

Pin Trader's Corner By LITPC International Director Phil Dzurnak What Is Pin Trading? Anything you can think of is

Pin trading is a fun and enjoyable hobby that you can share with your whole family. It usually involves trading one pin for another. However, at times it can require a pin or two in exchange for a rarer or a valuable pin. Pins vary in price or exchange value depending on their scarcity or the type of pin traded.

At first, you may start out as a pin collector, and eventually you may become a pin trader. Not only are collecting and trading involved, there are social aspects where you meet new Lions from all over the US and World. You also get to know about the pin trader's families, as well as exchanging information about your family. Traveling, not only in the US, but also to other countries as well to attend pin swaps.

What seems to scare potential collectors and traders away from becoming a member of a pin trader's club is many feel they don't have enough pins to trade or it is an expensive hobby. Yes, it can be expensive, but only as expensive as you may want to get involved. A number of pin traders are more than happy to help you build up your supply of pins to trade by graciously donating pins to your collection. In other words, it is not really about the number of pins you have, but a lot about fun and camaraderie as well as enjoying a hobby you may like. We have traders from district 23, A.B and C who would be more than happy to explain more about trading and help you get started.

There are many, many different types of pins that you can collect and trade, too numerous to mention.

Anything you can think of is probably in the form of a pin or a future pin already. Pin swaps are held year round at various locations, some close, and some not so close. You can choose to go to any of them for a reasonable amount of money that covers your hotel room, registration and possibly a renting a table for displaying and trading you pins. My wife and I have attended several different locations: Reno NV, York PA, Dedham MA, Winchester VA, Nashville TN, as well as other states, all in the US. We have also been to PR and we're headed to Honolulu HI next.

Another interesting aspect of pin trading are the auctions that are usually held at least one night during the pin swaps. Some of them are low key, while others can be exciting to see how the bidding goes on for a specific pin. Club membership costs are not expensive. To join the CT pin trading club, the first year's cost is \$17.00 and only \$7.00 every year thereafter. Other pin trading clubs have different dues than the CT pin trading club, and you can become a member of them, if you so desire.

Once you are involved in pin trading you can even design your own pin for trading, or you can join the pin trading design committee of the CT pin trading club. Hopefully, you have seen some of the previously printed articles about pin trading in past District Spirit issues. What Effect Will the Centennial Have on Local Clubs?

With the Centennial fast approaching, about two years away, Lions Clubs International has set a goal of serving 100 million people by December 2017. You ask, "What does this mean to my club?" What we as Lions and leaders must do is ensure our Lions know what the Centennial is all about. We can't educate the general public about Lions if we do not have a clue about our past. Our past is the key to our future. Quiz your club -- ask them what major event is coming up in 2017 involving Lions. Quiz your club on Lions' history. Who was Melvin Jones? What did Helen Keller do to challenge Lions?

The Centennial gives us an opportunity to educate our community on the history of Lionism. Your club may be known around town, but does the community really know the basis of what Lions are all about-our motto, "We Serve" and how our service affects our own community? Think about service projects performed in your city or town in the last five years. If you were to ask your neighbors what the Lions do in town, would they know? We don't only want to be known for our pancake breakfasts and pasta dinners. Think about pediatric eye screenings, and how the results can change a person's life.

How does this affect your club? The Centennial gives us the opportunity to be more visible in our community. By expanding on existing projects that include partnering with other organizations, we can create excitement within our community. We need to consider asking other clubs in our district to conduct projects during the same weekend, or have two or three clubs work together on one project. Make sure the press is aware of your event so the word gets out in the papers, television, etc. Lions at work!

Past International President Preston has already started this process— August was "Engaging our Youth;" October was "Sharing the Vision;" December and January are "Relieving the Hunger"; and April is "Protecting our Environment." We are being challenged to plan projects and events that fit each of the four themes.

Using our Terryville Fair as an example, it takes literally hundreds of volunteers to put the three-day fair on each August. Approximately 75% of the volunteers working the fair are non-Lions. They come from our local churches, school clubs, the PTAs, other special interest clubs like the local Fish and Game Club, and so on. We all work side by side in our food booth feeding the public, parking cars in the parking lots, running events and providing entertainment to the masses. All of these things together make the event a success.

The best effect the Centennial can have on your club would be a growth in membership based on your partnering with non-Lions for your activities and events, so that they witness your passion for serving others, making them realize the good that comes from helping those in need, and wanting to be a part of it themselves.

This Centennial really does affect all of us as Lions and as non-Lions. We need to be visible now, so Lions will be here for the next 100 years.



Rocky Hill Veteran's Club Makes the News

Years ago, when Barry Lorette's family was going through a tough time, the Lions Club was there to help.

"We were struggling to make ends meet and both kids had broken their glasses accidentally," he said.

The school nurse put them in touch with the Lions Club, which twice helped out the family with new glasses.

Lorette is now the president of the Rocky Hill Veteran Lions, located at the Connecticut State Veterans Home on West Street. The club was started this past year as a charter club of the Rocky Hill Lions.

"I was looking for an opportunity to give back to the Lions Club and when this opportunity came up, I jumped right on it," said Lorette, who served in the Coast Guard.

Once the group has 20 members it can become an

independent club. The Lions are all about helping the community.

"We serve' is our motto," said Jackie Fischer, first vice president of the Rocky Hill Lions Club and the liaison between the two groups.

"We have several areas where we have boxes where we collect eyeglasses. We sort them, box them and then they go to a distributing center where they're sorted again and then they're shipped out to Third World countries," she said.

"Our club also holds a carnival every September and all funds go back to the community."

Despite being a new club, the Rocky Hill Veteran Lions is already having an impact. A back-to-school drive at the end of the summer raised funds for Walmart gift cards that were donated to Rocky Hill Human Services.

They also held a book drive in November and December with

assistance from the '61 Lunch Group and the St. James Wednesday Sewing and Knitting group. More than 200 books were donated to the Thirman Milner School in Hartford.

The idea to create a club at the veteran's home came up at a joint meeting between three Lions Clubs in the fall of 2013.

"The district governor, Dan DiVirgilio ... got up and spoke about membership extension and membership retention, and a program for United States veterans where the application fee is waived for the first 5,000 [applicants] in the United States," said Bobby Clark, who is membership chairman for the district.

The Long Touchdown with Pediatric Vision Screening

Twenty-five Lions Clubs participated in the Pediatric Vision Screening program that we now know as Lions KidSight USA. We aim to provide this free Vision Screening to smaller children, ages 6-months to 6-years. We are screening children in daycare centers, private nursery schools and pre-schools and public schools. Our partners are the schools where the school nurse or program directors will follow-up on treatments of the children that we refer.

For these young children, we change the course of their lives when we find a referral. They begin to read much earlier with their better functioning vision. This immediately improves their ability to learn. It improves their hand-eye coordination, so they can better participate in sports. It improves their social behavior, so it is less likely that they will be bullied, or become bullies and a juvenile delinquent. It is less likely that they will be classified as "handicapped." Our first Touchdown is helping these children.

We refer about 12% of the children screened. Last year, we screened nearly 12,000 children, which means that we hope that 1,440 received treatment. When we refer a child for eye care services, we can expect that nearly 60% will begin to wear eyeglasses,

12% will receive other treatment, 10% might be diagnosed to have normal vision, which might change, and nearly 20% seek no treatment, or did not report this to the facility when asked. This is the perfect project of direct service of our Lions that is fun and easy to do; and fulfilling when 'the touchdown' is made. With this success, your Lions Club can grow with pride. Retirees are perfect for running this daytime program. The second touchdown is when we see another successful program work in our Lions Clubs. Ask your Lions Club to be a part of our Lions KidSight program. Your contributions to the Connecticut Lions Eve Research Foundation helped get this started, and further contributions will help us to expand the program.

Papenforth established the scholarship fund sixty-five years ago.These two Lions started a trust fund that was only to be used to provide Plainville students scholarships for higher education. Since then many persons have contributed to the fund that has grown considerably. The only monies from the fund that can be used is the interest earned, therefore allowing us to be able to award scholarships in perpetuity.

This year we were able to award five scholardhips totaling \$6000. Our scholarship night was on May 20th and each student brought two guests. Our guest speaker was Detective David Posades who spoke on Computer Fraud and the pitfalls of social media.
