

Greetings from East Hartford

President Preston's theme to Strengthen our Clubs includes assessing the standard service projects we have done for years, and perhaps starting a new service project that will benefit our communities and give members a greater sense of pride in their club and the activities it completes or is expected to complete. From President Preston's theme book, "every Lions Club is encouraged to examine what they are doing... and energize their club. The goal is to have clubs with better focus, direction, drive and purpose."

Lions Clubs International has developed tools to assist clubs with assessing our clubs and the activities we do in our communities. Utilizing the Club Ratings Guide, Clubs can determine why members may have stopped coming to meetings or are not participating in service projects. The tool is anonymous, and it helps to have somebody from outside your club assess the results. You may learn that many in your membership are proud and happy to be Lions, but may not be able to afford 2 dinner meetings a month. This is an opportunity to discuss other options, such as 1 dinner meeting and 1 business-only meeting, or a meeting with only desert provided by different members each month. You

may learn most Lions would appreciate having a printed agenda for each meeting, or would prefer your meetings are held in a different location. Some of these items are unknown until you complete the Club Ratings Evaluation.

The second aspect to determine how best to serve our communities is to ask them! The Community Needs Assessment is a valuable tool to determine service projects for your club, and makes the leaders in the community more aware of your club; it can be a tool to build relationships with key members of the community and to recruit new members. Through the Community Needs Assessment, you may discover a project that is highly needed in your community and many of your friends and neighbors could benefit.

Once you determine specific needs in your community, you likely will have an opportunity to involve new members in a new project. Retaining members is best accomplished by mentoring them, supporting their ideas and involving them in projects. Making your membership an integral part of the club, making them comfortable and willing to raise new ideas is a good first step to retention.



Completing the Club Ratings and Community Needs Assessment and you are on your way to earning a new badge for your club banner. The Club Excellent Process "is a fun, interactive process that brings members together to look at what your club is today and what it will be tomorrow. It gives you the tools to strengthen your service, improve your club effectiveness, and enhance your membership experience." Forming a Plan of Action and implementing said plan are the final steps.

The prize differ each round, and consists of frozen turkeys, hams, roasts, cash, and donated gift cards. The ticket prices vary on the prize and can range from \$2 to \$3.75.

We also have an event long "special" that costs \$5 per shot where the 2 top winners win "bigger prizes". This year it was a chain saw and a cord of wood.

We did this the six Sundays before Thanksgiving. We have a loyal local following of shooters that we see almost every year, and we are thankful that they continue to support us. The shoot doesn't start until 9:00AM, but some of they show up before 7:00AM, bring firewood to burn to keep warm, help us set up, and then spend money!

We also have great help from our own Leo club members who volunteer to handle the paper targets (setting them up each round, and bringing back the ones that were shot for judging).

I would also like to mention that PDG Lion Dick Stathers has worked at this event EVERY year that we have had it. That's dedication! This year we raised almost \$5,200.

On Jan 7th, we held a combination meeting/Holiday party/Leo's installation. This is the 2nd year we have done this, and it has gone well each year. This year, Lions DG Mike and IPDG Dan came to install the Leo officers and new members headed by their advisor Ms. Kelly Blais. Lion Leo Club Assistant Blanche Sewell also joined the festivities and gave more info on the Mid-Winter convention and how the

Leo's could participate. We had a homemade buffet dinner of pasta and meatballs, pulled pork, sweet & sour meatballs, salad, bread, and dessert. We discussed the various projects (service and fundraising) that our club does and where those fundraising dollars go - explaining that almost 70% goes directly back to the East Windsor community.

We also decided to increase our high school scholarships from 2 (\$500 each) to 3 (\$750 each) – so that excited the Leos and the high school principal. We ended the meeting with a Podunk blessing for Lion DG Mike. Last year we did one

for PDG Dan, and this year we "passed the blessing" from him to DG Mike. We even had a couple of Leos (blowing bubbles from "peace pipes") and a parent (playing the drums) help us out! Everyone seemed to enjoy themselves before heading home in the brutal cold!

Next we look forward to a visit from 2nd VDG Kathy Randall at our next meeting on Jan 21st. And coming up, we have our 33rd annual Farmer's Breakfast at East Windsor High school on March 15th with Dee's famous biscuits and homemade apple pie (see our ad in this edition for more info).

Pin Trader's Corner

Why did we become pin traders? It really started years ago when I joined the Torrington Lions Club. When I went to my first Mid-Winter Convention, I was introduced to the Connecticut State Pin, which was the 1979 Colonial Soldier. As the years went by, I added to my collection of Connecticut State pins. Elaine always had me purchase two pins, one for me, and one for our son Christopher. Once she joined the Torrington Lions Club, several years ago, she had to have her own set of pins and we no longer shared them with Christopher.

Towards the end of 2002, several of us joined Lion Curt Fitch in establishing the Pin Traders Club of Connecticut. Shortly thereafter, our pin collection expanded three or four fold as we started collecting other state pins as well. The more and more we saw of the various pins that are available, the more we wanted them. However, we decided to stay mostly with collecting State Pins. Don't get the wrong impression; we do have other types as well, just not as many.

Our first real exposure to Lion Pin Trading arrived when the Connecticut Pin Traders Club hosted the Northeast pin swap a few years ago. By the way we are again hosting one this year in August. At this swap we were really exposed to pin swapping. There were pin traders from all over the East Coast and then some. It was exciting to see all of the different pins that were available for collecting, and just how many a couple of pin traders had available. They had sheets and sheets set up on their respective tables. We shared one little corner with Curt during that swap.

Our next visit to a swap was another

Northeast pin swap held in Boston. The number of pin traders and pins that were available amassed us. Next was another trip to Boston, this time for the International Pin Swap that brought about another surprise for us. Not only were there a larger number of local pin traders, but pin traders from other states and countries as well.

There are so many pin swaps available to attend throughout the U.S. that you can go to as many as you want or you can pick and choose the one or two you may want to attend. We chose the Pennsylvania pin swap, held at York, PA.. That was really an adventure for us. After having a terrific time trading and purchasing more pins, it was time for us to leave for Connecticut and home. Well on Friday night, it started snowing and snowing. By the time we approached our car, it was buried in approximately a foot of snow. The parking lot had been plowed, but on top of the car, and all around the car, was the foot of snow. I approached the checkout desk and asked them if they had a shovel I could borrow. They told me that all that they had was a broom. After a hardy laugh, I remember I had a small shovel in my trunk. However, I parked my car the wrong way. In order to get to my trunk I had to plow my way through the snow. Finally, I cleared my car off and the surrounding area to a point where I could load our hoard of pins and other items in the car and head home. To show our commitment to Lionism, and our motto of We Serve, I did lend my shovel to several other Lion Pin Traders so that they could also get out.

We really have a great and enjoyable time at these swaps and

are really into pin trading. Next year we were off to York, PA for another Pa pin swap. We left home at 4:30 A.M. (you have to love pin trading to get going at that time of the morning) and arrived at 10:30 A.M. Although we couldn't check into the hotel until 4 p.m. we were able to set up our two tables (no longer a small corner to share with Curt) with pins for trading and off we went going from table to table obtaining pins we need for our collection and then some. We met up with several of the Pin Traders from last year, and also met up with several others whom we trade with by mail.

Oh, I almost forgot. During the pin swaps, they have auctions where you can bid on various pins you either need for your collection, or just happen to like because of their looks. It is amazing to see how some pins would go for a few hundred dollars while other would go for as low as \$10.00 a pin. By the way, we have also had the pleasure of designing one of our Torrington Club pins, along with help from Lions Curt Fitch and Ralph Dolan. Why not consider joining our Pin Trading Club and having some fun collecting pins, meeting our interesting Lions, and establishing new friendships with Lions throughout the U.S and other countries. Lion Ralph Dolan joined us when we travel to another International Pin Trading Swap, which was held in Jefferson City, MO.

The club continues the program of delivering Meals on Wheels to home bound residents with 34 Lions delivering meals to 189 residents since September.

Members participated in the JDRF Walkathon; deck staining at a FAVARH group home; cleanup of the Farmington River Watershed along with LEO's from the Avon Middle and High School.

During this same period club members assisted other Lions Clubs and Social/Charitable

organizations in providing services and fund raising: New Britain Lions Oktoberfest; Veterans Stand Down; Friends of Heublein Tower Toot; Miller Food Tent; Salvation Army Bell Ringing and Holiday Store Toy Collection which also included forty LEO's from the Avon Middle and High School.

In September, the club staffed a booth at Avon Day and conducted pediatric eye screening of eighteen children. The booth was coordinated with the Canton/Avon Rotary Club's Amber Alert registration.

For two weeks in October, club members conducted pediatric eye

screening at eight nursery schools and daycare facilities in Avon. 225 children were screened with 22 referrals to eye care professionals.

Members represented the club at Zone meetings; USA/Canada Forum; CLERF board meetings; 23B Council meetings; VDG Kathy Randall Fundraiser; ASD dinner; and Lions Low Vision breakfast.

In November the club held its annual Harvest Breakfast and raised over \$3,000 to support its ongoing charitable donations.

In May the club will hold its annual Pasta Dinner fundraiser.

A Little Bit of Heaven- Lion John Garoppolo

A Fidelco Story

As they approached retirement, John and Patricia Garoppolo shared a grand vision for their golden years together. They purchased the boat of their dreams and John was putting the finishing touches on a hobby workshop behind their Manchester, Connecticut home. The year was 1992, and the Garoppolos' future together looked bright.

That vision was shattered the moment an eye surgeon told John, "We're very sorry, but there's nothing else we can do. You're going to be blind."

"Nobody plans to go blind," Pat recalls. "He had staphyloma in both eyes with retinal detachments; it was irreversible. I really thought, now what happens?"

Although his eyesight could never be restored, John knew there was still hope for a fruitful life. During his education at Teachers College of Connecticut and subsequent career as an industrial arts teacher, John met Fidelco's founder, Charlie Kaman, and learned of Fidelco's mission. A German Shepherd Dog lover himself, John became a Fidelco donor in the late 1970s, never dreaming that he would one day become a client.

"I knew I wanted a guide dog, and it had to be a German shepherd," says John. "But I didn't want to travel to some place to live on a campus for weeks. I knew that Fidelco would come to me. So I

applied right away."

"The boat was the second love of his life," adds Pat. "That is, until the guide dogs came along." It's been sixteen years since her passing, but John's eyes still well up with tears whenever he talks about his beloved "Fenix," his first Fidelco Guide Dog. Her ashes sit in a small, painted urn on a mantle in the family living room, amid a veritable shrine to the canine partners who have changed the lives of the entire Garoppolo family by restoring John's independence.


"The bond with Fenix was intense," says John. "She saved my life twice in traffic situations. Fenix worked her miracles in many ways, turning the results of a devastating event into some of the happiest years of my life. It wasn't just me; Fenix also gave my wife the freedom to live how she wanted to."

The memory of Fenix, the Fidelco Guide Dog who restored so much hope, lives on in the "Fenix Memorial Bowling Tournament." Now in its 19th year, the tournament, organized by John with the Manchester and Vernon Lions Clubs, has raised well over \$200,000 to support Fidelco.

"John's freedom has been sustained by his Fidelco Successor Guide Dogs," says Pat. "It frees me up so I can do the things that I like, and I don't worry. I am not confined to doing what he wants to do 24/7."

A great-grandfather seven times over, John remains as busy as ever with ten-year-old Fidelco Guide Dog "Garner" by his side. He is an active member of the Lions Club of Manchester, bowls on a Senior Mens' League, volunteers at a homeless shelter and his church, and is constantly discovering new hobbies like growing peppers and tomatoes.

"Fidelco has changed our lives so much," says Pat. "John just wants to be out there, be part of the world, and his Fidelco Guide Dogs have helped him do just that."

Open to any Lion who has yet to be elected club president, the RLLI will be held the weekend of March 7-9 at the conference center at St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield.

Peace Poster Contest

Peace, Love, and Understanding was the theme for the 2014-2015 Peace Poster Contest. Eight clubs held contests and entered posters at the District level this year. Participating clubs included Hartland, Windsor Locks, Simsbury, Watertown, Terryville, Bristol, Colebrook, and Bloomfield.

Attendees at the Hartford Evening Club's 40th anniversary dinner on November 22, 2014 served as judges. Normally, the annual Low Vision Dinner is the judging venue, but the event was held as a breakfast this year, and the date was after the deadline to submit the winner to the Multiple District level.

The Watertown Lions Club sponsored this year's winning poster. 2nd and 3rd runners up were sponsored by the Bristol and Colebrook Clubs, respectively.

The winning poster, drawn by Charina Manalo, has been selected as the winner poster at the Multiple District. She will represent MD23 at the International Contest in February.

At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education, and media communities will select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. Each poster is judged on originality,

artistic merit, and expression of the theme. The international grand prize winner receives \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony held during Lions Day with the United Nations.

The international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president, or a club member designated by the sponsoring club president, are required to attend the award ceremony. Each of the 23 merit award winners receives a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Each kit includes a sticker to be placed on the back of the winning poster before to forwarding it to the next level of judging. Entries not featuring the official sticker will be disqualified. The kits are available from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters. Kits may be ordered from:

Although the deadline for submitting winners at the club level to the District Governor is not until November 15, now is the time to order your kits and begin working with the local schools or eligible youth groups in your area to guarantee sufficient time for a well-planned contest.

Do you love projects? Do you hate 'em? Most likely, there are some projects you like and others you don't.

It's a fact of life. Some Lions projects go smooth as silk. Others, well, we'd rather let them fade into time soup. Or maybe not.

Maybe there are lessons to be learned from our 'not so good' projects, lessons that might inform and improve other club projects. Maybe those lessons could make a success out of the project that everyone prefers to forget. Our goal in Zone 3 is to raise everyone's sense of accomplishment while reducing overall frustration. Don't we all want to avoid the "last minute scramble" when someone drops the ball? We can do it through project planning and effective execution.

THE PLAN

Where would our projects be without a plan? Every project has one, but that's just the beginning. We want to execute our Lions plans to a successful conclusion.

To do that, the plan must be simple enough for everyone to understand, yet effective enough to matter. A key element in any plan is addressing the issues we face in addition to the steps that need to be taken, and tracking them both to minimize potential hiccups.

There are a few concepts to understand too, such as how one task or person or resource can impact others. We call these impacts "dependencies" and often find that hiccups occur when members of the project team don't understand them. There are several

more concepts, such as due dates, resources, critical paths and communications, that help projects go more smoothly when everyone buys in.

Our next Zone 4 meeting (via webex to save travel time) will focus on these concepts as well as the techniques that make those concepts work. In the spring, we will report on how we did, the results we achieved, and tips that can help your club complete more projects successfully.

We're all in this together. Stay tuned.



Partner with Walgreens

Did you know about a service that Walgreens provides the communities they serve?

They offer “Brown Bag” events, hosted at local Senior Centers, where participants are asked to bring in their medications. A Walgreens pharmacist reviews their medication and offers advice to them. They also can counsel people about Medicare Part D, offer free

blood pressure tests, and, at some events, they can provide flu and/or pneumonia vaccinations, directly billing their insurance carrier, or provide them for free if you're a veteran with a VA Hospital ID card.

The pharmacist also explains that they can provide easy-open containers for people who have problems with the child-proof caps. For those with visual impairments, they describe the talking-pill reminder caps they sell [*Ed: We featured this in the August 2014 District Spirit, page 9*].

Where do we, as Lions, fit in?

Why not plan a health event in your community. There's no reason why your club can't work together with your local Walgreens to bring a full range of health services to your town. Contact me to arrange the connection with your local store.

Explain what you, as Lions, do in the local community, the state, and around the world. Offer to help set up and assist at the event. Invite other health professionals to participate in the event. Some ideas are:

- Offer senior eye screenings at the same time
- Invite visiting nurses in to explain their services
- Have a representative from a medical supply company come in and explain the things that are, and are not, covered by insurance
- Bring in a physical therapist to show some simple exercises that help senior joints stay limber
- Ask a local doctor or nurse practitioner to attend and explain about diabetes health

Take Better Pictures!

With almost every cell phone having a camera, and the affordable price of digital cameras, picture taking is easier than ever. However, if you're taking pictures to share or to print, you may find that the results aren't what you expected. Here are some hints to help you take better pictures:

1) Pick the right light: The best time to take a picture is early morning, or late afternoon. Try to avoid the harsh noon sun. Soft/diffused lighting is best—shoot your subject under a tree or in shade to eliminate harsh contrast. A bright, overcast day is great for eliminating shadows.

2) Use your flash correctly: Outdoors, turn on your flash to provide a "fill" that eliminates shadows. Indoors, turn off your flash and open window shades for more natural lighting. Turn on more lights, if you need them. Make sure you adjust your white balance for the lighting—fluorescent lights cast a green tint, for example.

3) In low light situations, even with a flash, you may want to stabilize the camera to get a picture without blurs. For cell phones or small digital cameras, brace it against a pillar, a tree, or even the edge of a table. For larger cameras, a tripod or monopod may be the best way to keep your camera from shaking. Keep in mind that if you zoom in on a subject, even the tiniest shake is magnified. It's better to move closer to your subject than to use the zoom.

4) Your subject is the whole point of the photo. Get close to your subject to fill the frame with it, and reduce the amount of background visible. Most cameras will allow you to focus on your subject by holding the shutter button halfway down, and then you can frame the shot before

you push it down all the way. If you have aperture control, open it as wide as you can to reduce depth of field so it will make the background less distracting—unless the background is part of the reason you're taking the picture.

5) Don't shoot with the sun directly behind you—it makes your subject squint. Try to keep the sun at a 45-degree angle between you and the subject—over your shoulder, instead of at your back.

6) Action! A picture of your subject performing a task is much more interesting than the standard group shot.

7) Adopt a new perspective! Lie on the ground and shoot up at your subject. Stand on a chair and shoot down at them. Take a picture of a child or a pet at their level.

8) Take a lot of pictures. A picture may look good on the tiny screen on your camera, but it may look a lot different when you look at it full-sized. With digital cameras, those extra shots don't cost you any more money, as they did with film. Change your perspective for some; change the angle of the subject. Play with the difference between vertical and horizontal framing. You may capture that winning picture when you least expect it.

9) If you're planning to edit or print pictures, set your camera to save them at the highest resolution you can. This means you need more memory per picture, but many cameras use removable flash cards, and most can handle 32MB or more. Advanced users may want to save the files in .RAW format instead of .JPG. This will give you the most control in editing. You can always save them in another format to share.

Success with Pediatric Vision Screening

Connecticut Lions have built upon last year's success with pediatric eye screenings, expanding the program to include inner city schools in New Britain, Hartford, Waterbury, and Torrington.

"Last year at this time, we had screened 4,443 children between the ages of six months and six years. This year, we have screened 7,846 children, and are well on our way to screening 12,000 children before our Lions year ends on June 30," said Alan Daninhirsch, one of the original architects of the program.

The goal of the program is for Lions to be the organization that screens all pre-school children in Connecticut for "lazy eye" (amblyopia), strabismus, astigmatism, near sightedness, far sightedness and several other diseases.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, roughly 14 million Americans aged 12 and older suffer from visual impairment, one of the most common disabling childhood conditions that strikes 6.8 percent of those younger than 18. More than 80 percent of these cases could be corrected.

Recent studies have shown that as many as 20 percent of students diagnosed with attention deficit disorder may actually be suffering from one or more of these eye diseases.

"By detecting these diseases early in the child's life, they can be corrected and the child can achieve more in school and in life," Daninhirsch said.

Bill Dowling is Guest Speaker at Windsor Lions Meeting

At a recent meeting of the Windsor Lions, the guest speaker was Bill Dowling, former co-owner and general manager of the New Britain Rock Cats. Bill had fascinating tales to tell about his legal career, his relationship with Yankees owner George Steinbrenner and his years with the Rock Cats.

A Holyoke native, a Columbia alum and a 1973 grad of the Boston College Law School, he began his career as an assistant district attorney in Manhattan for four years. He then became chief of the New York State Attorney General's criminal division for six years, during which time he met Steinbrenner, who offered Bill the job as General Counsel for the Yankees (George wanted an aggressive prosecutor in the position).

Because he was a die-hard Sox fan, and knew of Steinbrenner's mercurial style, Bill said he had to think hard about accepting the job, but he did and held it for three years, then for two more as outside counsel. Dowling said "George was a great person to be a lawyer for because everybody feared him." He also said George fired him about seven times, but each time only for about a minute until he regained his composure.

A couple of Bill's favorite Yankee players were Don Mattingly and Dave Winfield, and his favorite manager was Lou Pinella. Bill recalled a story about the fourth game of the season in 1984: Bobby Meacham flubbed a ground ball and George was on the phone to Pinella right away, telling him to send Meacham down to AA immediately.

Then there was a 1988 game with the Twins that the Yankees seemed to have in hand, only to have Dave Righetti give up the tying run. Even though the Yankees eventually won, Steinbrenner called a late night

meeting with his managers to find out exactly why Righetti had given up the run to begin with.

As to his thirteen years with the Rock Cats, Dowling had nothing but praises for New Britain, saying the team had a great relationship with the city. After selling the team to the new owners, Bill stayed on as President for two years, but did not know of ownership's plans to relocate to Hartford. He said that, had he known, he would have counseled against the idea because of how well the team had always done in New Britain. He mentioned that the day he gave up his position as president was the day the team announced the potential move to Hartford.

He believes that the new affiliate of the Colorado Rockies will be in for some very expensive negotiations with New Britain in order to play there while the new stadium is readied, which he thinks will be about four or five years away.

When asked about what he is doing these days, Bill mentioned that he is considering a few options; meanwhile he is happy being the chairman of the United Way in the New Britain-Berlin area.
