- * For all three sessions, registration will begin at 6:00 pm and the training will be from 6:30 to 8:30 pm. This time is set so participants can get home at a reasonable time. Last year, some participants complained that they did not have time for dinner before the training and the coffee and bars, though good, were not enough to satisfy their hunger. My suggestion for those in that situation is to bring a bag lunch and eat it during the registration period. To include a meal would make our training run later and would require us to give up our attempt to offer hands-on computer training for MyLCI at a school instead of a restaurant. Because there are no computers available at Transcona, please bring a laptop with you if you are able.
- * It is especially important that the 2016-2017 club presidents, secretaries, treasurers and membership chairmen to attend, but others who may be interested in finding out about what is involved in some of these offices for the future are welcome to attend also.
- * If you are a new officer, please contact the out-going officer to obtain their MyLCI log-on information. LCI does not allow you to sign on until the club secretary reports your club's 2016-2017 officers via MyLCI. Please ask your club secretary to send in their 2016-2017 new officers list to LCI prior to the training to help you to be able to sign onto MyLCI with the help of the instructor. I noticed that MyLCI has the training section open now, rather than the end of May. It seems LCI is listening to us. It would be especially helpful if out-going secretaries could attend the training with the new secretary to assure that your club information is not lost. Perhaps they could walk the new secretary through the April reporting process during the training.
- * We plan to have a different opening session for all participants. If there is something you would like us to include, please contact me soon. Also, bring any questions you have relating to your new office so that they can be discussed and hopefully answered.

If Presidents, secretaries, and treasurers (especially if they are brand new) would go through this material before our district training they would have some of the basics and have the opportunity to ask questions and get answers about things they did not understand or things that were not covered. It would be wonderful to have interactive classes rather than just a regurgitation of responsibilities of each office. That is very hard to do if participants come as blank slates to the classes.

The center currently helps 28 local family's with a food hamper every two weeks.

The center is located at 132 Centrale Ave the entrance is just behind the knights of Columbus hall. If you find your self in need of a little extra at any time registration is easy you can reach the center at 204-371-4984 The center is also open every other Wednesday between 2 and 4 P.M.

If you would like to help out with food donation there are donation bins located at Ste. Anne Builders Supply, Ste. Anne Groceries, Ste. Anne Catholic Church, Ste. Anne Dayspring Fellowship Church and Burnell's Food Plus in Richer.

Suggestions of food needed are canned tuna, salmon, chicken, turkey, vegetables (peas, green beans, corn, lentilles), canned fruits canned Stew, chili, Pork & beans, peanut butter, Infant food (puréed chicken, beef, cereal, milk – with Iron), pasta (spaghetti, macaroni), rice, spaghetti sauce, canned tomatoes, cereal (with fiber and not sugar coated) and canned soups.

significant progress in their core strengths and levels of self-esteem.





Can Do Canine Update

Thanks to the support of Lions Clubs across 5M, Can Do Canines continues to train specially trained for people with disabilities and provide them to those in need, free of charge.

One recipient of a Can Do Canines assistance dog is Lion Bill Monson. Bill now has a greater sense of freedom, independence and peace of mind since thanks to Mobility Assist Dog Percy. Read their story below.

BILL MONSON & MOBILITY ASSIST DOG PERCY

Bill Monson of Columbus, Minn. worked as an auto mechanic for 25 years until his back was broken in a terrible accident. Bill worked for five more years and endured four back surgeries until he and his doctors decided he should retire. Bill now uses a wheelchair to get around. He stays active, but there are many times when he needs help.



"I'm not supposed to reach down to pick things up," he says, "and I need support when transferring from my wheelchair to another area."

As a member of the Columbus Lions Club, Bill was familiar with Can Do Canines, so he applied for an assistance dog and was partnered with Mobility Assist Dog Percy, a two-year-old black Labrador retriever. Today Percy helps Bill by picking things up, opening doors and drawers, and taking his socks off.



Bill says, "I drop things a lot and I don't even think about it anymore. Percy will hand it to me and look at me like 'don't reach for it, don't bend over, I got this."

One of the best things Percy does is use his nose to close the footrests on Bill's wheelchair. Bending over aggravates Bill's back, so having Percy on hand to help is a big improvement.

Bill continues his involvement with the Columbus Lions and wants to tell his story to other clubs. With Percy at his side, he's an advocate for Can Do Canines, thanking the organization for all they've done for him.

Volunteers are not paid, not because they are worthless but because they are priceless.
