Melvin Jones

When Melvin Jones joined a networking luncheon club for businessmen in Chicago called the Business Circle, He quickly took the lead in recruiting new members. But something about the club's business-only focus didn't square with Jones' different, larger vision. "What if these men who are successful because of their drive, intelligence and ambition, were to put their talents to work improving their communities?" Jones asked. He saw a new kind of club with the desire to help others, and Lions Clubs were born!

President Jimmy Carter

Former U.S. President Jimmy Carter was a dedicated member of Lions Clubs International. He joined the Plains Lions Club in Georgia in 1953, shortly after resigning from the Navy. Carter's involvement with the organization was profound; he served as a District Governor and remained an active Lion throughout his life. His commitment to the Lions' mission of community service and humanitarian efforts was evident in his collaboration with the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Together, they worked on initiatives to combat preventable blindness and alleviate suffering in impoverished communities. Carter once expressed his gratitude, stating, "I have a feeling of gratitude for what Lions do throughout the world. Lions have changed my life."

Knights of the Blind

Every Lion has heard the story about Helen Keller challenging us to serve as Knights of the Blind. But did you know that Lions were already serving the blind when Ms. Keller addressed our 1925 convention?

Lions had already begun a Braille newsletter in 1922 and were actively working with employers to find meaningful jobs for the blind. This work, prior to the 1925 convention in Sandusky, Ohio, inspired Helen Keller's challenge for Lions to do more.

Ms. Keller's speech opened the floodgates for Lions service to the blind. Many of these projects continue to this day: Sight screenings Boy Scout Troops for the blind, white

canes and guide dogs - all of these programs started with the Lions after Ms. Keller's speech in 1925. But that's not all.

Lions set up eye research foundations in state after state. Lions set up eye banks to provide corneal implants nationwide. Sight First takes this program global, providing eye care clinics anywhere they're needed world wide. Our eyeglass collections and recycling centers supply the glasses given out by Sight First clinicians, giving people with limited vision their first clear view of the world.

Kidsight is the latest program in this long history of service - all encouraged by Helen Keller who stayed by our side for the rest of her life. The story of Helen Keller's work with Lions will be a major feature of this year's Mid-Winter Conference, February 7-9 in Southbury. We hope you can join us!
