Biographies of Ambassadorial Program Speakers

Dr. Hillel Newman

Dr. Hillel Newman assumed the post of Consul General of Israel in July 2019, where he serves as the senior representative of the State of Israel to the Pacific Southwest. During his twenty-year diplomatic service, Consul General Newman accumulated vast experience in policy formulation and decisionmaking at the highest levels of Israel's foreign policy establishment. He has served in several influential and critical positions including Policy Advisor to three Foreign Ministers of Israel and Ambassador of Israel to Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

Before he joined the diplomatic service, he attained a Ph.D. in Jewish History, and served as a professor of Jewish history, teaching graduate courses at Bar Ilan University and Boston University. He has authored and published a book on Jewish sectarianism during the Hellenistic and Roman period. For the past five years, he has also served as a key lecturer on Judaism in the NATO Defense College.

Most recently, Consul General Newman served in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs as both Special Policy Advisor to the Director General and as Director of the World Jewish Affairs Department. He has been intimately involved in the most current and pressing issues confronting global Jewry. Previously, Consul General Newman served also in the Strategic Division of the Ministry, playing a key role in coordinating efforts related to strategic threats facing the State of Israel. As Ambassador to the Republics of Uzbekistan and Tajikistan, both Muslim countries, he promoted political, business and security ties with these countries. He also initiated several projects and agreements in the fields of medicine, education, agriculture and humanitarian aid.

Consul General Newman first

became familiar with the United States while serving as Deputy Consul General in Boston, to the New England Region between 2001-2005. He engaged in diverse public diplomacy efforts, conducted briefings on political and security issues and took a special interest in building inter-faith and inter-ethnic relations. Consul General Newman made Aliyah with his family from South Africa, served as a medic in the IDF and is married to Ayala. The couple have a ten-year-old son, Ram.

His favorite hobbies are reading, nature tours, sporting events and scuba diving.

Shaikh Abdulla bin Rashid bin Abdulla Al [—]Khalifa

On June 23, 2017, His Majesty King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa issued Royal Decree No. 34/2017 appointing Shaikh Abdulla bin Rashid bin Abdulla Al —Khalifa as the ambassador of the Kingdom of Bahrain to the United States of America.

Shaikh Abdulla's post-graduate career started at the Royal Court where he worked and oversaw Educational, Medical and Social Affairs. He then joined the General Organization for Youth and Sports as the Director of Planning and Follow-up and was later appointed Director of Financial and Human Resources. In 2010, he was appointed as Governor of the Southern Governorate of the Kingdom of Bahrain, the largest in size and with the highest potential for development. As part of a collaborative effort between the Kingdom of Bahrain and the United States of America, Shaikh Abdulla launched a partnership between the Governorate and the American nonprofit organization D.A.R.E. to develop and deploy an anti-violence and anti-addiction program delivered by trained community police officers in local elementary

and secondary schools. The initiative would later transform into a national program sponsored by the Kingdom's National Anti- Drug Committee, on which Shaikh Abdulla serves. Shaikh Abdulla played an active role in drafting the National Anti-Drug Strategy in conjunction with the regional office of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime. which was launched in 2016. Shaikh Abdulla served as a member of the Bahrain Olympic Committee from 2008 and as the Treasurer until 2017. When he served as Vice President of the Bahrain Olympic Shooting Federation, Shaikh Abdulla formulated the first women's shooting team, competing in the different disciplines locally and internationally. In 2007, he gained continental support to be elected Vice President of the Asian Shooting Confederation.

Shaikh Abdulla obtained his bachelor's degree from Bentley University. He continued his studies at the same university and received a master's in business administration. Shaikh Abdulla attained a certificate from the Harvard Kennedy School focusing on "Innovation in Governance "as part of his executive education program. He is currently pursuing a PhD at the International School of Management based in Paris.

Marlborough Lions Club member Arnie Buckley was recently recognized by receiving the lions prestigious Melvin Jones Award. Arnie has been a Lion for over 50 years and was involved in, and initiated, a number of Lions projects over the years. Two in particular from many years ago was "The Marlborough Community Arts Festival", which was a big summer event at the lake. While Arnie didn't start the festival, he was instrumental in getting the Lions to run the biggest income earner of the event, which was the "Hamburg and Hot Dog" truck, which also sold bratwurst. The Lions even had the beer concession for a few years. This was an extremely successful fundraising event and Arnie worked the truck cooking and selling virtually all weekend for years, while working with his close friends Don Lack, Brad Kula and Brian Reynolds. He even got Bob Farley (a charter member of the club) and Rich Hartley to join in with the work. Over the years Brian, Bob and Don have passed away and Brad moved to East Hartford. Most of the local philanthropic groups participated and had booths, including the two political parties. Quite a few participants sold various arts and crafts as well. The club was a bit larger back then with thirty or so very active members.

However, the one event that comes to mind, relative to Arnie, was, what was called "The Marlborough Days". Arnie and Don Lack, brought in some Historical Recreation actors and props to the Marlborough Days event at the lake each year. One year in particular Arnie brought in a Bonnie and Clyde Reenactment troop that recreated (including vintage automobiles), the final shootout between Bonnie and Clyde and the FBI. Guns, gunfire, fake bullets hitting people with fake blood, dialogue, music and of course the cars. It was memorable event and was well received. Arnie has a unique way of tapping into the popular zeitgeist of those days.

One of the projects that Arnie was most proud of was the construction of the old stone fire place on the Pavilion at the lake. Arnie organized and ran that project, volunteering hundreds of man hours and resources to it. Arnie was heartbroken when the Town removed the stone fireplace and replaced it with the current fireplace, but for those who remember the original fireplace they will now realize that Arnie was instrumental in its construction. He has many stories he could share about the pranks and good times they all enjoyed years ago. Dressing up in costumes and marching in the Town parades, mystery rides and just general friendships Arnie shared and enjoyed with his fellow Lions Club members.




