would be selected by the sitting Council from among the First Vice-District Governors. This Lion would then follow into the Council Chairperson position.

The thought behind this proposed amendment is that by this time in working together as a group of Vice -District Governors, the class itself would know who among them is the best leader and would be the best Lion to be Council Chairperson. Also a good District Governor from a district currently at the end of the cycle would not need to wait many years for the opportunity to be Council Chairperson.

Again, I encourage your Lions Club to select delegates for the State Convention and that they are knowledgeable about this resolution to make up their mind. Delegate forms are in this Lion Eyes.

Finally, I am planning on having a Spring Rally on Father's Day June 16th. This is a change from the original date for Governors Appreciation Day. It will be at the same church where we are holding the District Convention and details will come after the convention.

Keep up the good work and let's finish this year strong in all areas. Thank you for your service. DG Dave



Childhood Cancer

CHILDHOOD CANCER CHAPTER 8 ONE EXAMPLE OF AN ADVOCATE FOR CHILDHOOD CANCER

Maybe you heard about this man who visited Berks county a couple of years ago with State Representative Thomas R. Caltagirone. His name is Ronnie Duvall from California. When Ronnie found out that his friend's daughter had been diagnosed with stage 4 glioblastoma, an inoperable brain tumor, he began to do extensive research on pediatric cancer. All the research did was make him angry, so he decided to fight against pediatric cancer by driving across country to learn, educate and build a network – he called his journey, "Driven 2 Change".

He was 40 years old, working as a senior project manager for a national contracting firm, making over \$100,000 per year. But, as he said, money does not compare to what a child goes through. First, he thought of doing fund raisers, but people did not think he had the ability to raise money that way. So, he got the idea of driving to all the lower continuous 48 states. He found that no one had done that before, so he proceeded and gained information along the way.

He collected information and funds wherever he drove in his specially marked car with the "Gold Ribbon" and his logo. One of his messages is that childhood cancer is underfunded. He said that only 3.8% of federal funding for cancer research goes for pediatric research. Duvall said that one of his goals is to see pediatric cancer receive increased funding. How right he is...those little children would never be heard without devoted people like Duvall. Lions are now taking on the challenge too, to gather information and funds for support of defeating childhood cancer.

\$15,000 Gift from Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation+ Similar Donation from the Paoli, Berwyn, Malvern Lions Allows Royer-Greaves Group Home Residents to Literally Weather the Storm

Thanks to some generous Lions, the adults with visual impairment and developmental disabilities who live in a Royer-Greaves School for Blind residence can now weather power outages safely at home.

The Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation recently presented Royer- Greaves School for Blind with a check for nearly \$15,000. Coupled with a check from the Paoli, Berwyn, Malvern Lions Club, that money will fund the purchase of three electrical generators for group homes in King of Prussia, Drexel Hill, and Springfield.

The loss of electrical power, difficult for anyone, can be terrifying or even life-threatening for the visually impaired and developmentally disabled adults who live in the Royer-Greaves homes. In addition to visual and other disabilities, many have complex medical needs. "They have medicines that require refrigeration and medical equip- ment that needs power," said Royer-Greaves School for Blind Executive Director Vicky Mayer. "They have a limited understanding of what is happening around them, and relocating to another house or hotel can be a fearful experience. Limited mobility adds to the risk of transporting them during severe weather," she said.

The installation of the generators means that in a power outage, staff can continue to safely care and support residents at home, with no interruption to the routine and care they need.

"Since 1925, when Helen Keller challenged the Lions of the world to be 'Knights of the Blind,' our mission has been to help the blind and visually challenged," said Lions International Past District Governor Richard T. Taylor, who is the Berks and Chester counties director for the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation. "The Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation provides matching grants to Pennsylvania Lions Clubs that allow the local clubs to fulfill our mission within their communities. Royer-Greaves' need for generators fits perfectly with the Lions' mission and goals."

This is not the first time that support from the Lions Club has improved the lives of students and adults at Royer- Greaves School for Blind.

"From our common purpose of serving those who are blind or visually impaired, a partnership arose and has continued to grow for decades," Mayer said. "What is most appreciated by me is the Lions' commitment to go above and beyond in their mission; where there is a need there is a Lion."

Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) Addition to Goddard Park



One of the identified risks within our community is sudden cardiac arrest (SCA).

According to the American Heart Association, SCA is a leading cause of death

in the United States. When a sudden cardiac arrest occurs if the heart rhythm is not quickly restored, death is imminent. An automatic external defibrillator (AED) is a small device that analyzes the heart and then prompts the user to deliver a shock to restart the heart. Having an AED close to the public will enhance a person's survival rate should an emergency arise.



London Grove Township Fire Marshal, Robert Weer recently secured a grant to reduce the cost of an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) System that is now placed at Goddard Park. The Avon Grove Lions Club donated \$1,500 to cover the cost of the AED as well as a



cabinet to secure the system. The system is placed between the restrooms at the park.
