#### **Greetings from East Hartford**

In the event you were not able to attend the Business meeting at Mid-Winter Conference, I am sharing a summary of my report to the Council. This report summarizes the first half of this Lions year. In September, I was pleased to join our District leaders when IP Bob Corlew came on his bus to visit Connecticut. It was a great day for all in our State.

I tried something new in September, and held our first District Assembly. More than half the clubs were represented, and the approval rating was very high. Attendees learned about Social Media and are working on updating their skills within their clubs. District Directories were distributed, and Club Officers appreciated not having to wait for the first Zone meeting to have the books. Breakouts to Mini Zone meetings offered the opportunity to meet the rest of the clubs and officers in Zones, prior to the October Zone meeting. Zone chairs were delighted to get to know some of the officers and begin to build a relationship and outline their goals for the year. This will help to make their Zone meetings more effective.

In October, we held all Zone meetings, and as I needed to miss 2, I was in communication with each Zone Chair. I shared documents related to developing our clubs, and how to attract new members. The second round of Zone meetings were in January, and clubs came back with at least one idea they are trying with their clubs for membership growth. Great ideas are being shared, and I sense clubs interested in growing membership to do more for their communities.

The District's new club, the Hartford County Everest Centennial Lions Club, hereinafter known as the Everest Lions, had their Charter night in November. They eagerly participated in an Orientation session. They are actively participating in District activities, and understand the importance of



member involvement. Thank you to all that attended the Charter Night – a wonderful display of Nepalese culture.

The American School for the Deaf Appreciation Dinner was a great success. This annual event is a great way for Clubs to present their donation directly to the School. An overflow crowd this year and \$7,800 was donated to the School.

The bad news – the membership numbers are down 55 members from July 1 count. GMT Jim Trompeter is doing a great job presenting information and options to clubs to assist them. I am still optimistic, and are reminding clubs they have paid for their members through June – no need to drop

them at this point.


So on to SPRING, Arbor Day tree planting, and all else that comes with this welcome change of season. ENJOY!

## **Lions Measles Initiative**

#### **DID YOU KNOW THAT**

- 335 children die each day from Measles or 14 deaths every hour
- Most measles deaths occur in unvaccinated children under the age of five
- 30 percent of survivors experience complications
- When one person has measles,
   90 percent of those they come into contact with will become infected, if they have not been vaccinated or have not previously contracted the disease
- For less than US\$1, a child can be vaccinated against Measles

As you may already know, Lions and LCIF have mobilized more than US\$50 million over the past few years for measles-related activities; and tens of thousands of deaths have been averted - most of them children. However, our work is not done. The foundation has committed to providing Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance US\$30 million by December 2017, LCIF has raised US\$20 million toward that commitment – so significant support is required over the final year. Please keep in mind that our \$30 million commitment to Gavi is being matched dollar for dollar by the United Kingdom's Department for International Development and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Every dollar raised, the impact of donations from Lions is automatically doubled.


#### Zone 2

The Connecticut VIP Tournament Committee works closely with BESB, the Blind Veterans Association, the Federation of the Blind, Berlin Lions, and Lions Clubs from across the state. With their continue help and tremendous group of volunteers, tournament participation has grown every year since its beginning.

NO FISHING SKILL NEEDED! If you don't know how to fish, don't let that keep you from joining the fun! We have plenty of experienced and enthusiastic anglers to assist in your fishing experience! These tournaments are only possible with the support and dedication of our incredible volunteers! There are too many to list individually, but we are grateful for every one! These volunteers see that every detail is covered, organizing breakfast and lunch, making sure there is enough bait, trophies, providing transportation for those in need, lending their sight to help rig a jump in registration so far. The SENIOR tournament, open to those blind or visually impaired age 16 years and older, is a full day of fishing aboard the Black Hawk Fishing Charter out of Niantic, CT. Experienced fishing guides, and transportation for our VIP'S is also provided if needed. In addition to competing for trophies, three of the top anglers (if they have not attended in the past two years) are eligible to represent Connecticut at the 2017 NEW ENGLAND and NATIONAL VIP Fishing Tournaments held this year from October16-18, 2017 on the Outer Banks of North Carolina! Our adult VIP's range in age from 16 to 93! Many of our adult VIP's are Veterans, and many are Lions from New Milford, Wethersfield, Middletown, Plainville to name a few. In 2016, we had our biggest 18 registered in 2015 and 33 VIP's in 2016! We have all learned so much from our VIP's...the biggest lesson being...there are no limitations. There is plenty of friendly competition among our VIP's...all vying to be one of the top three anglers for the chance to compete in the New England and

## Connecticut Lions Donate \$90,000 to UCONN Eye Research

At the Lions Mid-Winter Conference, Dr. Keith Lemire, president of the Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation (CLERF), presented a check for \$90,000 to UCONN researcher Dr. Mansoor Sarfarazi for his work to eradicate blindness.

Dr. Sarfarazi's laboratory is identifying genes associated with glaucoma in families with a history of the disease. By identifying the genes that cause glaucoma, Dr. Sarfarzi will be able to help identify people at higher risk for glaucoma, lead to new treatments and possibly a cure.

CLERF has supported Dr. Sarfarazi's research for the past three years.




#### **Eye Screenings**

#### **Terryville Lions Club**

The Plymouth Lions Club shares a letter to Barbara K. Trinks, the Director of Pupil Personnel and Special Education Services for the Plymouth Public Schools, from the Nursing Coordinator for the Plymouth Public Schools regarding the club's vision screenings:

#### Hi Barbara:

For the past 5 years, the nurses at the elementary schools in Plymouth have coordinated with the Lions Club to offer an enhanced vision screening for all students in Pre K and K. This program requires parental consent. A standard vision screening is offered by the school nurse to all K students, but the state of CT guidelines do not include the Pre K students in the vision screening guidelines for nurses, making the Lions club screening the only avenue for screening Pre K students in the school setting. This year the program was expanded to offer this screening to all students in grades PK-8.

The benefits of this enhanced screening cannot be overstated. The standard school screening checks each child's eye for distance vision only. It is a multistep process, and for young children who are unfamiliar with the process, a false first failure is common. For older students, who have learned to compensate for vision issues, a false pass is also

not uncommon. If a child fails the initial screening, they are retested after 2 weeks because of the likelihood of a false failure. If the child fails a second time, a referral is sent.

The Lions club screening is able to check for six separate vision issues all in a matter of seconds. Children do not need to do anything more than look into a device that looks like a camera. If a child fails the initial screening, they are immediately given a second test and then referred the same day. Parents receive a print out of the computerized results the same day, whether the child passes or fails.

Since 80% of learning is visual, the benefits of early, accurate screening are essential. By offering the program to grades 1-8 an additional 460 children were screened by the Lions club over a three-week period. We are hoping to continue to offer this program to grades 1-8 and that more parents will take advantage of this program in the future. The nurses strongly value this partnership and hope it continues for many years.

## Dr. Keith Lemire's CLERF Speech at MidWinter

(Editor's Note: This article has been edited for length)

This is an exciting time for Connecticut Lions. We are celebrating 100 years of Lionism and 60 years of our foundation – dedicated to supporting eye research and the conservation of eye sight here in Connecticut. During our Foundation's 60 years of service, the Lions of Connecticut have raised over \$7.4 million and provided more than \$6.8 million dollars in grants to Yale, UCONN and 30 more organizations in Connecticut.

Our Foundation's first grant was \$19,990 to the Yale University to start a new eye research center in 1961 – a 100 square foot laboratory staffed with one technician. Today, the Yale facility is over 10,000 square feet with more than 24 laboratories and a staff of a hundred. The Connecticut Lions Eve Research Foundation has donated over \$4 million to Yale, providing funds for eye research and to Yale's three centers of excellence in glaucoma, macular degeneration and pediatrics. Our support of Yale's eye center and research has saved the vision of thousands of people here in Connecticut.

#### **Friendship and Pin Trading Pins**

Trading Pins were often referred to as Friendship Pins, as many friendships were made while trading items (now referred to as pins) with Lions from all over the world.

In the early 50's most Lion members Plastic, The North Carolina, the were still in the United States and they saw a need to give away or trade to others something at the International Conventions that helped promote their home state. In a lot of cases these items were obtained from their State Chamber of Commerce and were little knick knacks that were give-away to help promote their home state. These items could be combs, knives, letter openers or most anything. New Mexico made a wooden Tomahawk and a pair of beaded slippers to celebrate their Indian Heritage. A shoehorn and wooden key chain were from North Carolina. A corncob pipe was from Missouri and collecting items such as stamps and the telephone dialer was from Kentucky. A bale of cotton came from Tennessee. It is easy to see that these items were bulky and had the same up into the early 1970s, to be hard to carry in any kind of numbers. Most pin traders today usually have at least a hundred pins active. Their enthusiasm for the with them, and some with many, many more. You can see that it would be unwieldy to carry a hundred of the cotton bales or a hundred Tomahawks to Conventions.



Early Trading Items

These items were not issued by the Lions and did not have Lions emblems. They are, however recognized as the first pins traded by lions and as such are highly collectible In the late 50s and early 60s it seems that pins became the thing to trade or give away at conventions.

The very earliest pins were mostly

plastic or tin and made by any company that the state office could get to make them. Both the Montana and Vermont pins were homemade. Some of these such as the New York Plastic, the Montana Pennsylvania, the West Virginia coal and the Virginia tin are guite rare today and bring premium prices from collectors.







Early Lions Pins

Most Multiple Districts issued early pins with the outline of the state or country. These early pins were issued in limited quantities and now are very much sought after by pin traders and collectors. Collecting pins is similar in a lot of ways to coins.

Pin Trading continued pretty much that is to say, there were not very many pin traders, but they were hobby was infectious, and the hobby was growing. At the International convention in Mexico City in 1972, a lion from Pennsylvania, Dutch Blair, contacted several of the pin traders in attendance and discussed forming an International Pin Trading Club. In 1973, at the International Convention in Miami, these pin traders from the US and Canada got together and formed the Lions International Trading Pin Club (LITPC).

The Pin Trading Club of Connecticut was founded in 2001 by PDG Curt Fitch. We are currently in charge of designing the State Pins for Connecticut and the Pin Trading Club.

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UCONN in 1974. With the leadership and vision of the late Dr. Jim O'Rourke, the Connecticut Lions Vision Immunology Center was established in 1981 and in 2002, our Foundation supported the establishment of the Connecticut Lions Vascular Eye Center at the UCONN Health center in Farmington.

Research of the eye's microvascular system has led to new treatments for diabetic eve disease, glaucoma and macular degeneration, all of which destroy the sight of thousands each year. Our Foundation's support of eye research has contributed to the discovery of several genes associated with both macular degeneration and glaucoma. Since 1974, the Connecticut Lions Eve Research Foundation has provided more than \$1.6 million to UCONN. Currently, we are supporting Dr. Mansoor Sarfarazi's eye research of genetic exome sequencing in families with glaucoma. We have supported Dr. Sarfarazi's research for the past three years and his research continues to be successful in identifying genes associated with glaucoma.

Identification of new glaucoma causing genes will help provide better ways of detecting individuals at higher risk for glaucoma as well as lead to potential new treatments for the disease and possibly a cure. Last year, Dr. Sarfarazi requested an additional \$100,000 to support his expanding research project.

Dr. Sarfarazi's research embodies the core, founding mission of our Foundation which is support of eye research here in Connecticut with the purpose of saving vision. We needed to find a way to support his research and when there is a need. there is a Lion and our Connecticut Lions have found a way. On behalf of the great Lions of Connecticut I am pleased to present you today with a check for \$90,000 in support of your current research project. Lions, your Foundation's support of

Since then, Multiple District 23
Connecticut has become one of ten model districts recognized by Lions
Club International. Our Lions
Kidsight USA program has grown quickly with more than 20,000
children screened last year, done with only 6 SPOT vision screeners.
To meet the growing demands of our program, we raised more than \$100,000 in one year. This \$100,000 was matched by a Lions
Club International Foundation grant, the largest LCIF matching grant received in our State's history.

With the additional funds, we have purchased 25 additional SPOT vision screeners and we are now successfully meeting the demand for our Lions Kidsight USA program. Since July 1st, we have screened more than 36,000 children. More than 11% of those children screened were referred for further evaluation by an eye care professional. Lions, we have literally saved the vision of thousands of children.

We should be very proud of our Foundation's accomplishments and just as confident about its future.
