
DG Doug's Report



CPR Holiday Train Rocks at Whitemouth

People from around the region gathered in Whitemouth on Dec. 2 for the arrival of the Canadian Pacific Holiday Train, a successful campaign to promote awareness and raise funds for food banks across North America.

The event was organized and presented in partnership with the Whitemouth Lions Club with support assistance from the RCMP and fire departments from the RMs of Whitemouth and Reynolds. There was no fee to attend the event, but people were asked to make either a cash or nonperishable food donation.



The Holiday Train is approximately 1,000 feet in length, encompassing 14 rail cars with hundreds of thousands of LED lights creating a spectacle that must be seen to truly appreciate.

CP reports that it takes 30 elves 100 days to decorate the train before starting out on the journey across the country. The train features a modified boxcar that acts as a travelling stage, allowing the full front wall to open for performers to deliver a festive show for the entire family.

The Whitemouth performance featured Canadian entertainers Melanie Doane and Crystal Shawanda who delighted the crowd with seasonal favourites.

Santa Claus was on the scene doling out candy canes to the children in the crowd, and joined the band on stage for an entertaining version of the classic holiday tune, Santa Claus is Coming to Town.

The Holiday Train has been operating since 1999, and during a pre-donation speech, Steve Sugars, Holiday Train spokesperson, announced that CP is celebrating the Holiday Trains's 15th Anniversary.

Since its inception, the CP Holiday Train has raised close to \$7.4 million and approximately three million pounds of food for North American food banks.

This year the train will be making 150 stops, and all money raised in each community stays in the community benefiting the local population.

Sugars, along with CP Holiday Train spokesperson Salem Woodrow, presented Whitemouth Lions Club president Shannon Malkoske with a \$4,000 contribution to the local food banks.

Betty Walls, Whitemouth Lion's Club Holiday Train Coordinator reported that \$353.80 was collected that evening along with 965 pounds of nonperishable food items. The Lions Club Donated \$1,000 and received \$100 from Reeve Allan Kropelnicki on behalf of the RM of Whitemouth.

"Thanks to all the people of Whitemouth and area for your generosity, and for coming out and helping support the local food banks," Kropelnicki said to the crowd.





The Lions Club delivered the food items and a combined total of \$5,453.80 to the food banks in Beausejour and Lac du Bonnet on Dec. 3.




Alvarado Lutefisk Dinner

RLF Lions have record year of donating

The Red Lake Falls (RLF) Lions had a record year donating financial support in their 2013 fiscal year. 2011 and 2012 donations were high at \$7,187 and \$4,894 respectively, but 2013 topped with expectations \$8,500 fiscal support local, statewide regional, and international projects.

RLF saw \$3,600 of these funds put directly back into the community through

several avenues. The local Lions chapter partnered with other local organizations to assist in funding many community projects, such as the RLF Women of Today's Santa Day and Summerfest, and Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) book distribution. The book distribution came from a direct initiative by the Lions International Organization President to support reading. The Lions contacted the local ECFE and provided books to families attending ECFE events so that they could encourage reading in their homes.

They sponsored a breakfast for the Diane Brumwell Hoops for Hope Memorial Tournament where proceeds were donated to Hoops for Hope to fund a cure for cancer. For over 20 years they have sponsored tee shirts for a smoke-free project where local J.A. Hughes kindergarteners pledge to remain smoke free.

Yearly they sponsor three \$500 scholarships to graduating seniors and silver coins for one junior high and one senior high student that are honored at the Lafayette High School honors breakfast. The J.A. Hughes elementary football program, Lafayette H.S. yearbook, RLF Dial-A-Ride, Red Lake County (RLC) Relay for Life, RLC 4-H and RLF Girl Scouts have also benefitted by donations from the local chapter this past year.

Most recently donations have been made to the Veteran's Memorial Walkway, Lafayette H.S. softball, RLF summer recreation and the RLF Volunteer Fire Department.

The remaining donations made by the local chapter went to fund Lions International, part of which was used for humanitarian projects on a regional and statewide level, and into the Lions Club International Foundation, which brings help to communities and individuals in times of crisis, tragedy or catastrophe, among other things.

The Lions International has four cornerstones to which they focuses their service: saving sight, serving youth, providing disaster relief and meeting humanitarian needs. Saving sight encompasses several programs to provide vision screening, correction, and loss prevention to millions who don't have access to care. They serve youth by focusing on supporting education and teaching positive life skills, including character development, social and emotional learning, civic values, substance abuse prevention and service learning. Disaster relief services provide immediate assistance with basic needs, such as food, water, clothing and medicine to disaster victims, as well as ongoing investment into rebuilding homes, lives and communities. The Lions strive to meet humanitarian needs by serving those with disabilities to lead more independent lives through partnering with Habitat for

Humanity to build handicapped-accessible homes, maintaining an affordable hearing-aid program and tackling global health issues. Many of these international programming areas are actually interconnected to the local community, as eyeglasses are collected in RLF for distribution abroad and several families and individuals in the region have benefitted from the disaster relief and humanitarian need services.

The Lions also do service work throughout the community, such as ditch cleaning, bell ringing for the local Salvation Army and assisting with the Hillcrest family picnic. Even their fundraisers provide a service to the community. Pork burgers and baked potatoes are served up as concessions at high school football games and give the crowd a hot dinner option while the annual corn feed serves as a community picnic in the summer. "The community has been so supportive of any fundraiser," says chapter Past President Kevin Reich. "Without community support, we wouldn't be able to be a part of the community." The chapter also uses raffles for fundraising, and is mindful to purchase prize items within the community, such as Wood Master Grills.

The current chapter boasts 42 members, the largest in recent history. "We've tried to become more active, visible, and supportive in the community and it shows in how we've been able to grow and retain memberships, in how we've been able to support the community, and in turn how they've supported us," says chapter President Ed Turn. Both Reich and Turn credit Keith Fontaine's enthusiasm for the organization's recruitment of new members and commitment to retaining as a main reason for their successful membership.

Reich explains that the need to serve his community has kept him involved in the organization. "There was a time I was going to walk away from the group, because I wasn't getting the personal satisfaction. In attending an international convention for the organization, my eyes were opened. I was looking at it from the wrong perspective. As a Lion, we all have the same purpose, to serve, regardless of your personal situation. They day you join and they day you become a Lion are two different days, and that day I became a Lion."

"The Lions is a very diverse group," says Turn, "We have charter members, new members and people of different age groups and interests, and they collaborate on different projects. It makes us unique." That uniqueness translates into the chapter's identity and place in the community. While the chapter strives to serve all four key areas of service, their main local interest is in strongly supporting youth, which is evident in the local programs they choose to fund. In recent years they have been committed to projects associated with the schools, including financial support for a school gardening project and athletic equipment.

"It's always about building a better community," said Turn of his reason for 43 years of membership with the organization. "There's a lot of large projects, but there's also a lot of small projects that aren't publicized, but make a difference in someone's life. It's the growth of the members as individuals too, their leadership and abilities growing together, getting new members involved in the community and building that leadership." The individual growth and leadership within the RLF chapter is evident as six members, Allen Bertilrud, Keith Fontaine, Ed Dahle, Vaughn Thorfinnson, Pat Alcorn, and Jim Rystad have been awarded the Melvin Jones Fellowship award, the ultimate honor within the organization.

Lions Eye Bank, Lions Foundation & Lions Hearing Manitoba and Northwest Ontario, Inc. News

The administrative offices of the Lions Eye Bank, Lions Foundation and Lions Hearing of Manitoba & Northwest Ontario, Inc. share news of our ongoing business.

Lions Eye Bank

We continue to fund health facilities requiring necessary equipment. We support Misericordia Health Centre yearly, Thunder Bay Vision Care Centre, Kenora Lake of the Woods Hospital and Swan Valley Health Care facility.

We also support many community libraries with E-Readers and magnification devices throughout the three districts.

We support the many requests for financial assistance re: surgery and treatments outside of city, town or province as well as providing eye exams and eyewear for those in need.

We collect, sort and send recycled eyeglasses to Calgary to be shipped to developing countries. We support CLERC (Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre) and shipped over 32,000 pairs of glasses last year.

The Lions Eye Bank spent in excess of \$100,000 last year funding facilities and individuals.

Lions Foundation

By far, the Lions Foundation sees increased demand for funding requests. The Foundation strives to meet the needs of many requiring assistance other than vision. This includes; mobility equipment, ramps and out of city, town or province medical treatment. Last year the Lions Foundation spent in excess of \$90,000 meeting the needs of many.

Lions Hearing

We provide funding assistance for children and adults needing hearing aids. Last year we assisted 11 people and spent \$15,000.

We work closely with Provincial Audiology to create the Lions Children's Hearing Education and Resource Centre allowing support and access to families making decisions about their child's hearing growth.

We are also working to provide a Telehealth program meeting the needs of many Northern and rural individuals regarding consulting, diagnosis and treatment. This program will accelerate attention to their needs and reduce costs for travel to Winnipeg.

Lions Rural Housing

The Lions Foundation provides fully furnished apartments at a reduced rate for those families from outside the city of Winnipeg needing medical treatment. Last year we were able to accommodate 45 people from all three districts from 2 days to 2 months. Due to the demand we are in the process of providing additional apartments.

We are pleased to announce we have created a "flagship" administrative office complex for Lions Eye Bank, Lions Foundation and Lions Hearing. We are equally pleased to announce that the Provincial Audiology program has located their offices in our new facility.



Lions Float in Rose Parade—Matteo's Dream

Building Mateo's Dream; A Park for Children of All Abilities

René Henderson and Liz Lamach of Concord, Calif., have a reason to smile during a difficult time. An inclusive playground for children of all abilities built in honor of their deceased son, Matteo, will be a float design in the 125th Annual Tournament of Roses Parade.

"Since Matteo's passing, it's been kind of bleak and dark," Lamach said of her son who passed away in 2011. "This is a ray of light. It kind of opened a door that has been closed for a while."

Matteo was blind and suffered from cerebral palsy. He was the inspiration for a "Matteo's Dream," a city playground built for disabled children in 2007.

Lions Help Make Matteo's Dream Come True

Lamach wanted a playground where Matteo could play shoulder to shoulder with other children. She enlisted design firm Leather & Associates and local Lions clubs to make the dream a reality.

"I insisted on rubber surfaces, which was unheard of because most designs had gravel or sand," said Lamach of her quest to design a practical park. "I was warned of the cost and that it would delay the opening. But I told them I would rather wait a year and be able to do it right."

The playground made headlines in the Bay area for being one of the first inclusive parks in the region and also because the community built it in eight days.

"This would not have happened without the Lions," said Lamach. "There would be no Matteo's Dream without the Lions club."

Lions raised \$750,000 to help build the park.

More than 3,000 volunteers erected the 12,000 square-foot playground. Many of the volunteers were members of the 45 Lions clubs in the region.

"It was like a barn raising, when the whole community would come together to help a neighbor build a barn," said Concord Director of Parks and Recreation Joan Carrico. "It is very rare in that you get to see something like that in your career. It was just very special."

Carrico considers Matteo's Dream to be a destination park and said people still occasionally call or write to her office about how much they appreciate a park where kids of all abilities can play. In fact, according to Carrico, the park is so popular the most frequent calls they receive are to reserve spots for parties.

"I have to remind people that it's a public park and it's first come, first served," she said.

Inclusive parks catering to children of all abilities are not common. But Matteo's Dream is an example of the growing need for more inclusive parks.

"It was definitely a new way to experience play together," said Amanda Baker, who drove two hours to visit Matteo's dream with her family so her 3-year-old daughter, Tatum, could play with her siblings.

Baker, who will be cutting the ribbon on an inclusive park in her city this week, took 20 family members to Matteo's Dream.

"All of the kids were so exhausted," she said of their first trip in February, which was filmed to help them raise money for their park. "They were emotionally and physically spent."

The video shows Tatum laughing and moving around the park on her wheelchair while playing with her siblings and cousins. The smile on her face alone, shows the importance of inclusive parks.

Baker was excited to hear Matteo's Dream would be honored as a float in the Rose Parade.

Lions Clubs International President Barry Palmer has challenged Lions all over the world to dream big and take on projects that turn the impossible into possible. Lions felt Matteo's Dream was a perfect fit for this year's Tournament of Roses theme "Dreams Come True.

"It's just an incredible honor," said Matteo's mother René Henderson who was laughing and crying at the same time when she found out about the float with Lamach. "I was touched more than I can say."

Next week, the Lions Clubs will be hosting a maintenance and clean-up day for Matteo's Dream. Lamach and Henderson will be there as both have joined the Concord Lions Club.

Both Lamach and Henderson will be traveling to Los Angeles a few days after Christmas. On December 30, they will join with other Lions Clubs to help decorate the float.

On Jan. 1, 2014, they will ride the float together wearing shirts with Matteo's photo on it.

Donate for Life Rose Parade Float—Light Up the World

This New Year's Day, all 7,740 roses adorning the deck of Donate Life's float in the 2014 Rose Parade, themed "Light Up the World," will carry a personal dedication of love, hope and remembrance, realizing a dream first envisioned by float organizers in 2006. Donate Life's "Light Up the World" won the Theme Trophy for best presentation of the Rose Parade theme.

"We thank the individuals and organizations whose tributes to deceased donors, living donors, transplant recipients and those awaiting transplant contribute to the life-saving and healing mission of Donate Lifeâ[™]s annual Rose Parade campaign," stated Bryan Stewart, chairman of the Donate Life float committee and vice president of communications at OneLegacy, the nonprofit organ and tissue recovery organization serving the greater Los Angeles area. "We are also thankful to Josiah's House for supporting the Donate Life Dedication Garden's deeply meaningful purpose as a vessel for expressions of love, hope, support and remembrance." Josiah's House, a Tennessee-based nonprofit ministering to boys living in destitute circumstances in the Dominican Republic, is named after Josiah Berger, who is honored with a memorial floragraph portrait on this year's Donate Life Rose Parade float.

"Josiah's House is deeply honored to support such a meaningful component of the Donate Life Rose Parade Float," said Steve Berger, who together with his wife Sarah founded Josiah's House. "We formed Josiah's House to give hope to homeless and abandoned children. When we learned how we could help the Dedication Garden bring hope to so many people in need of transplants and honor those who, like our son, saved and healed lives through organ, eye and tissue donation, we embraced the opportunity."

The Donate Life Dedication Garden presented by Josiah's House will be escorted by 30 float riders – all grateful organ and tissue transplant recipients – and 12 living donors walking alongside five beautiful lanterns adorned with 81 memorial floragraph portraits of deceased donors. The 7,740 dedicated roses will be sustained by tagged vials with handwritten and printed dedications from individuals, families and organizations touched by organ, eye and tissue donation and transplantation, including:

- 1,481 dedications from individuals and families from all 50 states and the District of Columbia, all of which are posted to the float website;
- 1,482 roses sponsored by 48 hospitals, transplant centers and organizations, 40 which host rose ceremonies allowing donor families, transplant recipients and living donors to handwrite dedications.
- Over 1,200 dedications from CEOs of medical/surgical and children's hospitals nationwide, who were offered the opportunity to handwrite
 messages on behalf of their institutions by members of the Association of Organ Procurement Organizations and Eye Bank Association of
 America with support from the American Hospital Association.
- 163 "Roses for Registries" dedicated by state donor registries to the motor vehicle and government agency partners which have enrolled over 98 percent of the nation's 113 million designated donors. This program component is supported by a generous contribution from The Order of St. Lazarus.
- 39 "Roses of Hope" presented in person by six float riders all transplant recipients to transplant candidates through a grant In Memory of Michael E. Creighton.


In addition, the Donate Life Float Committee elected to dedicate roses in two categories:

- 1,095 roses "In Memory of All Who Passed While Waiting" for a transplant each day for the last three years, with each rose individually dated between Jan. 1, 2011 and Dec. 31, 2013; and
- 1,482 roses dedicated to each pediatric candidate on the UNOS Organ Transplant Waiting List as of Dec. 23, 2013. Each message is personalized with the child's initials and state of residence and is offered "with the hope that the gift of life light up your world in 2014."

The Donate Life float campaign is supported by more than 140 official sponsors nationwide, including organ and tissue recovery organizations, tissue banks, state donor registries, transplant centers, hospitals, funeral homes and affiliated organizations.
