#### **Introduce our Teens to Lions Quest**

Lions Quest began as one teenager's passion to find a better way to prepare young people to handle life's challenges. Today, it is one of the most widely used social and emotional learning programs in the world.

In 1975, 19-year-old Rick Little, of Findlay, Ohio, suffered severe back injuries in an auto accident. Immobilized for six months, Little found himself with a lot of time to contemplate why schools were doing so little to help youth develop the life skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. When his injuries healed, Little set out on a nationwide pursuit for answers, interviewing teenagers, teachers and experts in child and adolescent development.

After a struggle to find initial funding, Little established Quest International in 1977, with the help of a US\$130,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, to design and develop values-based curricula and drug-use prevention programs. Little went to work creating teaching tools easy to adapt across different cultures and educational systems.

The Lions got involved in 1984 when the Lions Clubs International Foundation made its first grant to Quest International, a grant that funded additional program development and expansion. Later that year, Lions Clubs International formed a working partnership with Quest International to launch a major drug prevention initiative called Lions Quest Skills for Adolescence, targeting middleschool grades 6 through 8. Lions clubs partnered with local school systems to implement the program at the community level.

Over the next 18 years, the Lion's partnership with Little's organization grew in scope and impact. Lions introduced programs to serve students at all grade levels, from

kindergarten through high school. Independent researchers gave the programs high marks for promoting positive behaviors and boosting academic performance.

In 2002, LCIF acquired formal ownership of the curriculum materials. Lions Quest soon became Lions' signature youth development program worldwide. By 2015, Lions Quest had grown to include 36 languages in 85 countries reaching more than 13 million students.

Lions clubs around the world have been key to the success and expansion of Lions Quest, supporting the program through local funding, coordinating teacher training, co-hosting parent meetings, speaking to youth, and undertaking joint service projects with students.

Lions Quest goes beyond academics to teach students how to make responsible decisions, set goals, be accountable for their actions, develop healthy relationships, resist peer pressure and engage in community service.

As a life-long educator, I am particularly interested in reaching teens, giving them the tools they need to make smart decisions for themselves and their communities.

#### **LCIF Review**

Thank you for all of your hard work we had a great year.

We exceeded the District's Goal of goal of achieving \$34,000 in donations by over \$3,400.

An LCIF information table was set up and manned at the Mid-Winter Conference.

We visited fourteen of our fifty-three clubs, and we are now scheduling club visitations for the 2016-2017 Lions' year. At each visit, we held a discussion about Contributing Members, MMR's and Activity Reports, and current LCIF projects and goals. Most of our visitations resulted in a donation made by the host club.

Notifications to Zone Chairs and Club Presidents about MMR"s and Activity Reports, and Contributing Membership and goals were sent on a regular basis.

As a guiding Lion, this Cabinet position worked on reorganizing a club which has become inactive, using KIDSIGHT, as the driver. A screening was scheduled in this town and we have been able to secure an Eye Care Professional from the town to participate in the screening. This will be an ongoing project of this Cabinet position This Cabinet position is also involved in helping to establish a Kidsight presence in Hartford, Conn by screening students at schools that have agreed to hold a screening.





### **Opening Eyes**

The Special Olympics CT/Opening Eyes event took place on Saturday June 11th and Sunday June 12th at Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven. I would like to thank all Lions/Leos that attended and assisted in the screenings!

Opening Eyes is a collaboration between Lions Club International and Special Olympics. Since 2001, LCIF has given about \$1 million dollars per year thru a Core 4 grant. Opening Eyes is changing lives in communities across the globe, providing free eye assessments, prescription eyewear, sunglasses and sports goggles to people with intellectual disabilities. Over 350,000 assessments have been performed in over 80 countries since it started. Over 90,000 prescription eyewear have also been distributed.

Here are some "statistics" for the weekend:

- 355 screenings done (includes athletes and unified partners). This was one of our largest screenings ever!
- 155 prescription eye glasses were given out (made on site)
- 154 sun glasses were given out
- 71 sports goggles with RX were given out
- 3 plano protective goggles were given out
- 10 athletes were referred for further screening

This includes the following volunteers:

- 19 Optometrists
- 1 Ophthalmologist
- 24 Optometry students
- 19 Opticians
- 63 Lions/Leos
- 8 Other

#### **District Membership**

My name is Jim Trompeter, and I am your GMT (District Membership Coordinator).

As long as you have been a Lions Club Member, I am sure you are aware the push for increasing Membership has always been at the members who were more forefront. Lions Clubs are no different than any other organization without the dedicated efforts of their member's, service organizations such as ours cannot survive.

Most of our clubs work very hard to recruit new members. But in many instances, that's where the process stops. In reality, once you bring a new member on, that's where the process begins.

This year we, of course, want to bring in New Members, but one of my focuses this year is to work with the clubs in retaining the members we have, and try to cut down the number of resignations.

Members resign for a variety of reasons, some we have no control over: death, relocation, health, and Financial issues. If we look at the resignations that have taken place within our clubs, a significant number of resignations are due to a member's dissatisfaction, because they are not part of the group, or their ideas and suggestions are not recognized.

I spoke with a Lions Member earlier this year. She said she had been a member about two years, and was in the process of considering resigning. Naturally, I asked her why. She said that during her two years, she attended most of the meetings and worked all the events, I am looking forward to working even co-chairing one. Her suggestions or ideas, both at events and at meetings, were never given consideration. This person is

someone who likes to be involved. and she felt her time and efforts would be of better use elsewhere. I did some investigation and found that many of her ideas and suggestions had merit, but she was having trouble with more senior comfortable doing things the way they have done them in the past.

This is a topic that could evolve a great deal of discussion, more than I would care to type for this article. One thing that is key is that new members, and our existing members, must feel they are an integral part of the team. We also must be open to new ideas. We live in a fast-paced environment that is constantly changing. If we, as an organization, are not open to new ideas and change, we will be unable to provide the services and support that we have in the past at the Local, State, and International levels.

We are going to start a Membership Corner. In the next couple of issues of the District Spirit. I am going to ask for your ideas and suggestions on how to get new Members and retain existing Members. I am looking for input from both Members and Club Officers. You will be receiving information on this in September. I am sure we will have more ideas for the next issue.

This year's Team Fidelco Captains, Michael Malarsie and Kirsten Battaglia, are tackling all of life's adventures with their Fidelco guide dog partners by their sides.

In the remote mountains of Afghanistan, SSgt Michael Malarsie was blinded and severely wounded by a powerful improvised explosive device (IED) that killed four team members and blew him off a bridge. Exactly one year later, on his "alive day," Michael was partnered with Fidelco guide dog Xxon, and he returned to active duty status as the only blinded airman serving in the United States Air Force. Michael received the Bronze Star with Valor for heroism on the battlefield. He honors his fallen team members every day by living life fully and with gratitude; Michael is a motivational speaker who wake boards, rides horses, and keeps up with his young family.

With her Fidelco guide dog Carley leading the way, Kirsten Battaglia has just earned her law degree from American University. Kirsten has optic nerve hypoplasia and can see light, shape and color, but lacks depth perception. When she moved to Washington D.C. to pursue her degree, Kirsten was comfortable using her cane, but was growing frustrated she was merely avoiding obstacles and not able to navigate the safest path. She wanted to know the ever-present construction and traffic would not prevent her from traveling confidently to class or walking the city - one of her passions. Carley's steadfastness and loyalty has enhanced every aspect of Kirsten's daily life; she is attaining her goals while enjoying

the journey. Kirsten comes from a military family and looks forward to more far-flung adventures with Carley visiting her parents who live overseas.

### Club Closeup: Thomaston Lions Club

One day, back in 2009, two guys from Terryville Lions club walked into the Thomaston town hall looking for people interested in restarting the Thomaston Lions Club, which had folded several years earlier. The two guys were Steve Daigle and Tim Hilliker.

Carol Hoebel happened to be working in the Town Hall that day, and she thought it was a great idea. So, she started making calls. And that was the start of the new Thomaston Lions Club.

Currently, the club has 31 members, 14 of them charter members.

Club lore states that they picked our first president, Lion Glenn Clark, by calling him on the phone and saying, "Hey, you're not at the meeting, so we made you President".

Actually, Lion Glen was chosen as he was a member of the original Thomaston Lions Club, and it was thought that his experience would be essential to help guide the new club.

They have a unique approach to club activities. They encourage their members to pick what they like for activities, and to choose their own level of involvement. Their concept is "It's your idea, it's your baby". If they are doing something and the participation is low, they know it's time to change it up, and maybe try something new.


#### **Woodbury Lions Club**



### Lion Low Vision Center Charlotte Hungerford Hospital

The Charlotte Hungerford Hospital (CHH) Occupational Therapy Department and The District 23B Lions have established a Low Vision Center located at the CHH Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine Clinic at 1151 East Main Street, Torrington.

"Low vision affects over two-thirds of adults over 65 years of age. It is our goal to ensure that older adults with low vision are able to maintain their independence and experience quality of life. We are pleased to partner with the local Lions to provide this much needed service to our community," said Amanda Hill, CHH Director of Rehabilitation. Michelle Whitford, Registered Occupational Therapist, has received extensive training in low vision and is providing this service to the patients in this community.

The program is designed to provide support for individuals who experience low vision by assessing their sight limitations. Following an assessment to determine their degree of vision loss, an individualized plan will be created with specific goals focused on providing assistance and improving their quality of life. These strategies are developed to help perform daily tasks, at times using tactile and talking products. Individuals are educated on availability of assistive technologies and learn to use their remaining vision effectively. In providing these services, individuals with low vision are able to live more safely and independently.

A physician referral is needed. The cost of these services will be assumed by insurance providers and any other form of governmental or private reimbursement available. The Lions provide all devices free of charge to patients. Office hours are Monday, Wednesday, Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Tuesday, 8 a.m. to noon. For more information, contact the CHH Occupational Therapy Department at (860) 496-0046.

"The Lions have earned an incredible reputation in this healthcare arena. Our hospital is pleased to more than partner with them, we are inspired by them. Our Center is really made possible by their resources and encouragement," said Brian Mattiello, CHH Vice President of Organizational Development.

People who have low vision often report they "can't see." Low vision is a condition that can't be corrected by medical or surgical intervention or by eyeglasses. It limits an individual's ability to complete many daily activities, which may include any of the following examples: reading and signing forms, reading the numbers on a clock, or difficulties locating steps, curbs or items within one's home.

Macular degeneration, glaucoma, or history of stroke or diabetes, are the most common medical conditions causing low vision. Simple tasks may become more difficult and frustration often occurs with low vision. Although low vision can't be corrected, there are many ways to make daily tasks easier. There is now help locally for people affected by low vision.
