



Dr. Hardison noted his club was fortunate to be able to welcome Fidelco Volunteer Puppy Raisers and their puppies to the event so patrons could see exactly what they were supporting.

Fidelco Guide Dog Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit charitable organization based in Bloomfield, Connecticut, that promotes increased independence to men and women who are blind by providing them with the highest quality German Shepherd guide dogs. It takes two years, 15,000 hours, and \$45,000 to breed, train, and place each guide dog. Fidelco gives these life-changing partners to its blind clients at no cost and provides 24/7 lifetime service to all working guide dog teams.

The Greater Hartford Host Lions Club has been servicing the greater Hartford community for over 90 years. Its members raise funds to assist with their various service projects and charities, including free eye exams and glasses for needy children, vision screenings for young children and older adults, yearly scholarships for college bound students, and assistance to Oak Hill and The Village in Hartford, the Lions Eye Research Foundation, and the American School for the Deaf in West Hartford.

Enthusiastic Lions from all over Connecticut gathered for a Special Convention held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Cromwell to formally endorse Windsor Locks Lion, PID Carolyn Messier for Lions Clubs International Vice President. Convention Chairperson, PDG Joan Bennett, called the convention to order to a "standing room only" audience.

After establishing protocol and appropriate reports were given, PDG Joan recognized our District Global Leadership Team Coordinator, Colchester Lion Marie Salpietro to nominate her sister, Lion Carolyn.

Lion Marie reflected the family values firmly instilled in them both from their working-class parents who had to work hard to earn whatever they had. She went on to stress her sister's demonstrated philosophy of "persistence, caring, and action" throughout her life. She highlighted examples such as: Lion Carolyn's persistence in her nine year struggle of testing & surgery to have their first-born son, Jeffrey; and her tremendous caring through her dogged support of her brotherin-law, Lion George, who had suddenly lost his eyesight. She called every contact she had to help get him what he needed to overcome his challenges. "He was back to work in a year!" stated Lion Marie.

Recounting other of Lion Carolyn's accomplishments as an extremely action oriented Lion right from the start, she became her club's first woman president. Likewise, she had worked her way to District Governor and Multiple District 23 Council Chairperson. After months of campaigning and expense following her dream to make a difference, Lion Carolyn was elected from several other candidates as International Director, where she would strive to lead other Lions around the world to follow their dreams and take an active role. Lion Marie said, "After her term as International Director she was asked to serve as a board appointee . . . she served on the LCI Membership Development Committee . . . a founding charter member of the Kid's Sight Committee."

Also, serving on the Families and Women's Action Committee, she mentored and inspired men and women to make a difference, one person at a time. "I am very proud and honored to nominate my sister, Carolyn Messier, for the high office of Vice President of Lions International," declared Lion Marie.

The Windsor Lions meet on second and fourth Tuesday's at 6:30 PM at Union Street Tavern in Windsor.



AMERICAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

The District 23B Spirit team is very pleased to welcome the American School for the Deaf as a contributor. and support services offered both In future issues, we'll learn stories about some of the students we help with our contributions to the school. In this issue, we discover what the ASD is all about.

The American School for the Deaf (ASD), founded in 1817, is the oldest special education school in the Western Hemisphere and the only school in Connecticut exclusively devoted to the education students unable to follow a of deaf and hard of hearing children.

ASD's mission is to serve deaf and hard of hearing infants, youth, and their families in the development of intellect and the enhancement of quality of life, utilizing specially designed instruction through an American Sign Language English Bilingual Approach, empowering them to become educated and selfdirected lifelong learners.

ASD has been a national and world leader in the education of deaf and hard of hearing children while also leading the way in the development of innovative instructional models since its founding. As such, it is regarded by other schools for the deaf in the United States as an innovator, with its programs often serving as catalysts for new program development in other schools for the deaf.

ASD provides services to children ages Birth-21. Enrollment in prekindergarten through grade 12 is 170, and approximately 75% of the students are Connecticut residents. 82% of our students have at least one disability in addition to deafness; 68% are members of a racial or ethnic minority group; and 75% are from low income families and qualify for the federal free or reduced lunch program. In addition,

400+ children, youth, and adults benefit from a variety of outreach on and off campus, including the After-School Language Enrichment Program; Early Childhood Intervention Program (Birth-to-Three Program); Adult Vocational Services; and audiological services.

ASD also offers a residential treatment and education program for students with behavioral and emotional disorders. For those traditional academic path, vocational programs provide handson training in a variety of disciplines, including culinary arts, videography, photography, broadcast journalism, graphic design, woodcraft, automotive studies, and robotics. The American School for the Deaf greatly appreciates the support of the Lions of District 23B for their faithful support throughout the years, which enables ASD to provide exceptional programming for the deaf and hard of hearing citizens in our community.

The East Hartford Lions Club has donated Low Vision equipment to the new Raymond Library in hopes of aiding low vision residents to fully enjoy the newly renovated library.

Stephen Del Tatto of Silver Linings Technologies recently delivered and set up the TOPAZ-EZ video magnifier with a 20-inch monitor. A person with low vision will be able to use this equipment at the library to read any magazine, book, or other printed material. They will place the item to be read on the tray, a camera in the machine magnifies it and it is displayed on a 20-inch screen. There are a variety of settings on the machine to adjust the level of magnifications. The entire tray at the bottom moves so they can go line by line through the reading material.

The second purchase that the East Hartford Lions Club has donated is a ZoomText Magnifier/Reader software that has been loaded into two computers. This program increases the size of the printing on the monitor with many levels of magnification as well as the capability of speech while using earphones. In addition, along with the computers with the ZoomText software, there are two large print keyboards with special function keys that work directly with ZoomText.

The East Hartford Lions Club has been actively involved in making the Town of East Hartford a better place to live and work for the past 65 years. Fidelco Stories Losing Her Sight, But Not Her Vision

Jacqueline Rennebohm did not realize she was visually impaired. After all, at 5 years old, you don't tend to think about such things. But by the age of 9, the signs Jacqueline had been experiencing progressed, and she was eventually diagnosed with cone-rod dystrophy. Her sight continues to decline with every passing year -and it will not stop until she has lost all her vision. Today, she can only see about five feet of color and light through her peripheral vision, but since her diagnosis, she has been determined to live life "like anybody else." So, she became involved in sports-and she hasn't looked back.

A two-sport athlete, Jacqueline has found that sports provide her an increased sense of well-being and control, along with incredible opportunities. With adaptations in place, Jacqueline competed at the highest level at numerous world class events. For example, she swam for Canada in the 2008 Paralympics in Beijing and ran track and field for her country during the 2011 Parapan American Games in Guadalajara. She found ways to adapt to each sport to allow for safety and maintain competitiveness. When she swam, she used the assistance of a tapper: When Jacqueline approached a wall, she was tapped on the head by a stick with a sponge on the end of it; this signaled to her to turn. When she ran, she did so with a guide runner who provided her oral commands, such as when to turn, when to straighten out, and how to stay in her lane. Today, Jacqueline is no longer competing for Team Canada; however, she is staying active by engaging in public speaking events promoting disability and sport.

At interviews and public speaking events, a common question Jacqueline gets is why she chose to use a guide dog instead of a white



cane. "All of my life I have been adapting to vision loss. This is the world I know very well. But being completely blind is a world I do not know, nor is there a handbook to prepare fully for it. My guide dog is the only thing I know for certain will be there by my side when I cross over into this new reality of blindness.... This comforts me as I get closer to crossing that line because I cannot imagine interacting with a world without color and light. Guide dogs have important responsibilities, including witnessing for themselves the challenges and victories you face on a consistent bases. For my own personal transition, it is this consistency that I need the most for achieving true independence. Therefore, my Fidelco guide dog is a true gift, and I am grateful for the support from staff and donors that continue to make a difference in my and other clients' lives."

Jacqueline learned about Fidelco from a friend who is also a client. She was impressed with Fidelco and with all those characteristics that define Fidelco's highest quality German Shepherd Guide Dogs: their intelligence, temperament, stamina, and focus. Jacqueline's current Fidelco Guide Dog is named Jewel. She is Jacqueline's biggest cheerleader and her most loyal supporter. Jewel is supremely focused and wholly confident in herself and in her job. With Jewel by her side, Jacqueline is ready to take on the future, whatever that may hold for these incredible and inspiring partners.

A recent Western University graduate from London, Ontario, Jacqueline wants to stress that Fidelco's mission stretches far beyond Connecticut, and even beyond the United States. In fact, Fidelco has placed guide dogs all across North America, in 41 states and five Canadian provinces, and Jacqueline is proud to have her province counted among those regions.

Like many college graduates, Jacqueline isn't quite sure what's next. Nor does she know what complete blindness is going to be like. But having a Fidelco Guide Dog by her side makes facing that outcome easier for Jacqueline, because she knows and trusts her dog.




Some of our clubs send a few people. Most of our clubs don't. And that hurts us all.

Diabetes Awareness Now!




