Million Meal Movement service project scheduled at the 2020 MWC

In Indiana alone, 1 million people, including one if five children, don't know where they'll get their next meal. Attendees at this year's Friday night service project at the Mid-Winter Conference, scheduled for January 10 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel at the Indianapolis International airport, will have an opportunity help provide an answer for hungry Hoosiers.

The Million Mile Movement (MMM), an Indianapolis-based not-for-profit, has a two-fold vision to feed the hungry and teach the importance of volunteerism. Annually millions of meals are distributed to hungry families throughout Indiana by thousands of volunteers. At the Friday night event at the Crowne Plaza, Lions will work to package precisely measured meals that will be given to agencies in Indiana. In a two-hour period, thousands of meals will be packaged, consisting of high-energy meals with vitamins and minerals, dried vegetables, protein, and rice. The meals will be distributed to food banks along with written instructions for their use.

Since the MMM was founded in 2007, over 28 million meals were packaged and distributed. The program has been highly refined, and each volunteer at a typical food packaging event can prepare 200 meals in an hour. Each meal costs \$.27 to feed an individual. MWC event organizers are hoping to have more than 100 volunteers at the Friday night packing, resulting in more than 20,000 meals prepared.

Additionally, a seminar session on Saturday, January 11 will feature representatives from the Million Meal Movement who will detail how local Lions clubs can develop partnerships in their own communities. The MMM is an excellent new service project that involves volunteers to meet the needs of over 1 million children and adults throughout Indiana.

INDIANA LIONS PROVIDE HEARING AIDS

Do you, or someone you know, need hearing aids but can't afford them? Lions Clubs of Indiana can help. The Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc., offers adults and children the opportunity to obtain needed hearing aids at little or no cost.

Lions International was founded in 1917 in Chicago by Melvin Jones. The organization now makes its headquarters in Oak Brook, Illinois. There are now over 46,000 clubs worldwide, with over 1.7 million members. It is the world's largest service organization dedicated to bettering the quality of life for the handicapped, the poor, the sick, and the aged. Their motto? WE SERVE.

In June of 1925 Helen Keller spoke to the Lions Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio. She challenged the Lions be "Knights of the blind". Later she stated that "I am just as deaf as I am blind. The problems of deafness are deeper and more complex, if not more important, than those of blindness. Deafness is a much worse misfortune. For it means the loss of the most vital stimulus – the sound of the voice that brings language, sets thoughts astir, and keeps us in the intellectual company of man."

The Lions stepped up and accepted Helen's challenge. Most people are probably aware of the Lions' eyeglass and vision programs. They see the eyeglass collection boxes around town. They give people in need the ability to see clearly, some for the first time in their life. But many are unaware that the Lions organization also works to help those with hearing loss. Over 21 million Americans suffer from some degree of hearing loss. At least one million of those are children.

The Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. project was formed in 1980 and incorporated in 1981. Their outreach includes the Hearing Aid Loaner Bank, Preschool hearing screenings, summer camps for youth with hearing loss, and Cochlear implants. Speech and Hearing, Inc., also offers scholarships for students pursuing careers in Audiology and Speech Pathology. They also provide grants for research, materials and equipment to the Speech & Hearing Departments of the major state universities of Indiana.

The Hearing Aid Loaner Bank is based in Riley Hospital, Indianapolis, Indiana. The loaner program was begun in 1980 with 23 hearing aids. Since that time, it has loaned out over 62,000 hearing aids to those in need. Funding for this outreach program comes from donations by individual Lions members and from Lions Clubs throughout the State of Indiana.

If you have used hearing aids that are not needed anymore you can give them to any Lion member or drop them in one of the Lions eyeglasses drop boxes. They will be greatly appreciated.

Those with hearing difficulties can contact a Lions Club or Lions member for a referral. Or they can also go to the ILSH website: indylionsspeechhearing.org. Hospitals, Senior Service Organizations, commercial hearing aid centers, and Audiologist's offices are other sources of information.

The patient's information will be forwarded to an Indiana Speech and Hearing Trustee, who will then review qualifications and options with the applicant. They must have notable hearing loss that can be improved by hearing aids. And they must meet the income limitations to qualify.

South Haven Lions Club helping shine the light for South Haven firefighters

SOUTH HAVEN – South Haven firefighters will be able to shine their light a little brighter and keep them safer thanks to a recent donation from the South Haven Lions Club.

This week members of the club presented a ceremonial check for \$2,864.50 to members of the department representing the purchase of 50 Stream Life Survivor flashlights. Each firefighter on the department will be receiving a flashlight.

"We are partners with various community groups and help provide funding in many ways," said Jason Kegebein, president of the South Haven Lions Club. "We felt we wanted to do something a little broader and asked what could we do for the fire department."

Kegebein said they met with the department firefighter/ paramedic Eric Wood who expressed the need for the new equipment. The funding for the flashlights came from two grants secured by the club along with funds from its general account.

"This gives everybody their own personal flashlight," said firefighter/paramedic Christine Gospodarek, adding when firefighters enter a structure, it is dark and having the flashlights, which include a clip to attach to their gear, will assist in firefighting.

"It is a lifesaver," said Gospodarek.

The flashlights also are also equipped with a strobe function which a firefighter can activate if he or she is in a dangerous situation and needs to be located.

The Lions Club previously donated defibrillators and stuffed animals to the department.
