

Good criticism, called constructive, is helping the person see what they have done wrong and giving help or encouragement to make it right. But there is also the other type of criticism, which is destructive. This one only tears down those receiving it and does nothing to help them change the situation. Fierce criticism is damaging to all who receive it. This kind of criticism can break a club apart so very fast. It can also damage a District if it occurs among current or past leaders.

Are we following our Code of Ethics if we are only destroying others with what we are saying and not giving any encouragement? Lions, this needs to stop now! What's the saying 'If you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all?" If there is a problem among your club members or leadership, whether in clubs or the District, tell the person you need to tell, but help with a solution to the problem. An encouragement or solution goes a lot further than constantly criticizing someone. Plus, the person receiving the criticism will take it better if praise of some type is in the mix.

This holiday season, I want every Lion in our District to practice this. During the holidays, everyone gets busy, and stress levels are high. When we're collaborating with our fellow Lions preparing for the project, let us all try walking away from a situation that may have arisen and upset us. Take a deep breath and calm yourself down. Please don't use words in anger because it won't help the situation.

## Mission 1.5 starts with you

DG Stephen and his Leadership team are here to help 25A contribute to this effort. Secondly, during the International Convention in Boston, one key change to the LCI Constitution was approved by the voting members. **This change creates another member category: Discounted Member.** 

This "Discounted Member" is the Lion whose dues were discounted when Family Groups were added a few years back.

As an example, Lion John Smith pays full International dues and is the head of a Family Group. His wife, Lion Mary Smith, is a Family member and pays half the Int'l dues. Lion Mary is now considered a Discounted Member. Under the new rule, the Discounted Member category shall not be included in the club delegate formula calculation. Previously, family members had full voting privileges. The rule was changed to eliminate the creation of fictitious family groups to increase the number of voting delegates. The new rule will affect how the number of delegates from each 25A club is calculated for our future

District Conventions. Look for more information to come.

Each year, appoximately 400,000 Children Worldwide develop Cancer. That's 1 Child Every 90 Seconds!



More Than 80% of Children Diagnosed with Cancer are cured, but that number does not begin to make clear the damage cancer wreaks on kids and their families. Approximately 1,800 kids still die each year from this disease in the U.S. alone. For those who do survive, toxic treatments take an irreversible toll on their health. These therapies leave Children with lifelong chronic conditions that range from fragile bones to strained hearts to infertility.

Skylar survived 2 battles with Leukemia that robbed her of her elementary school experience. She is now Cancer free, but her bones were so ravaged by treatment that she has trouble walking and is in excruciating pain and will eventually require an artificial hip.



Tate overcame stage 3 Liver Cancer as a Baby. Despite all she endured, she remained a bright light for all around her. She passed away in 2022 at the age of 19 when her brain cancer recurred.

Some Indiana Lions say the Mid-Winter Conference is "the best place for learning" about leadership, service, and all aspects of Lionism. We offer seminars on club administration, community service, fundraising, and membership recruitment and retention, as well as opportunities for service, fellowship with Lions from around the state, and plain old everyday Lions fun.

The Early Bird registration fee – until November 30<sup>th</sup> - is only \$40 - \$5 less than last year - and includes informative seminars, on-site service projects, coffee and pastries in the morning, lunch at noon with a motivational speaker, and fellowship with other Lions.

The keynote speaker at the Saturday luncheon had not yet been announced when this article was written.

The conference will be preceded by a dinner on Friday evening. There is a separate fee of \$30 for this event. The after-dinner entertainment will be provided by magician Daniel Lusk. He has performed across the United States, overseas, for celebrities, national sports teams, and on national T.V. His magic has not only been seen by millions, but Daniel also lectures at conventions for other magicians teaching his trade.

Conference attendees will be offered the opportunity to participate in two on-site service projects. After dinner on Friday evening, attendees will have the opportunity to participate in the Care-ing Cases project, using clean recycled hard eyeglass cases to assemble first aid kits and toiletry kits. Conference attendees are also encouraged to donate new socks, gloves, mittens, scarves, knit hats, and blankets to the Sock It to Me project. Collection boxes for these items will be available on Friday and Saturday. Our District Governors will share all items created/collected by these projects with those in need in their districts.










## The Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto Fellowship



Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing has established the Miyamoto Fellowship to honor Lions and others for their dedication to their Lions Clubs, to Lions Clubs International, and to those in need in their communities around the world. Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto retired as Chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery at the Indiana University School of Medicine. At Riley Hospital, he served as Medical Director of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology.

In the 1980's, a grant from Speech and Hearing was provided to Riley Hospital and Dr. Miyamoto to expand the use of cochlear implants for children. Dr. Miyamoto's pioneering work has been recognized around the world, and he continues his close relationship with the Lions of Indiana.

A handsome plaque has been designed to honor the recipients of the Miyamoto Fellowship. For a \$500 donation to Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. within a two-year period, one plaque may be ordered in the recipient's name to be presented by the donor Lion or Lions Club. There is no charge for the plaque. Please contact any Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing trustee in your district for information or to order a plaque.



### ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM INDIANA LIONS SPEECH AND HEARING, INC.



The disciplines of Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology, and American Sign Language/English Interpreting include trained specialists providing services in a variety of educational and healthcare settings. Each year brings new knowledge and advancements that will help individuals overcome difficulties associated with speech, hearing, and language deficits. Advances in medicine and an increasingly aging population necessitate numerous additional professionals in these fields.

Colleges and universities throughout the United States offer degrees in these fields. A degree in one of these areas requires a minimum of a Bachelor's Degree. Encouragement by Lions throughout Indiana may be a decisive factor in a career choice for an Indiana youth to select one of these professions. Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. (ILSH) may provide scholarships of \$750.00 per student for up to four students per academic year. Students who are entering their junior year or above are eligible to apply for this scholarship. If more than four applicants per year, the scholarships will be awarded based on academic achievement. Please refer to the eligibility requirements listed on the application for further information.

Students are eligible to receive the scholarship for a maximum of two years. Renewals are not to be considered automatic. The student must repeat the application process to be considered for a scholarship for the second year.

Once approved for the scholarship, the student will be notified by one of the Trustees of Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing, Inc. A check will be issued and sent to the appropriate department at the university in which the student is enrolled.

#### FOR A STUDENT TO BE ELIGIBLE, S/HE MUST:

- Be majoring in a program in the field of Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology, or American Sign Language/English Interpreting;
- Be entering their 3rd or 4th year in said program, or into graduate school at an accredited college or university offering a minimum four year degree in one of the above mention fields;
- Make application to a ILS&H Trustee or Indiana Lions Club and be sponsored by a Lions Club in Indiana:
- Demonstrate an accumulative GPA of a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or higher;
- Verification of meeting eligibility requirements by University advisor or department faculty member;
- Submit an essay of at least 200 words explaining how the scholarship will be used.

#### FOR A LIONS CLUB TO PARTICIPATE, THEY MUST:

- Promote career paths consistent with ILSH scholarship program and seek out deserving students who may require financial support;
- Consider providing financial support in addition to the \$750 from Indiana Speech & Hearing, Inc.;
- Furnish eligibility date and the recommended support to a District Trustee of Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing, Inc. 120 days prior to the enrollment date;
- Recommend the student for scholarship renewal for the second year with satisfactory progress and the club's continued support; and
- Complete the application form.
