

The dictionaries are purchased by the sponsoring organization and given as a gift for the children to keep.



The goal of this program is to assist all students in becoming good writers, active readers, creative thinkers, and resourceful learners by providing them with their own personal dictionary.

The dictionaries are a gift to each third grade student to use at school and at home for years to come. Educators see third grade as the pivotal year when students really begin their reading and writing development.

Lions Clubs International has been implementing the project since 2002-2003, with at least 340 clubs participating in the project and Lions have donated to more than 1,100 schools nationwide!

Construction of the Brick Plaza at the Indiana Lions State Office Building in Progress.


To date the main Plaza has been built. Engraved Bricks that have already been purchased will be included in the early spring. Final landscaping, benches and stone Lions will also be added. The Plaza is scheduled to be completed and dedicated next June.

It is not too late to purchase a Brick. Over 200 clubs have already been represented. Additionally, over 50 past officers and individual Lions have made purchases. The cost per Engraved Brick is \$100.00; a double brick is \$250.00. Each Club Brick will be placed within the district the Club resides. Additional Engraved Bricks are available to individual Lions, past Lion Officers and Lion organizations. Brick applications are available at the Indiana Lions Foundation website, www.harroldconsulting.com/foundation.

Additionally, Benches (2) are available for purchase by a club or individual for \$1,000.00 each. Stone Lions (2) are available for purchase by a Club or individual for \$750.00 each. The purchaser of either a bench or a stone Lion will be memorialized at the Plaza with an engraved Brick.

Four Steps to Successful Club Growth

There are many ways to successfully recruit new members. You can invite people to service projects, club meetings or special club events. Your club can conduct an "open house" or a "business after hours" event to promote your club. Growing your club is important because of the difference each new member can make in your club and community. Being visible in the community is one of the keys to recruiting new members.

Although the concept is simple – just ask – it's essential that your club prepare an effective outreach plan so you are successful when you're ready to ask. The process has four easy steps:

1. Prepare your club This phase is about understanding what your club wants to accomplish and what your recruiting and service goals are. Deciding what kind of new members your club wants to recruit is a key activity. CEP, specifically the How Are Your Ratings? survey, can help you identify any issues before inviting new members.

2. Creating your club's growth plan This includes the basic planning steps of who, what, when, where and how. The Just Ask! New Member Recruiting Guide is designed to guide your club through the process of recruiting new members and effectively managing club growth.

3. Implementing your club's growth plan In this step, you will reach out to target members and host an informational meeting for them. Inviting members is as easy as asking, but follow up is the key to success.

4. Welcoming your new members Once you've added new members, you'll want to properly welcome them into your club and involve them in club activities. Be sure to offer orientation and mentoring to build a foundation for success. The Lions New Member Orientation Training Guide helps new Lions understand your club, our association and their opportunities as a Lion. When new members are properly welcomed and involved in club life, they are more likely to remain in Lions for years.

Some Do's when asking someone to join.

Do train your current members how to recruit. A quick training session can prepare your members to share an 'elevator speech' or a quick overview of what impact your club is having and how it benefits them personally and the community.

Do get to know someone first. Invite them to join your team where their personal passion will benefit your club.

Do prepare for rejection. Not everyone will want to join. Asking does not cost a thing. Stay positive every time you ask.

Do consider recruiting to be everyone's responsibility. We all know someone who would be an asset to our organization.

How do I ask? What do I say? Three Simple Things Will Get You Started.

Example: Hi Karen, we are inviting wonderful people, like yourself to join our local Lions club. Lions are 1.3 million men & women in 208 countries and the largest service organization in the world.

- 1. We are dedicated to serving those in need in our communities
- 2. Our global mission is to assist those with visual impairment
- 3. We provide leadership training and opportunities for Lions members.

Would you like to join or be interested in attending our next meeting? I can pick you, if you like.

- Use the key messages above as written or in your own words. If time allows, you can expand on each message with your own personal experience.
- Practice this at a club meeting or special meeting. Partner up and role play.
- Reduce the fear. Have each member come to the podium and repeat your key messages. You are among friends!
- Print it on the back of a business card with your membership chair or your information on the front and practice saying it from time to time.

On Tuesday, November 12th the Kentland Lions club held their annual District Governor's Night at the Downtown Lounge. There were only three members in attendance with their spouses but the District Governor, Connie Roe, was happy to attend and present the club with some ideas for future programs and her insights for the year.

She was also happy to present Kentland Lion member, Steve Burton, with his 30 year member chevron.

The Kentland Lions meet at 7:00pm, the second Tuesday of each month at the Kentland Firehouse and new members are always welcome.

Although the membership is small, they are able to hold at least two fund raisers each year. The members along with members from the Morocco Lions provide BINGO at the Newton County Fair each year. The past couple of years this activity has been held in the church building or the old Pop Warner building.

They also provide the Kentland area residents with a very tasty Bar-B Q chicken cook out every Spring; grilling 250 chicken halves on the courthouse lawn. The monies from these endeavors help provide eyeglasses for area students or adults that are unable to afford them on their own. They have also donated to the past Wonderland of Lights and the Steve Ryan Community Center as well as other community functions.

Lions community service reflected in Lowell projects

For 75 years, the Lowell Lions Club has been quietly doing good works to benefit the community. Recently, though, Lions members roared a bit to acknowledge the 75 years of accomplish-

ments that have helped to guide the direction of the greater Lowell area. Lowell Lion John Piper said he's proud to belong to a growing organization that has given more than \$2 million back to the community over its 75 years. He joined five years ago after moving

to Lowell. "It is deeply woven into the fabric of this community. ... Plus, it's a great time. It's camaraderie, excitement, electricity," Piper said.

Piper said building membership is an ongoing project. Lions Clubs International took a pro-active stance toward maintaining membership that has helped, said Mel Goldman, Lowell Lions Club treasurer. "Knowing there was a decline in Lions all over the country, Lions International has allowed us to openly solicit members. That was an international policy change. ... We know there's attrition," Goldman said. "People are asked to join after a member has offered them up to the club," board member Paul Palmer said. When he was president several years ago, he took steps to increase membership, one reason he was recently honored with the Melvin Jones Award, the highest bestowed by the Lions Club International Foundation.

The history of the Lowell Lions is intertwined with that of the community. Ron Wietbrock, a 43-year member, hearkened back to the group's early days when the Lions borrowed \$15,000 to establish the town's first ambulance. He recalled, too, when the Lions paid for the high school football field. Many decisions to give have moved the community forward, he said.

Goldman, who has been known to don the Lowell Lion costume for the Lowell Labor Day Parade, said hundreds of thousands of eyeglasses have been collected locally and sent to Indiana University for reuse and Lowell Public Library patrons in need have benefited from the large print machine purchased by the Lions. The large-print book collection is added to annually, he said. School children are given free eye exams through the Lowell Lions and a partnership has been developed with Moses Eye Care to provide eyeglasses to needy children, Goldman said. The Lowell High School band has received uniforms, a trailer and more over the years, Wietbrock said.

Alice Dahl, the Cedar Creek Township trustee, said the Lions have done countless good works and can always be counted on to help. "They're always real accommodating," she said. She recently asked if they could build a ramp for an older woman in need who had come to the trustee's office. They did. "Every year, they give Christmas trees for our (poor relief) clients. ... You couldn't ask for a greater bunch of guys. ... They're mellow, and they get the job done," she said.

Club member receives top honor

Paul Palmer, past president and current board member of the Lowell Lions Club, was honored with the Melvin Jones Fellowship Award during the club's recent 75th anniversary celebration.

The highest award given by the Lions Club International Foundation is awarded to only one-third of 1 percent of Lions Club International members. It recognizes dedication to the humanitarian service that is a hallmark of Lions internationally.

Specifically, Palmer, a 28-year member who has held every office and chaired every project in the club, was honored for his unselfish devotion to the club through mentoring, service and community awareness efforts.

For many years, Lions Clubs International's motto was We serve. Now, Palmer said, the organization has expanded on that. " Now, it is: We care. We serve. We accomplish. I like that," he said.



For the office of 1st Vice District Governor or 2nd Vice District Governor, a written nomination of any active member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in District 25A, provided the nominee has secured the endorsement of his/her club or the majority of the clubs in the district. The written nomination and endorsement must be received by the nominating committee not later than thirty (30) days prior the district convention, this year being held on March 8, 2014.

(2) Secure the endorsement of his/her club or a majority of the clubs in his/her single or sub-district. (3) Have served or will have served at the time he/she takes office as second vice district governor (a) As president of a Lions club for a full term or major portion thereof, and a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than two (2) additional years; and (b) As zone chairperson or region chairperson or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof. © With one of the above being accomplished concurrently.


