
Basket Raffle!

DISTRICT 14-C LCI CONVENTION BUS TRIP MONTREAL, CANADA June 22, 2022 through June 29, 2022 BUS TRIP INFORMATION



Based on your responses to our survey earlier this year, District 14-C is offering a bus trip to Montreal, Canada, for the 2022 Lions Clubs International Convention. The trip will begin on Wednesday, June 22, 2022 and end on Wednesday, June 29, 2022. Here is our itinerary:

Wednesday, June 22

- Depart Wednesday, June 22nd multiple pick-up locations
- Drive to Alexandria Bay, NY, with several stops along the way to stretch, eat, and use the restroom (lunch is not included in the package)
- Check into our Alexandria Bay hotel (Riveredge Resort)
- · Dinner together at a local restaurant

Thursday, June 23

- Breakfast at the hotel
- · Shuttle boat to Heart Island and tour Bolt Castle
- · Return to Alexandria Bay, board bus, and drive to Montreal Thursday afternoon
- Check into our Montreal hotel (Hotel Delta by Marriott) and pick up convention materials Thursday afternoon/evening

Friday, June 24, through Tuesday, June 28

- Enjoy all of the activities the LCI Convention has to offer
- Guided bus tour of Montreal (date and time to be determined depending on the convention schedule)

Wednesday, June 29

Board our bus and drive home, making restroom, stretch, and lunch stops along the way (lunch is not
included in the package)

The cost of the trip, PER PERSON, varies depending on the number of people sharing a hotel room:

- 1 person \$1,190
- 2 people \$993 per person
- 3 people \$941 per person
- 4 people \$882 per person

THESE PRICES INCLUDE all transportation costs to and from Montreal, lodging in Alexandria Bay, dinner and breakfast in Alexandria Bay, shuttle boat to Heart Island, tour of Bolt Castle, room deposit for your Montreal hotel room, LCI Convention registration, guided bus tour of Montreal, driver's lodging in Montreal, parking fees for the bus, and driver gratuities. THESE PRICES DO NOT INCLUDE lodging in Montreal (other than your room deposit) or any meals other than dinner and breakfast in Alexandria Bay. You may subtract \$225 from the prices listed above for individuals who will not register for the LCI Convention. PLEASE NOTE - At least one registered convention attendee must occupy each room we reserve in our Montreal Hotel.

A deposit must be paid for each person registering for this trip. The deposit, PER PERSON, varies depending on the number of people sharing a room, as shown below. The deposit covers the following costs: deposit for Wolf's Bus Lines, Montreal hotel room deposit, and LCI Convention registration:

- 1 person \$475
- 2 people \$375 per person (\$150 if not registering for LCI convention)
- . 3 people \$342 per person (\$117 if not registering for LCI Convention)
- 4 people \$325 per person (\$100 if not registering for LCI Convention)

Half of the remaining balance must be paid by April 1, 2022, and the remaining balance must be paid by May 1, 2022.

The nightly rate at Hotel Delta by Marriott is \$167. With taxes, the rate is just under \$200 per night. The room deposit included in your trip deposit will be credited to your hotel account. Each party will need to present a credit card at check-in, which will be used to pay for the remaining balance on your account upon check-out.

All participants on this trip will need a VALID PASSPORT to cross the border. THE PASSPORT MUST HAVE AN EXPIRATION DATE AFTER SEPTEMBER 29, 2022. Under current guidelines, anybody crossing the border into Canada MUST BE FULLY VACCINATED, SHOW THEIR VACCINATION CARD, and PROVIDE PROOF OF A NEGATIVE COVID-19 TEST within 72 hours of entry. We will continue to monitor these rules and provide updates.

We MUST HAVE at least 30 people register for the trip by JANUARY 20, 2022, to cover the deposit for Wolfs Bus Lines, which will hold our bus and our hotel rooms in Alexandria Bay. We MUST HAVE at least 40 people register by FEBRUARY 28, 2022, to confirm the trip. If we do not have 40 registered by that date, those who have registered will decide if they are willing to pay an additional fee for the trip.

If we can get 40 people to sign up for the trip by JANUARY 7, 2022, those who are registering for the LCI Convention will get a \$50 discount in their registration fee. If we have 50 or more people sign up by February 28, 2022, everyone will receive a \$50 discount on the price of the trip.

Nobody will be registered for the LCI Convention until we have at least 40 people signed up for the trip or until a group of less than 40 decides to move forward with the trip for an additional fee.

Trip insurance is available through Wolf's Bus Lines. Insurance must be purchased within 14 days of registering for the trip in order to cover cancellation due to a pre-existing health condition. This insurance will cover cancellation due to COVID-19. Participants are advised to include the cost of their hotel room in Montreal in the amount of insurance coverage they purchase. This trip is open to Lions from other districts. We will be traveling along Interstate 81 from Harrisburg, PA, to Collins Landing, NY. If interested, we invite Lions who live close to Interstate 81 to contact us about the possibility of joining us on our trip to Montreal.

From International President Douglas X. Alexander...

Dues Adjustment Resolution Will Be Voted on at 2022 International Convention

Dear Lion,

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, hybrid convention, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

New Children's Village Sessions Names Same great experience!

Every now and then a little remodeling is necessary. Each year at the work weekends we spruce up the camp; This year we also spruced up the Children's Village session names. But, have no fear, we still provide the same great experience for our Campers!

- <u>Camp A.L.I.V.E</u> will now be known as <u>Camp Sensational</u>. This session is designed for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder and/or intellectual challenges. The Camper-to-Counselor ratio is 3:1. Dates for this session are June 4-9 and registrations are due by May 25.
- Assisted <u>Living</u> will now ben known as *L.E.A.P.* (<u>Learners who Explore Achieve and Persevere</u>) This session is
 designed for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The Camper-to-Counselor ratio is 4:1.
 Dates for this session are June 18-23 and registrations are due by June 8.
- V.I. will now be known as ConnXions. This session is designed for individuals with vision loss. The Camper-to-Counselor ratio is 6:1. Dates for this session are July 16-23 and registrations are due by July 6.
- <u>Camp Energy</u> will now be known as *Camp AD(H)Dventure*. This session is designed for individuals with ADD/ADHD. The Camper-to-Counselor ratio is 5:1. Dates for this session are July 30—August 6 and registrations are due by July 20.
- CV Family Camp will now ben known as Camp Unite. This session is designed for families with children with disabilities. Dates for these sessions are June 11-15 and July 2-6. Registrations are due respectively by June 1 and June 22.

Our other sessions are as follows:

Children's Village

<u>Project New Hope</u> is for PA Disabled Veterans and their families. Dates for these sessions are June 25-29 and July 9-13. Registrations are due respectively June 5 and June 29.

I am happy to tell you that my home club, the Blandon Lions Club, has agreed to become a model club. We submitted the commitment form on February 28th. At that point, we had 39 members, so we need to get to a total contribution (since 2017) of \$19,500 to reach the commitment. We have three years to pay the approximately \$6000 left. We are confident that through club donations for Melvin Jones Fellowships and personal donations we will make that commitment.

We are the only club in our District 14p which has committed to being a model club. A couple other clubs are close to being able to be a model club. Our Campaign 100 chairman, PIP Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada, reports that as of March 15th, we have raised \$265,790,364 worldwide and have until June 30th to raise the balance in cash and pledges. We had 4459 model clubs as of that date. Also, as of March 15th, 951 grants have been awarded during this fiscal year for a total of \$27,943,842. Thank you for helping LCIF reach this level of service.

Elder abuse (violence, psychological abuse, financial, sexual & neglect) has been on the rise during the Covid-19 pandemic. It's time to take the crisis seriously.

Key Facts.

- 1)Approximately 1 in 6 people 60 years & older experienced abuse in community settings this year

Elder Abuse: "Silent No Longer"

What is Elder Abuse?

Elder Abuse is a term used to describe any knowing, intentional, or negligent act by a caregiver or any other person that causes harm or a serious risk of harm to a vulnerable adult. Elder abuse can come in various forms:

Physical/Sexual Abuse

Hitting, pushing, kicking, punching, pinching, biting, unnecessarily restraint, intentionally causing pain, intentional misuse of medication, sexual abuse/exploitation, etc.

Verbal Abuse

Calling names, put-downs, making fun, embarrassing/humiliating, criticism, etc.

Emotional Abuse

Threats of harm or abandonment, manipulation, mind games, gaslighting—making you feel crazy, isolation, noncommunication, intimidation, control, etc.

Financial Abuse

Pressure to make or making undue changes to legal, financial documents, theft of or withholding of funds, identity theft, etc.

Neglect & Self-Neglect

Deprivation of basic needs: food, water, housing, clothing, hygiene, medical care, emotional/social engagement, etc.

Self-Neglect involves an older adult, living independently, who is unable/unwilling to care for themselves leading to an environment threatening to health and safety.

Risk Factors for Elder Abuse

There are some factors that can put an older adult at increased risk for experiencing abuse including:

- An adult child who is still dependent on their older parent for financial assistance or housing—especially in cases where the adult child suffers from mental illness or a substance abuse disorder (addiction).
- A history of domestic violence in the home or family—as families grow and age, present problems of domestic violence often continue.
- Living with others in isolation— prevents likelihood of reporting of abuse.

PA Statistics on Elder Abuse

In national statistics, 1 in 10 adults 60+ have experienced some form of abuse. In Pennsylvania, since 2016, we have seen a 32% increase in number of reports of elder abuse—with a 38% increase in substantiated, or proven, claims of abuse.

- The age group most reported to be in need of protective services in PA were those between the ages of 81—90 and almost half of them lived in their own homes.
- 46.8% of perpetrators of abuse were between the ages of 30—59 and 16.7% were identified as family members.
- The most common substantiated forms of abuse were: self-neglect, caregiver neglect, financial exploitation, physical, and emotional abuse.

Reporting Abuse

In the state of Pennsylvania, if you work with and suspect abuse of an individual over the age of 60—you are mandated to report it to the appropriate authorities.

PA Statewide Elder Abuse Hotline

 If you believe an adult is being abuse and their life is in imminent danger, call 911 immediately! Then report directly to protective services.

To make a report you may need to know:

- Age of the victim
- Address of the victim
- Victim's level of physical/mental capacity
- Date of the incident
- Whether or not there are weapons present in the home, if there is a history of drug/alcohol abuse or domestic violence in the home.
- How the alleged perpetrator might react to a worker coming to the home
- What the best times to visit may be

Failure to report suspected abuse is a crime.




