District Governor's Corner DG Dave Roberts

Dear Lions, Leo-Lions, Leos and Cubs,

It is hard to believe that Lions Year 2022-2023 is fast coming to a close and this will be my last message to you as Lions District 23-B Governor. It has been such an honor to serve as your District Governor this year and I want to thank all of you for offering me this leadership opportunity. THANK YOU!

As your District Governor, I have so enjoyed visiting our impactful clubs for their meetings and service projects, representing all of you at Lions Low Vision Center

and Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation, and serve as your biggest cheerleader at MD-23 Council events and LCI events. Yes, I will miss serving as your District Governor, but I am so pleased to see the tremendous leaders who will have their turns to serve and experience the joys that I have experienced during Lions Year 2022-2023.

So, let me provide a summary recap of our District this year from my perspective:

Since 1950, Lions of Hartford and Litchfield Counties (District 23-B) have been serving those neighbors most in need through a variety of impactful service initiatives. Today, District 23-B is honored to have 1,830 members, the most in its' 73-year history, with a net new growth of 39 Lions joining our association this past Lions Year 2022-2023, adding more hands to continue our strong tradition of community service. Clubs form the heart of Lions International, and these 1,830 Lions are divided in 56 separate Lions Clubs (traditional, cyber and specialty), with two new Lions Clubs chartering this Lions Year. The Hartford PAK-K2 Lions Club was chartered in October 2022 as a specialty club comprised of Pakistani-American businesspeople in the Greater Hartford region. In March 2023, the Riverton Lions Club was chartered as a specialty club focused on preserving the historical character of this quaint New England village located on the Farmington River.

Leos, young Lions ages 12-18, are a critical component of our District. Under the leadership of Leo District Chair Cindy Daniels, our Leo Clubs have continued to recover and flourish following the pandemic. This Lions Year, Leos in our District had a number of firsts. Leo Sophia Marangoudakis was the first Leo officially appointed to serve as a member of the District Cabinet. Leo Sophia was also named the Connecticut Lions Leo of the Year for Lion Year 2022-2023. Leo Mihika Joshi was the first Leo in our District to be nominated for a New Voices recognition. And thanks to a student sponsored by the Windsor Locks Lions Club, District 23-B won first prize in the Connecticut Lions Student Peace Poster Contest. And thanks to the Hartford County Everest Centennial and the West Hartford Lumbini Lions Clubs, a student won first prize in the 6th Annual Youth Oratory Contest. Leos are our NOW!

Lions always step up to the plate when a need arises. In October 2022, Connecticut experienced a terrible tragedy when a mentally disturbed young man ambushed three police officers in Bristol, Connecticut, killing two of them. Lions immediately wanted to join with others who wanted to help. While the community raised over \$1million

dollars for the families of the slain officers, Lions wanted to do more. Following a meeting of Lions leaders, our District decided to start a Lions Club Branch and recruited six adults as Lions and two high school students as Leos. The new members selected the name "Connecticut 988 Lions Club Branch" as their official branch name. They selected 988 as it is now the new three-digit, nationwide phone number that connects directly to the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. One of the first projects for this new branch was to host a tabletop display at the Connecticut Lions Mid-Winter Convention to announce this new initiative to over 300 Lions and Leos at the three-day convention in Southbury, Connecticut. Moving forward, members will determine how to spread mental health awareness information, particularly in rural areas, to those in need. Students will research needs in the towns of New Hartford and Barkhamsted, Connecticut, to see what gaps, if any, exist in providing mental health services. LCIF awarded the new Branch a grant to train two members to receive QPR training. QPR stands for Question, Persuade, and Refer – the three simple steps anyone can learn to help save a life from suicide. QPR training helps save lives and reduce suicidal behaviors by providing innovative, practical, and proven suicide prevention training. Quality education empowers people, regardless of their background, to make a positive difference in the lives of others. These trained Lions will then train others on how to save lives.

Lions Year 2022-2023 has been a tremendously successful year as we recovered from the pandemic, added positive membership growth, added two new Lions Clubs, focused on new specialty Clubs and Branches, promoted our young Leos, and expanded our service opportunities. Over 135,000 people were served this Lions Year within our District through over 1,200 completed service projects. Lions donated close to 30,000 reported service hours. Finally, Lions in our District raised over \$300,000 to help assist those most in need. Lions International President Brian Sheehan challenged all Lions Year 2022-23 District Governors to have an awesome year of impactful service. Thanks to the 1,830 Lions and our 200+ Leos, District 23-B exceed President Sheehan's expectations! Together we can, together we will, together we did!

I especially want to thank my Cabinet for their strong support and commitment to Connecticut Lions and to me this year. This team was just what our District needed at this time and together we are working to expand Lionism for all of you and your Lions and Leos. Thank you, Cabinet colleagues!
