The end of September marks the end of the first quarter of our Lions year 2019-2020. I know many of you look to the District Leadership for help in this vital area of membership growth.

Here is something to think about. Do we need a master plan to increase membership? If every Lion in our District look in the mirror and ask, "why did you become a

Knock on the Mayors front door, speak to borough council, visit schools and employers. Here it is....one year later and Parkesburg is thriving. There was no magic wand or potion. They did it through hard work and because they cared.

LCIF



During September, I visited five of our District 14P Lions Clubs and I have more scheduled. I want to visit all of our Lions Clubs to talk about our Lions Clubs International Foundation which is now over 50 years old and has given out over 1 billion dollars in grants.

I have not yet received a report for September, but here is an update from August. As I said in last month's *Lion Eyes*, our District 14P goal for this year is \$56,281 which is up significantly from what our clubs contributed in 2018-2019, but up a much less amount from what we contributed two years ago. Breaking this amount down into

a monthly figure, our goal for August was \$2814 and the actual amount we donated was \$2696. So we were \$118 behind the monthly goal.

At a presentation by Past International President Joe Preston to the State Council of Governors in August, all Lions are being asked to do three things.

- 1. You can donate. Lions are LCIF's biggest supporters and provide the vast majority of contributions. Your donations sustain LCIF and make our work possible, whether that is close to home or continents away. All our service is important. All our donations are important.
- 2. You can advocate. Lions are better than anyone at telling our story and sharing the message and impact of our work.
- 3. You can volunteer. Lions implement projects our Foundation funds, either in part or in full. Your service then enables us to achieve our program goals. More importantly, our service helps those who need support and compassion, often in their darkest hours.

Although as said in point 1 above, Lions are LCIF's biggest supporters, this generally comes from our clubs and Melvin Jones Fellowships. Only 6% of our Lions Clubs members contribute individually to LCIF. All of us are being asked to contribute at least \$100 per year for the next three years. You can donate by mailing a check to Lions Clubs International Foundation, Department 4547, Carol Stream IL 60122-4547 or by using the "Donate" button on the LCIF webpage. A \$100 donation (\$2 per week) from only half of our District 14P membership would get us to our annual goal this year.

Thank you for your support of LCIF and I look forward to visiting your Lions Club to talk more about "our foundation".

Morgan has issued a call for the 2019-2020 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors to convene for its **second Regular Meeting at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, November 2, 2019** at the Woodlands Inn and Resort, 1073 PA-315, Wilkes-Barre, PA. **State Council will also hold a Preliminary Meeting at 2:00 p.m. Friday, November 1, 2019, at the hotel.**

In addition to the State Council meetings, select state committees will meet Saturday morning, November 2, 2019 at the hotel. *State committee chairpersons and coordinators desiring to be assigned meeting times and space must contact the State Office prior to October 1, 2019*.

Three meal functions will be held as part of the State Council meeting weekend. The annual Lions of PA Foundation Banquet will be held Friday evening, followed by a luncheon and evening banquet Saturday. RSVP forms are included in this Call of Meeting packet.

Individuals desiring discounted overnight accommodations at the Woodlands Inn and Resort should use the following online link: https://www.choicehotels.com/pennsylvania/wilkes-barre/ascend-hotels/pa657/rates?ratePlanCode=LLCI. Committee chairpersons/coordinators who have an Action Item for State Council to consider at the November 2 meeting **must** submit that item in written form to the State Office no later than Wednesday, October 16, 2019. Any Action Item proposal received by the State Office less than 14 days prior to a State Council meeting must be approved by a two-thirds vote (12 of 18) of the Council of Governors before it may be presented for consideration. An Action Item that does not receive the needed two-thirds vote for consideration will be tabled until the next State Council meeting. Committee chairpersons/coordinators with Action Items must be present or have a representative at both the Preliminary and Regular State Council meetings. With some notable exceptions, all oral committee reports to State Council will be subject to a three-minute time limit. Complete versions of all written committee reports will be included in the official minutes of the State Council meeting.



Lions John and Kimberly McGrath, members of the Amity Township Lions Club accompanied a United Methodist Medical Mission Team to the regions of Medellin and Concordia, Columbia South America. With them was a 14P KidSight Spot Camera to screen children and adults for vision problems. They were able to screen over 200 children and 400 adults and provide them with glasses from the New Jersey Recycling Center. The technology of **Spot Camera** enabled the mission to fit more people with glasses.

We would like to thank the Clubs of 14P who have financially supported the KidSight Program over the years. A **Big Thanks** to Central Berks, Blandon, Spring Township, PBM, Amity Lioness, Mohnton/Cumru, Reading Pagoda, Coventry, Shartlesville, Hamburg, Honey Brooks, Eagle Glenmore, Elverson Morgantown, Amity Township, and Exeter Township. We were able to purchase a **New Spot Camera and Printer** in September with the above donations and a generous donation of \$3500 from the Amity Township Lions Club.

We're winding up our first spring and summer screening with the use of our **KidSight Trailer**. While it had very positive response from our clubs who participated, we did have a few situations that need improvement. The first was a transportation of the trailer to the screening site. We need more volunteers to transport the trailer to the screening sites. The only requirements are to have a full-size pickup truck with a 2-inch ball hitch (we can provide the 2-inch ball). The second is we need help to find screening opportunities for next year. Now's the time to start planning for next year's screening opportunities, so please contact us at peshober@ptd.net.

The Annual Meeting of the Bing Miller Foundation will be held on Sunday November 17, 2019, and the following 2 items will be presented for approval for addition to the constitution and for a change to an Article in the By-Laws section.

ARTICLE 111--SECTION 4-APPOINTED MEMBERSHIP:

Now reads that appointed membership consists of current DG, 1VDG,2VDG, and the current president of the PBM Lions Club. There is also omission of the word office in a sentence.

PROPOSED CHANGE TO READ:

Appointed membership shall consist of the current District Governor. The Active Board of Directors of the Bing Miller Foundation may appoint up to 3 additional members to the Board by invitation. These invitations shall be extended to the 1VDG,2VDG, and the current President of the PBM Lions Club. Such appointed members shall be entitled to all rights and privileges bestowed upon Active Board Members, except the right to hold office. Appointed Board Members shall count toward the 30 Director limits. The Appointed Membership status shall terminate upon the completion of their respective office term.
