District Convention Delegate Certification and Elections

Planning to run for an office at our District Convention on March 7th? Planning to vote? Please remember that to do either, you must be a member in good standing, of a club in good standing. You know that to be a member in good standing, your dues are paid, right? So, what does it mean to be a club in good standing? I would refer you to the Lions International Board Policy Manual. The Board Policy Manual, Chapter V, Section, B, subparagraph 1 defines a club in good standing as the following:

1. Good Standing

A club in good standing is one:

- a. Which is not in “status quo or financial suspension”;
- b. Which operates in accordance with the provisions of the International Constitution and By-Laws and International Board Policy;
- c. Which has:
 - (1) District (Single, Sub-and Multiple) dues and fees paid in full; and
 - (2) No unpaid balance of International dues and fees greater than U.S.\$10, outstanding more than thirty (30) days; and
 - (3) No unpaid Lions Club International account balance greater than U.S.\$50, outstanding more than ninety (90) days.

As you can see, not only do your district and state dues need to be paid in full, but any other fees you may owe, such as supplies from the state office. Additionally, any supplies ordered through LCI must be paid (see above).

A Certified Delegate list will be pulled from the Lions Portal as well as the State Certified list will be provided by our State Comptroller. Either CS Robin or CT Sally will advise you if there are any outstanding balances due. If there are, you have until February 20th to bring the club into good standing. Please feel free to contact either of us or Nominations and Elections Chair, PDG Barbara Toosley with any questions or concerns.

Constitution, By-laws and Dues Payments

LIONS ALL:

Please be advised that there will be 10 Constitution and By-Laws Amendments brought forth to the Convention Delegation for voting during the Annual District Convention March 7, 2026. The details of these amendments will be provided to all Clubs in accordance with Article IX, Section 3 and Article X, Section 3 of our current governing document.

Please look for the mail providing the official notification with all proposed amendments attached and share the information with your club members. The email would have been sent no later than February 5, 2026.

Recently the state and district dues statements were sent out by me via email. These were issued to the club president, treasurer, and secretary. If this was not received by one of your officers, please notify me. One of the criteria of a club in good standing is having all dues paid.

It is time to pay your Lions Club dues for the second half of this fiscal year to the district. This covers the period from January 1, 2026, through June 30, 2026. It is based on the number of members that were registered at LCI on December 31, 2025. \$7 will be paid to state and \$3 will be retained in the district. It also includes any balance due on the account. Your prompt payment is appreciated.

Please note: This does not include dues that are payable to LCI. You must log on to the portal to obtain that portion of your club dues.



All roads this May lead to Plainfield and the 105th Indiana Lions State Convention, as we welcome Past International President Joe Preston and Lion Joni for a weekend of Lions' fun and fellowship. On behalf of the 2026 Convention Committee, we invite you to make the trip to the "Heartland of Indiana" on May 1-3, 2026.

With construction of I-69 to Evansville now complete, all of our districts now have quick and easy access to the convention. Whether you are traveling I-69 or I-65, I-70 or I-74, or US-231 or even the Old Historic US-40 National Road which runs right through downtown Plainfield, there is no reason not to pack up the car and make a weekend getaway to be with your Lions' family.

The weekend kicks off with tours of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA) on Friday morning, and then a BBQ dinner hosted by the Plainfield Lions Club at Made@Plainfield before the opening plenary session at the Embassy Event Center. Many of our local community police officers have graduated from ILEA since the first class in 1969.

The Saturday luncheon will feature Dr. Dan Neely as the keynote speaker. Dr. Neely is the medical director for Indiana Lions Operation KidSight preschool vision screening program, has served as the team ophthalmologist for the Indianapolis Colts, and gives of his spare time with Orbis flying hospital.

Past International President Joe Preston, of Mesa, Arizona, will be the keynote speaker for the Saturday evening banquet, and will be presenting several Leadership and Presidential Awards to the Lions of Indiana along with is certain to be an inspirational message about being a Lion.

In between these events, are district caucuses, the second plenary business session, exhibit hallway, seminars, Strides Walk and much more.

Notes from the Editor

Deadlines: You can submit your articles up until the last week of the month. The goal is to get this newsletter to everyone by the 1st of the month so that it is timely. If you have to get an article in late, it may be at the end of the newsletter rather than in a part of the newsletter that makes more sense.

Pictures: Should be in jpg or gif format, if it is sent any other way, it becomes a screenshot. Screenshots can be blurry; the goal is to make every image look good. The jpg and gif formats import best. The items that are most likely edited out of your submission are the images (that's why I'm called an editor). I tend not to publish more than 4 images per club, so if an image is important, I will prioritize it, just let me know.

Hoosier Lion: Articles must be in a doc format (not PDF) and images in jpg or gif.

Articles can be submitted to the Hoosier Lion upon club request. Articles are generally sent by your editor randomly; I try to not send the same clubs every time. Sometimes the DG asks that I send a specific article and/or image. In the end, the Hoosier Lion decides what to publish.

Other Notes: I really enjoy reading all the articles sent, our District really shows the spirit of "We Serve." Please encourage your clubs to submit articles and images every month. As this is an electronic newsletter, it's easy to devote a page to every club in the District.

Have an idea for an article, type of submission, or new column? Contact me! It's always good to add new things to keep the newsletter fresh.
