




DIGNITY THROUGH SERVICE

And although I am the 99th international president, each of my predecessors having had their own priorities and approaches, international presidents have shared a common commitment to service. So I hope my year as president is

something that has been inherent in Lions' service since Melvin Jones first gathered Lions together. But by intentionally focusing on my theme and keeping it in the forefront we can be sure to maintain and even improve our commitment to service. As a doctor, I have always been dedicated to healing and to do so while treating patients in a dignified manner. A good doctor not only treats illness but pays attention to the entire person—their worries, their concerns, their struggles. If you had asked me after many years as a doctor if I treated the whole person, I would have said, "Of course." But it took a serious illness for me to re-evaluate my approach as a doctor. Likewise,



as Lions we are dedicated to service, but reassessing our approach and focusing on the dignity of others in all we do will take our service to a new level. I ask each of you this year especially to bring dignity to children. Through a project or program I ask you to make their lives better. Working together, 1.4 million Lions can help the next generation prosper and secure good health, find opportunity and achieve happiness.

Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada, of Minokamo, Gifu, Japan, was elected to serve as president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 98th International Convention held in Honolulu, Hawaii, USA, June 26 through 30, 2015.

President Yamada is a neurosurgeon.

A member of the Minokamo Lions Club, President Yamada has been a Lion since 1985. He has held many offices in the association, including district governor and GLT constitutional area vice leader. He served on the international board from 2005 to 2007 as a member of the Executive Committee and the Long Range

Planning Committee and Vice Chairperson of Convention Committee. He also served as a board appointee for 2011-2012.

In recognition of his service to the association, President Yamada has received numerous awards, including the Humanitarian Partner Award, 10 International President's Awards and an Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lion activities, President Yamada is chairperson for several organizations including the Social Medical Corporation Koseikai, the Kizawa Memorial Hospital, the Social Welfare Corporation Jikeikai, Nozominooka Hospital and Ajisai Nursing College. He is a standing director of the Japan Hospital Association and an affiliate professor at Gifu University.

President Yamada has been active in the area of international relations, serving as president of the Gifu-Hungary Friendship Association, Gifu-Morocco Association and Gifu-Salzburg Association. He is a recipient of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Hungary, the Medal of Honor of the Alaouite Dynasty of the Kingdom of Morocco and an honorary citizen of Beijing City, China, in recognition of his service to international friendship building.

President Yamada and his wife, Dr. Toshiko Yamada, also a Lion and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have one son, one daughter and three grandchildren.

2015-2016 Cabinet Meeting Schedule





We have collected over 800 pairs of hearing aids to date. Please continue to recycle hearing aids on our behalf.

We have 4 new 1 bedroom apartments to assist those needing medical treatment in Winnipeg. This past year 28 people have stayed with us for anywhere for 2 days to 3 months.

We were pleased to award **62 Hope Medals** and **21 Ben Ward plaques** to clubs. Your contributions mean a great deal and individuals receiving this recognition are deserving.

The Parade of Green generated \$40,875.00 from all 3 Districts for the Lions Eye Bank, Lions Foundation and Lions Hearing.


With our combined support we made someone's life a little easier!

Tinnitus Research with Acoustic and Noninvasive Neural Stimulation

The University of Minnesota's Departments of Biomedical Engineering and Otolaryngology are seeking individuals who have tinnitus to participate in research involving acoustic stimulation, electrical stimulation of different skin surface regions, and noninvasive brain stimulation to potentially decrease the tinnitus percept. Participation involves up to 16 testing sessions that typically occur once every 1-2 weeks at the University of Minnesota. Each testing session will require up to 3 hours. Participants will complete questionnaires, perform several tests to determine their hearing and tinnitus characteristics, be presented with different stimulation paradigms, and describe changes in their tinnitus from the different tests.

Partipants must be an adult between 18 and 65 years of age, have tinnitus preferably for less than 5 years, have no history of seizures, not be pregnant, and not have any implantable devices or indwelling metal. Participants will receive compensatation for their participation in each testing session in the form of a \$60 Visa gift card that may be used at any retailer that accepts Visa. The first informational visit will take approximately 1.5 hours and will be compensated with a \$40 Visa gift card. There is no charge for participating in this research. Revised Suspension Policy

The Board of Directors amended the suspension policy that affects clubs that have not paid their club balances in a timely manner.

A Club which has an unpaid balance in excess of US\$20 per member or US\$1,000 per club, whichever is less, outstanding past 120 days will be automatically suspended including the charter, rights, privileges, and obligations of the Lions Club. In the event, the Club does not reach an active status by the 28th day of the month following suspension; their charter would be automatically cancelled.

Beginning July 1, 2015, clubs will automatically be placed on Financial Suspension if balances beyond **90** days are equal to or exceeding US\$20/ member or \$1,00or greater, and cancellation will occur after the 28th day of the month following suspension if full payment is not received. As a result, anticipated high suspension will be reported in October and April. Also, clubs cancelled more than twice will be ineligible for reactivation.

Suspension is the temporary deferment of the charter, rights, privileges and obligations of a Lions club due to an unpaid balance.

Clubs on suspension shall not:

- a) Conduct service activities
- b) Conduct fund raising activities;
- c) Participate in district and multiple district functions or seminars;
- d) Participate in any voting procedures outside of the club
- e) Endorse or nominate a candidate for district, multiple district and international office;
- f) Submit Monthly Membership Report and report forms;
- g) Sponsor a Lions club, or organize a Leo or a Lioness club.



a)Hold meetings to discuss the future of the club and identify the steps needed to regain an active status.

b) Make Payments to clear the existing outstanding balance, or request a payment plan.

This amended policy has serious consequences for clubs that are in arrears in paying their club balances. To rectify this past due condition, clubs placed on suspension may regain an active status by paying the balance in review and update the membership roster after a Club is released from Suspension.
