My fellow Lions:

As my year as your District Governor for 2017-2018 draws to a close, I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you for helping those in need. Every day, you serve as examples of our great Lions' mission: "Where there's a need, there's a Lion."

On my visits to your clubs, I have spoken about the "Power of We"the magic that happens when Lions come together to serve. Let me give you one example: During a Lions meeting at the Manor Inn in Southington, I visited the owner, Ray, in his office. I noticed a fundraising flier for a three year old boy named Nicholas. Ray told me that, "Nicholas's mother works here, but when doctors discovered that he had stage four cancer, she hasn't been able to work. Instead, she has been taking Nicholas to Childrens' Hospitals in Hartford and Boston. It's been tough on them financially."

I said that my wife Nora and I would gladly help out. When I returned to the meeting, I advised our fellow Lions of Nicholas' situation and asked if we could pass a hat around the room. We collected \$267 for Nicholas that night. At other Lions events, I have continued to talk about Nicholas and to collect funds for him and his family. To date, we have collected and donated \$903 to Nicholas's family. Nicholas's father couldn't thank the Lions enough for our help. This is the Power of We.

Regarding the club visits, with the assistance of First VDG Harry Schuh and Second VDG Ev Lyons, we have now visited nearly all the clubs of our district – a task that will be completed before this Lions' year end. On my visit to the Plainville Lions Club, I had the pleasure of presenting the Life Membership award to Lion John Czerepek for his many years of service. I also had the honor of congratulating the Hartford Evening Lions Club which collected seventy-five prom dresses and shipped them to high schools in

Puerto Rico so their students could attend their proms. It is incredibly important to get these people back to normal as quickly as possible. This too is the "Power of We."

In terms of membership, we are down this year, but not by much, and we are rebuilding our ranks at a slow, steady pace. We have a program in place that can assist any club in recruiting new members. Call me to learn about it and get started. It works!

For LCIF, we have exceeded our goal of raising \$41,475 by \$6,025 (14.5%) to date. By the close of this Lions' year, we expect to have more than \$50,000, an increase of more than 20%. This too is the Power of We.

For veterans, please note that the \$35 application fee is waived until June 30, 2018. If you know a veteran who wants to be a Lion, get their application in! If you don't know a veteran, reach out to the VFWs and American Legion Posts in your area. Ask the respective commanders if we can work together on service projects.

We have a new Leo Club in Watertown High School. With this new club, we have installed 115 new Leos this year. We expect this number to rise with a new club forming in Windsor, and hopeful signs in Hartford and Plainville.

The Hartford St. Patrick Day Parade was a huge success this year. More than 31,000 spectators watched us march and many more saw us on Fox 61. This year I asked Fidelco to bring a service dog to march with us. Fidelco sent three dogs and they were the highlight of the parade—especially for the children!

I would like to thank District Governor Emilio Colon Rodriguez of District 510 in Puerto Rico for his assistance and cooperation with the nine Connecticut Lions who traveled to the island to help victims of the hurricane. We spent long days reaching out to people in need—an experience I will never forget.
Together, we shipped more than 200,000 supplies to Puerto Rico.

This too, is the Power of We and also the Power of Lions working together for a common cause. Let's finish this year strong!

"Lions have expanded their scope of service well beyond eyesight," said event organizer, Lion Nora Deleon Clark. It was a great opportunity for women and families to connect with the resources they need to improve their lives."

Canton Lions Club Renovates Youth Center

Canton Lions donated time and dollars to renovate bathroom facilities at "The Cave" - Canton's center for at-risk youth, located in a local church. The Cave provides games and free refreshments every Friday night. Occasionally there is live music by local musicians.

In operation for more than forty years, the Cave's facilities have seen better days. Canton Lion Chuck Fillian proposed that the club commit \$3,000 to purchase supplies and provide free labor to refurbish the bathrooms at the Cave. The club accepted Chuck's proposal and began work on April 21.

On successive Saturdays, Canton Lions have scraped, sealed and painted walls, installed a ventilation system, added shelves and closed holes in the walls. A local plumber donated his time to rework the hot and cold water supplies to the bathrooms. The church has contracted an electrician to straighten out wiring issues.

In the coming weeks, a tile floor will be laid, new plumbing fixtures installed and a drop ceiling added to hide the pipes and wires to the bathrooms.

"The difference is like night and day," said Canton Lion Bob Bessel. "The kids will know that our community cares."
