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Warroad Lions Remember

Last Tuesday, the Warroad Lions Club held their annual Garbage Can Feed at The Point. Lions Club members, families and guests of honor gathered at the west picnic shelter for dinner and a short program to honor and remember three late Lions Club members: Lloyd Wilmer, Frank Matlachowski and Don Hanson.

To honor these members, miniature bricks of those to be placed at the Leader Dogs for the Blind facility in Rochester Hills, Michigan, were presented to their families.

The Leader Dogs for the Blind program was founded by three Lions International members in 1939 with the support of one club and is Lions supported by Clubs from all over the world. Leader Dogs for

the Blind is innovative program, inclusive and dedicated to providing high-quality services to their clients in a respectful and empowering environment. They fly prospective clients who are in need of a seeing eye dog to their facility in Michigan and provide them with intensive training before, during and after completing the program; and thanks to the support of Lions Clubs International, all of this is free of charge. Now in their 76th year, Leader Dogs for the Blind has placed over 16,400 seeing eye dogs with people who need them.

There are thousands of bricks in the "Walk of Fame" at the Leader Dogs for the Blind headquarters in Michigan, most of which serve as memorials to members that have passed on. The bricks are a fundraiser to help offset the operating costs of the program and it is tradition here in Warroad to support the facility by purchasing a brick in memory of a late member.

And so, at the Garbage Can Feed last week, Leader Dog chair Ken Bauer brought greetings from Leader Dogs for the Blind in Michigan, and was on hand to present the memorial bricks to Lloyd's wife, Sunny, and Frank's wife, Dawn.

Warroad Lions Club member Mike Kvarnlov spoke to those present and said, "Tonight it is with great pride that we as the Warroad Lions are going to honor three of our favorite Lions that have passed and gone on to the great Heaven above. We have chosen as a Lions Club to make a special dedication to these three individuals in memory of what they did for the Lions Club in Warroad.

Hello fellow Lions.

It's been a hectic month, our granddaughter is growing and we are giving her lots of attention. Our first daughter's wedding was at the beginning of the month and we partied for a few days and now I am helping both son in laws with several projects. We

also had a few days to go up north about 450 miles north. practice for all the driving I will be doing as DG next year.

As our Lions year 2015 - 2016 is now heading

into fall (hopefully a wonderful one) I would like to continue to encourage the clubs to keep working on those club projects and as you do please make sure that you let the local media know about it. This is one way I know that may attract new members.



I had a great time at my Leader Dogs Visit in August and returned with lots of information. In fact I learned that Last year alone the graduated over 200 dogs, six of those being trained for visually and hearing impaired individuals. The process of becoming a Leader dog is long and strenuous. The puppies stay is with their mother for 7 weeks they are then evaluated by the school, if they are accepted they spend 52 weeks with puppy trainers who welcome these puppies into their homes for 52 weeks. They then return to Leader Dogs school and train for another 20 weeks and then are matched up with an individual requiring their services. There is then another few weeks of training with the person receiving the dog, all in all about 81 weeks or almost a year and a half. Only about 40% of the dogs bred end up



a Leader Dog graduate. The cost to do this is about \$39,000. Just think this dog gives it's recipient a new source of independence, we heard several touching accounts of how a Leader Dog changed its human's outlook on life.



My favorite rendition was about how the dogs are taught intelligent disobedience, this is when a dog is given a command to do something and can see (and reason) that it is a dangerous and questionable action and will refuse to carry it out to protect the individual from harm. There are other services provided by Leader Dog talking GPS training, Orientation and mobility training, and youth camps. Leader Dog is presently in the process of renovating the center at a projected cost of 14. 5 million dollars. This will allow



for newly renovated training areas, an expanded puppy area, centralized veterinary services, and a new breeding area. This will allow for more and better socialization for the dogs. All Lions need to pledge to raise another 1.2 million for Leader Dogs, so remember we are Knights of the Blind. Lets help Lion Ken Bauer and other Leader Dog Chairs reach



this goal. when the clubs are providing funding Lets keep Leader Dogs in our hearts.

The Lions 100th. anniversary challenge is still going strong. We as Lions need to help service one hundred million people worldwide in the areas of Youth, Vision, Hunger, and the Environment. We have now hit the 42 million persons mark as of July 16th. Youth account for 16 million, Vision for 7 million, Hunger for 8 million, and Environment for 11 million. I know that if we as Lions set our minds and our hearts to it we can achieve this goal.



Our members routinely ask, "What's in it for us?" Don't leave them guessing. For example, members may not care about rising membership statistics. Numbers for the sake of numbers are not inspiring. As a leader, focus on how our members will benefit

caring fresh energy, more capability for service, etc. Reframe what we

Tell a story.

Our brains are programmed more for stories than for abstract ideas. Paint a picture of how Lions service is improving the lives of others with a story. Include personal anecdotes, helping to establish a closer connection between leaders and teams. Speeches information. convey Stories create genuine connections.

Invite participation.

of something bigger than themselves. They want to create meaning. They want to know their input is valued. Take every opportunity to invite them to contribute with ideas, energy and effort.

Reinforce optimism.

Great leaders are more optimistic than average. Share your optimism. It can open the door to a wealth of ideas, resources and opportunities. Spread the word—optimism can be contagious!

Show you care.

Make sure our members know that you, as a Lions leader, genuinely care about their well-being as individuals. We've all heard the famous quote from Theodore Roosevelt, "No one cares how much you know, until they know how much you care." Encourage them to reach their potential by showing you care.

It's up to you, as a Lions leader, to inspire and motivate your teams to even higher levels of achievement. That's how we can maximize our Lions leadership impact, achieving our goals while strengthening the pride for the future.




Dog Guides BBQ Fundraiser

Quanto's Law/Walk for Dog Guides

New legislation with harsher penalties for those who harm or kill trained service animals is now in effect.

The Justice for Animals in Service Act -- also known as Quanto's Law -- received royal assent last month and came into force on June 23.

The law was named after Edmonton police service dog Quanto, fatally stabbed several times as he latched onto a suspect fleeing from officers on foot on the morning of Oct. 7, 2013. The five-year-old German Shepherd was rushed to an emergency vet clinic, but was dead on arrival due to blood loss and injuries to the heart and lung area.

Following Quanto's death, the federal government looked at creating new legislation to protect service dogs. Three weeks later, Quanto's handler and another officer with the canine unit were invited to Ottawa to watch the prime minister's Throne Speech, which mentioned Quanto's law.

"The service that our dogs and service animals in general are capable of producing is really remarkable," acting Staff Sergeant Adam Segin with the Edmonton police canine unit said Thursday.

"It's nice that there is now this formal recognition of their service, how valuable it is and that there is now a deterrent in place for anybody who would consider harming a service animal."

The legislation has created a new Criminal Code offence that specifically prohibits injuring or killing animals that are trained to aid law enforcement officers, people with disabilities or the armed forces.

The maximum penalty for such an offence is five years behind bars, and the minimum penalty for killing a police dog in the line of duty is six months.


"This sends a strong message to anyone who wants to injure or kill a service animal in the line of duty, that this will be met with very serious consequences," said Edmonton-Sherwood Park MP Tim Uppal, Minister of Multiculturalism.

"These animals -- they are here to protect us and we should be protecting them."

Quanto's killer, Paul Joseph Vukmanich, was sentenced to 26 months in prison after pleading guilty to a number of charges including animal cruelty, flight from police, possession of a dangerous weapon and impaired driving. The 27-year-old was also banned from pet ownership for 25 years and prohibited from driving for five years.

Quanto is the fifth Edmonton police service dog killed in the line of duty. He helped with more than 100 arrests during his four-year career.

As a tribute, RCMP have created a plaque that was placed beside the employee entrance at K-Division headquarters in north Edmonton, approximately 100 metres from where the dog was stabbed.

Hands-on Service Activities

Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service organization with almost 1.4 million volunteers. As volunteers, we serve without being paid; not because we are worthless, but because we are priceless.

Today's volunteer is focused on the service that the club will provide and the personal satisfaction and enjoyment attained through the service experience. As we plan our activities for the year, we must remember to include service projects. The LCI Service Activities Committee recommended that service projects fulfill the following criteria:

- Exemplifies the "WE SERVE" motto and has relevance to Lions internationally
- b. Meets an important community or humanitarian need
- Achieves measurable outcomes benefiting service recipients
- d. Provides hands-on involvement by Lions club members *
- e. Includes leadership roles for Lions
- f. Promotes public awareness of the Lions service mission
- q. Is sustainable.



*Last year I heard many Lions complaining that all of their efforts seemed to be for raising funds and although this is important, they missed the hands-on involvement of a service project for the sake of serving and not raising money. When you hear a Lion talk about the "AHA MOMENT" when they really became a Lion it will usually be connected with a hands-on service activity.

Club officers have access to MyLCI and can view service projects that have been conducted by other clubs. Many great ideas are shared in the Lion Magazine. There are more suggestions on www.lionsclubs.org. Ask clubs to share their favorite service projects at your zone meetings. When you send in a picture of your service activity to our District Newsletter, add a brief description of what your service project accomplished so that others clubs can share your good ideas.

Join in the Legacy at Leader Dogs for the Blind

Since the first bulldozer pulled on campus in August 2014 to where we are now is the most comprehensive renovation project this building has undergone. The Caine Development Center is aptly named because it isn't just our kennel but houses puppy development, a veterinary center, breeding program and the staff and volunteers. At any time, we can house up to 310 large dogs in this facility—it will, when complete, cover almost 80,000 square feet. Parts of the current building date back to the 1950s.

"It was state of the art in the 1950s but today our clients travel in more complex environments to get to work, school...we need to raise a much different type of dog to handle these changes," states president and CEO Lion Sue Daniels.

The Lions have reached \$1.6 million of the \$3 million goal in the first year. "This is such a huge commitment from the Lions and it is coming in gifts of all sizes. Lions started Leader Dog and their support is still as important today as it was in 1939", states Lion Mike Dengate, Lions capital campaign manager.

Tinnitus Research with Acoustic and Noninvasive Neural Stimulation

The University of Minnesota's Departments of Biomedical Engineering and Otolaryngology are seeking individuals who have tinnitus to participate in research involving acoustic stimulation, electrical stimulation of different skin surface regions, and noninvasive brain stimulation to potentially decrease the tinnitus percept. Participation involves up to 16 testing sessions that typically occur once every 1-2 weeks at the University of Minnesota. Each testing session will require up to 3 hours. Participants will complete questionnaires, perform several tests to determine their hearing and tinnitus characteristics, be presented with different stimulation paradigms, and describe changes in their tinnitus from the different tests.

Partipants must be an adult between 18 and 65 years of age, have tinnitus preferably for less than 5 years, have no history of seizures, not be pregnant, and not have any implantable devices or indwelling metal. Participants will receive compensatation for their participation in each testing session in the form of a \$60 Visa gift card that may be used at any retailer that accepts Visa. The first informational visit will take approximately 1.5 hours and will be compensated with a \$40 Visa gift card. There is no charge for participating in this research. 


