

Indiana Lions Foundation Matching Grants

The Indiana Lions Foundation's Matching Grants Benefit Many Lions Charitable Projects

The Indiana Lions Foundation completed its fiscal year with \$24,652 in matching grants awarded to twenty-five clubs and Camp Woodsmoke as well as a disaster assistance grant awarded to District E.

These grants resulted in many benefits to our fellow Hoosiers through the enabling of these clubs in pursuing many charitable projects through the use of their charitable funds supplemented by Foundation matching grants. As a results of this club/Foundation partnership:

1. Children 1) learned to appreciate reading through listening to stories in their public parks, 2) received their own book and 3) accessed new books placed in their library

2. Children learned how to fish

3. Children were screened for vision abnormalities and dyslexia in their schools

4. Children received beds to sleep in when they had no bed and were given food on weekends when no food was available in their home

5. Children were able to attend Camp Woodsmoke with a working infirmary

6. Communities benefited by 1) receiving information through the erection of informational signs 2) being able to use ADA compliant restroom facilities and 3) being able to use modern plumbing systems and kitchen facilities in their community centers

7. The uninsured were able to receive medical care in a free clinic with updated exam lighting.

8. Communities were enhanced with new tree plantings and entertained by Fourth of July fireworks displays

9. First responders benefited by being able to use a working beverage cooler in their firehouse and by being able to have 'blue bags' available to treat autistic victims and traumatized children.

News Around the District—Hobart Lions Club

The Hobart Lions Club recently made a sizable donation of excess handicap equipment to Mobility Ministries serving handicapped and amputees in Malawi Africa.

Bob & Arla Gabrielse from Wheatfield have been serving the ministry since 2011. Lions Clarence & Sally Davis along with Joe Larson selected 68 walkers, 35 pairs of crutches, 50 canes to fill the trailer that will transport items on the first leg of a long journey.

Lions from Lebanon IN have also contributed to the project. The main item produced is an "Action Trike" which is a 3 wheeled vehicle pedaled with hands for people with no legs. In the area of Malawi many residents suffer from cerebral malaria which paralyzes limbs. Others are victims of animal bites often by hippoptamuses or alligators. Scarce medical care for those wounded led to amputation.

Over the years modifications of the wooden carts have changed to metal and plastic with larger tires that are 20 pounds lighter and can be adapted to use by even a child. The carts help them to get around by themselves instead of being carried or hauled by a wheelbarrow.

Many volunteers have created 3,926 carts since its inception, no longer are woodworkers needed. New skills are being used to work with the new materials, many are recycled from bicycles. They also need volunteers to pack the containers bound for Malawi which is a very small country near Mozambique. Several other organizations besides Lions work together to provide other handicap equipment for residents.

Arla told the remarkable story of a 19-year-old girl who viewed her disability as no hindrance. She now attends a university with the goal of becoming a banker. Her positive attitude has inspired others to go for their dreams. Another product provided by the organization are birth kits. Over 1,000 bags of supplies have been put together. It consists of large garbage bags for the expectant mom to lay upon, a razor blade to cut the umbilical cord, and towels.

Along with every donation a bible is offered. It is written in the Chichewa language native to the area. Many of the children are now learning English and Math. This gives the individuals a sense of dignity as they become upwardly mobile in their community.

Each cart costs approximately \$400 which includes shipping expenses. 230 can fit into a container. The crutches, canes, and walkers will fill in vacant space in the huge boxes. It takes between three and one half to four- and one-half months for the equipment to reach their final destination. The journey takes the boxes by sea, train and over 1,000 miles by truck to reach the small country. No trouble has been reported with customs officials. There are many local churches that appreciate the combined efforts of those helping.
