2016 World Diabetes Day Events Held

In November -All across Minnesota - in Fridley, Brooklyn Center, Roseville, Duluth and Rochester inside Walmart Stores, and in Worthington and Windom at Hy-Vee Stores, and in Jackson at Sunshine Foods - MN Lion's Diabetes Foundation trustees hosted World Diabetes Day events to help identify those at risk for type 2 diabetes and provide information on ways to lower the risk through lifestyle change.

World Diabetes Day was created in 1991 by the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) and World Health Organizations in response to the increasing health threat posed by diabetes. Diabetes is a growing epidemic. One in four people will be diagnosed with diabetes in their lifetime.

Over 1,000 people across the state participated at our community events!

MLDF partnered with these organizations on this event: The U of MN Extension Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed), Local YMCAs, and Health Care organizations that provided Certified Diabetes Educators.

Huge Thanks to all of our partners and to Walmart for providing us the space and staff along with the water bottles filled with snacks for all who participated, and gift certificates for drawings at each location.

This tremendous effort succeeded in creating awareness as to the increasing numbers of people who are at risk for type 2 diabetes, identifying those at risk and providing resources to help individuals make potentially lifesaving changes to their lives.






Zone 3 Meeting



Can Do Canines

Thanks to the support of Lions Clubs across 5M, Can Do Canines continues to train specially trained for people with disabilities and provide them to those in need, free of charge.

One recipient of a Can Do Canines assistance dog is James Pick. James now has a greater sense of freedom, independence and peace of mind since thanks to Mobility Assist Dog Oakley. Read their story below.





JAMES PICK & MOBILITY ASSIST DOG OAKLEY

Brainerd, Minn. resident James Pick has a new roommate: Mobility Assist Dog Oakley. James is living with multiple sclerosis (MS), a chronic disease which attacks the central nervous system. "Because of my MS I have problems with balance and I fatigue easily," says James. Without family close by James and his loved ones were living with a lot of worries; with Oakley around James has an assistant to help him with tasks as well as providing greater peace of mind for both himself and his family.

Mobility Assistance Dog Oakley is a gorgeous three-and-a-half-year-old black Labrador. James notes that she is very polite, well-behaved, and a great worker. Oakley was trained by Can Do Canines staff. She retrieves dropped items for James such as his cane or cell phone, helps tug off clothing, opens and closes doors, and braces to help James up if he falls. Having Oakley as his Mobility Assist Dog fills James' life beyond the daily help with tasks, "Oakley is my best friend."

"Retrieving items for me and taking my socks off at night are some of the most significant things she does for me every day."

Oakley has changed James' life immensely. "I feel like I'm not alone in this anymore. I have someone who loves and cares for me. I didn't realize how much it would help my psyche," says James. Oakley and James are a successful team because he made Oakley's training a top priority. He took the training so seriously that he put playing his guitar (his most favorite activity) on the backburner in-order to be fully present. James feels proud and a sense of accomplishment for the energy and commitment he's devoted to training Oakley.

LIONS VISION SCREENING

WHY is vision screening important?

The first few years of a child's life are critical in the development of good vision. Children should have their vision checked for issues such as misaligned eyes, and problems that need correction with eyeglasses. These problems are not always evident by simply looking at a child. Young children often compensate for vision problems so well that parents, teachers, and pediatricians are unaware of a problem. Many common vision robbing conditions such as "lazy eye" can be effectively treated if detected in a child's formative years. Age group from 6 months to 6 years is the prime age group to be tested.

KidSight, a Lions Club community service program provides a simple, non-invasive and cost-free vision screening test performed on young children. It requires no medication or preparation and is PAINLESS. It does require parental permission.

KidSight screens for the following:

Hyperopia – "Far-sightedness" is the difficulty seeing objects that are near. Untreated this can contribute to "crossing of the eyes" but can be corrected with glasses.

Myopia – "Near-sightedness" is when the eyes focus incorrectly, making distant objects appear blurred. It can be treated with glasses.

Astigmatism- A condition in which the cornea has an abnormal curve causing out-of-focus vision.

Anisometropia – This condition can adversely affect the development of binocular vision in infants and children. The brain will often suppress the vision of the blurrier eye in a condition called Amblyopia or "lazy eye."

Strabismus – Eyes are not directed to an object simultaneously. Sometimes the eyes deviate outward and sometimes inward.


