

The Pennsylvania Lions Global Leadership Team (GLT) has already accomplished a great deal this Lions year. Our amazing faculty held three Vice District Governor trainings along with the three-day January retreat preparing your VDGs to be our future leaders. Our team also held two Spring and Fall Leadership Symposiums which were well attended. The February symposiums trained 60 Lions about subjects such as Ethics, Leadership Styles, Fundraisers, and Putting the Fun in Service. In conjunction with the February symposiums, we held a food drive collecting 275 pounds of non-perishable foods that were donated to local pantries. This excellent attendance brings the total of PA Lions furthering their training by attending the Symposiums to 125 for the 2022-2023 year.

As of mid-February, there are no spaces remaining for the Multiple District 14 Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI). In fact, we always plan on a maximum of 40 Lions attending, however, this year we have 45 applications to attend the RLLI from Pennsylvania Lions. After consulting with the members of the Global Leadership Team and faculty, the decision was made to accept all 45 applicants so everyone who wants to attend has the opportunity to do so. Sixteen of our seventeen districts have at least one representative registered to take advantage of this motivational training event.


These three days of intensive training are beneficial not only for your Lions' service, but possibly your work life as well. 

THE 500 CLUB SUPPORTS BEACON LODGE CAMP



PDG Cliff Martin, 14-E, came up with the idea of establishing the 365 Club to help defray the maintenance costs of the Pennsylvania Lions Beacon Lodge Camp. Basically, it was a penny a day (\$3.65) per Lions member with the hope each club would be a 100% participating club.

In 2009, due to inflation, PCC Brian McCarl suggested we make it the 500 Club (\$5.00). Over the 30 years of existence, the 365/500 Club has raised over \$1,032,734 for the maintenance of the Camp.

That's the good news, now for the bad news! Donations to the 500 Club are diminishing. We have about 16,000 Lions in MD-14 but only 5,000 (30%) contribute to the Camp. THAT IS SAD. 

BEACON LODGE CAMP IS A PENNSYLVANIA LIONS' SPONSORED PROJECT



The **Little Beaver Lions Club**, **14-N**, began a partnership with Northwestern Primary School, a part of the Blackhawk School District, in 2007 with a program titled "**Lion Listeners**." These Lions are volunteers who assist students with their reading for 30 minutes at the beginning of the day. They do not read to the students but assist them in reading to the Lions. Ten to twelve Lions volunteers serve as reading mentors to

kindergarten, first and second grade students. The teachers assigned students on the basis of who needed the most help. Later a program of "**Math Helpers**" was added where the Lions played math games with selected fourth grade students who were behind in their work. The Lions also helped with Grandparents' Day and various other programs.

Read Across America week is celebrated from March 2nd until March 6th and coincides with the birthday of Dr. Seuss. In 2015 the Little Beaver Lions started a book program for Northwestern Primary by purchasing a Dr. Seuss book for each of the 328 students. This continued through 2017 when Northwestern Primary School merged with Blackhawk Intermediate School in Chippewa Township. The Lions were not deterred and moved the program with them, adding third and fourth grades. Over nine years they have purchased and distributed more than 8,000 books. These are not books for the school library; they are for the children to take home.


COVID-19 caused a pause in participation at the school, but the Lions continue to participate in Read Across America with the purchase of books. This year they were able to reenter the schools and the book program resumed with amazing enthusiasm. Students, teachers and administration welcomed them back with open arms. High fives and hugs were the order of the day, and the Little Beaver Lions were more popular than ever. Six separate presentations with books and treats were held for all of the students in Northwestern Primary, Blackhawk Intermediate and Patterson Primary Schools. The Lions hope to restart the Lion Listener program next year.

After a three-year COVID pandemic induced delay, the Norwin Lions held their eighth Annual Cubcake Wars fundraising event on Sunday, March 12, 2023, at the Norwin High School cafeteria.

This event features numerous bakers who are making delicious cupcakes (the cubcake is a play on words for Lion Cub) that are sold. The bakers are in a competition for best tasting cubcake, best decorations, most funds raised, and people's choice for best in show. All funds benefit the Norwin Lions and its Kitty Sack Project.

The Norwin Lions' Kitty Sack Project is in its tenth year to feed needy children over the weekends. Unfortunately, when many children in our community leave school on Friday, their last healthy meal is their school lunch. From then until Monday when they return to school to await patiently for lunch again, they may have had little to eat over the weekend.

The Norwin Lions Club is actively working to help these children by providing gift cards to local grocery stores. These food gift cards help feed each needy child during the school year weekends. The Lions deliver the gift cards bi-weekly to the various schools.

Presently we serve three elementary schools and the intermediate school in the Norwin School District. We are currently feeding about 70 children through our program. It takes almost \$400 to provide food for one child for a school year which amounts to about \$20,000 this year.

Please support this program by attending our fun Cubcake Wars. The event is open to everyone of all ages and is very family friendly.



Cost is \$3 each with two permitted per household. The city received a \$90,000 state recycling grant to cover the additional cost for the 45-gallon bins, which have wheels and lids.

Srinika and Aarya are firmly committed to expanding their "Recycle for Sight" program. "With the help of this program many people will experience corrected vision for the first time, enabling them to lead productive working lives, support their families, attend school and advance their education." To further their goal, Srinika recently donated to Mission Vision a \$200 Seed Funding grant she was awarded by North South Foundation's Young Changemakers Journey (VC.1) of which she is a member.




Re: PA State Sales & Use Tax Exemption Form

Date: July 7, 2021

Pennsylvania State Sales and Use Tax Exemption form awarded to the PA State Council of Lions Clubs for use by clubs during fundraising projects. This form is valid through February 2026 and may be duplicated as needed but **SHOULD NOT BE POSTED ON CLUB OR DISTRICT** websites or social media where it would be accessible by the general public. We do not want to risk losing the exemption as the result of improper use of this form.

Courtesy of Multiple District 14 Legal Counsel Lion Ashley Grimm:

"The PA State Council of Lions Clubs is registered in Pennsylvania as an Institution of Purely Public Charity under The Institutions of Purely Public Charity Act, 10 P.S. § 371.et seq. As such, it, and its subsidiary clubs, quality for an exemption from PA Sales tax. This means clubs are exempt from paying sales tax when they purchase goods or services. It does NOT mean they are exempt from remitting sales and use tax to Pennsylvania during fundraisers."

NO LIQUOR IN RAFFLES!

Liquor not permitted in basket raffles

Please be aware: A popular staple in basket raffles is a "no-no."

After researching the matter with the Executive



Director of the PA House of Representatives' Liquor Committee and the PA Liquor Control Board, MD-14 legal counsel Lion Ashley Grimm reported that "liquor is not permitted to be in a basket for purposes of a raffle. This also includes silent auctions.

"This equates to selling liquor without a license," Lion Grimm said. "A wine and spirits gift card is permitted to be included in a raffle basket, though." Lion Grimm's research supported the opinion expressed by Lawrence County Treasurer Richard Rapone in a recent New Castle News story that had prompted MD-14 State Council Chair Bill Morgan to contact Lion Grimm.

As part of the News story, Capt. Jamie Jones of the LCB Enforcement Bureau said including any type of alcoholic beverage – be it a six pack of beer, a bottle of wine, a bottle of whiskey or the like – is a violation of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code, Title 47, and is an unclassified misdemeanor offense. The fine upon conviction is \$500, levied to the organization sponsoring the fundraiser and not the donor of the basket.

In the News story, Rapone pointed out, under the state's small games of chance law, it is illegal to host basket raffles at fundraising dinners used to benefit someone who is sick.
