MD21 has four state projects: Arizona Lions Camp Tatiyee, Lions Foundation of Arizona (LFA), Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation (LS&HF), and Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial (MJLIM).

There is also a special project that we support, Arizona Lions Vision Center.

The two 21-B district projects are C. Kirby Smithe Lions International Youth Exchange (CKS) and Arizona Lions Eyeglass Recycling Terminal (ALERT).

Each project was asked to educate and inform all Lions about their project. Please make sure all Lions get this information. Remember, the state projects and district projects were voted on at the state or district level for the Lions to support the project. There are Lions on each of the boards from around the state or district, Lions who volunteer with the project at the state or district level, and Lions AND clubs that support the project with fund raisers and monetary support. Remember these are LIONS projects – not community projects – it is up to US to support OUR projects. Some of our projects have existed for decades – Lions who came before us thought they were worthy enough to vote to support them - we need to continue this legacy and support OUR projects and it our responsibility to educate all of our club members about the projects. Remember ALL PROJECTS in your club and personal budget. They are OUR projects! Call a board member today for a presentation on a project – it is your responsibility to learn about the projects.



### C. Kirby Smithe Lions International Youth Exchange (CKS) - a 21-B District Project since 1997

Can you name a Lions International program that probably has the most influence on fostering mutual understanding among the people of the world? If you said Lions International Youth Exchange, you would be "right on." Since 1961, Lions Clubs International Youth Exchange program has given tens of thousands of young people representing some 80 nationalities an opportunity to gain a greater understanding of their roles as world citizens.

In 1980, a Tucson Lion, PID Ernie Rizek was a newly elected District Governor, attending the International Convention in Montgomery, Alabama.

During the course of the convention, he was introduced to some young adult men who were participating in the Montgomery, Alabama youth camp. Then, IP William Chandler challenged each district to start a youth camp in his district in the coming year. Lion Ernie took the challenge to heart and made it one of his goals for his term as DG. In 1981, he received the permission to establish a youth camp in district 21B. Lion Ernie was asked to name the camp and he chose to name it after one of the most influential youth workers in Tucson and a close personal friend, C. Kirby Smithe, who had distinguished himself as a Lion, businessman, father, husband and humanitarian.

C. Kirby Smithe Lions International Youth Camp is 37 years old this year. In the past 37 years we have hosted over 340 young men and women from a variety of countries in Europe, Asia, Africa, and South America. Between the years of 1984 and 1996, the camp enjoyed the honor of hosting the International President at our farewell dinner. Each year we host up to ten students from different countries around the world, between the ages of 16 and 20. We provide them with a two-week experience living with an Arizona host family. The camp provides touring throughout the beautiful state of Arizona, enjoying the natural wonders of our state and learning about the diversity and culture of our area. The north trip includes visits to Wickenburg, Prescott, Sedona, Grand Canyon, Mogollon Rim and Camp Tatiyee. The south trip includes Globe, a mine tour in Morenci, Safford and a visit to the Melvin Jones Memorial, Douglas, Nogales Arizona and Nogales Sonora, Tombstone, Bisbee and Tucson. Our campers fly in and out of Tucson International Airport and our base camp has been at the Radisson Suites on Speedway for the past two years.

Host families are always needed. The host families and the students are introduced by email and/or Facebook prior to the visit and can become acquainted through this exchange. The two weeks with a host family provides the student the opportunity to observe the American way of life and gives the host family the opportunity to learn about other cultures. My wife and I have had the opportunity to host 17 young people from Europe, Asia and South America over the years. These experiences have truly been enriching for our family.

We are also trying to promote greater participation for outgoing students. The opportunities are vast. The student should be within the ages of 16 and 21 and must be sponsored by a local Lions club. Most camps have a minimum fee, which can be paid by the sponsoring club or the student. If you know of any youth who would like to spend a month free in any of 186 countries in the world, all you need do is contact the C. Kirby Smithe Board. The youth can be a son, daughter, grandchild or the child of a friend. The candidate is expected to provide transportation to and from the country of choice and to have spending money for incidentals. As a sponsor, you are expected to vouch for the good conduct and character of the youth. The time to initiate the process is late winter or early spring.

We rely on donations from the clubs of District 21B to fund our operation and are very appreciative of all the clubs who do so. It allows us to provide a great experience to our visiting international youth. Please include us in your budget each year. The C. Kirby Smithe Board of Directors consists of 12 members who serve for a three-year term. There are currently open positions on the Board. We encourage Lions of 21B to consider serving on this Board. It is an amazing experience.

These are BIG numbers because of the efforts of our Lions and clubs around the district who diligently collect eyeglasses all over their community in order to support this effort. Keep in mind that we collect so much more than what we send out on missions, because by the time the glasses are collected, sorted, cleaned, and read and determined if they are good enough for someone, somewhere around the world to put on their face — well, we go through a lot of bad glasses to come up with the eyeglasses that actually reach the mission field.

ALERT is so thankful for the satellite centers. These satellites are the lifeblood for our district project as they keep the work of collecting, sorting, cleaning, and reading the glasses right in their community. This is so the clubs in that area can use this effort as a recruiting effort in their community. What better way to get non-Lions to come help with a project than with the basics of Lionism right in their own backyard. It also allows club members to feel a part of the district project without leaving their community and travelling to Tucson where the project is based. The Tucson facility is the central distribution center. All finished glasses from the satellites come to the center for distribution to missions. The satellites also use some of the collected readers and plain sunglasses at events around their community to give to those in need, including homeless veterans and libraries. This is a great way to give back in your very own local community.

We accepted the challenge issued by Helen Keller and became "Knights of the Blind" to help battle and end preventable blindness.

Our three primary services provide for: Quality eye care and surgeries; new and refurbished hearing aids; we recycle eyeglasses, hearing aids, and cell phones.

The Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation has restored vision and hearing to thousands of low-income Arizona residents of all ages for 40 plus years. Medical professionals donate or discount their services allowing us to stretch each dollar donated to provide extra dollars' worth of services.

Our "Lend Us Your Ear Program" provides refurbished and new hearing aids. The new digital hearing aids are provided to our clients at a very low cost by Zounds

Hearing Aid Company. The owner and CEO Lion Sam Thomasson has pledged to donate one hearing aid for every aid sold to a Lion, family member or friend of a Lion. You simply inform the hearing professionals at any Zounds Center at the time of your purchase and they match the purchase. (There are certain restrictions that apply, any store has the details)

Our dedicated staff and Board of Directors strive to serve those without resources. Each year the Foundation along with ALERT, provides thousands of previously owned eyeglasses to medical missions throughout the world.

### LIONS FOUNDATION OF ARIZONA (LFA)

#### BETCHA DON'T KNOW LFA!



LFA was born in 1961 and given the task of being the landlord for Arizona Lions. At the lowest possible cost, its task is to provide physical facilities to organizations serving the blind, visually impaired and handicapped. By doing this it gives the physically challenged an opportunity to access a variety of services at a single location. For those individuals seeking help, the Lions Foundation complex (3124 E. Roosevelt Street, Phoenix, AZ) offers a wide variety of related services in convenient proximity. The Lions Foundation of Arizona is firmly committed to the philosophy that all individuals with disabilities are entitled to equal opportunity for achieving self-fulfillment and independence as well as acceptance and full participation in the community.

### The Lions Foundation of Arizona Complex provides the following services:

**Arizona Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired** - The Center is a social recreational area offering programs, classes and activities directed toward a more independent and productive life for those persons visually impaired. It offers classes in computers, crafts and mobility training, as well as homemaking and other skills for daily living.

Arizona Council of the Blind - Provides resources for a more independent life style for the blind.

**Arizona Lions Vision Center -** Is an optometric clinic that offers eye examinations and glasses to low income adults and child.

**Alanon Group** - Provides support for individuals with alcoholic family members.

**Aspire Therapy** - Provides physical therapy either outside or in a heated indoor pool for physically challenged individuals. Speech and occupational therapy is also available. Clients consist mostly of handicapped children, but services for adults can also be provided. They work with Access State Insurance and lower income individuals.

Eye Fix - Provides eye prosthesis for children.

Missiones Iglesia – A congregation providing spiritual guidance and help to all individuals.

Zazdanoff Chiropractic - Chiropractic care.

Dr. Porter Pain & Treatment Center - Provides pain and treatment care.

Bet you didn't know that LFA provides a conference room at no cost to Lions. The conference room can seat up to 40 people.

LFA is also the landlord for property owned by the Lions of Arizona, located in Tucson called "La Casa de Los Leones". This is a HUD thirty-six unit property providing low cost, independent living housing for individuals 62 years or older and/or wheelchair bound. It's a safe haven and a place called home for its tenants. La Casa is family oriented with activities scheduled throughout the month along with guest speakers for information services offered to the elderly.

LFA continues to work hard to complete a complex land exchange with the US Forrest Service. LFA is working to secure the land where Lions Camp Tatiyee is located. The Lions of Arizona have stepped forward to finance the exchange. When completed the Lions of Arizona will own the Camp Tatiyee land. This will ensure all physically and mentally challenged campers a place to continue their camping experience now and in many years to come.

A total of five employees handle all the daily operations for both the Tucson and Phoenix facilities (four part-time and one full time employee). Most of the expenses for daily operations for the LFA campus are covered by rents from the Phoenix campus. Lions are asked to donate to compensate for any revenue shortfalls or unpredictable expenses. The Lions Foundation Board of Directors have experience in real estate, banking, finance, manufacturing, accounting, insurance and law to name a few. Their pledge is to manage and protect LFA's assets for the Lions of Arizona.

On be-half of the board of directors we thank all the clubs and members in District 21-B for their donations and support along with all the Lions in MD21. The last couple of years we have had one person who has been a great supporter and that is our favorite son of Arizona IPIP Joe Preston and his first lady Lion Joni.

We have many great things happening at the memorial this year, the biggest project is the building of new Granite tablets behind the spire that are the same size as the bricks. The purpose of doing this is the brick engraving is very costly and difficult to keep the engraving from fading. The Granite tablets have arrived and are ready to be shipped to the engraver in Safford for the engraving. We hope to have approximately 300 tablets mounted by the time of our Lions Re-dedication on January 9, 2016. Talking about our Lions Re-dedication, it will be January 9, 2016 and our International guest will be 2<sup>nd</sup>

V.P Naresh Aggarwal from of Delhi, India. We owe a lot of thanks to IPIP Joe and PCC Alan for making these arrangements.

We had the irrigation system remolded and re-located to serve the landscaping better; we had a new alarm system installed; both the front windows have been replaced and new blinds installed. The front Ramada bench seats were broken and worn out and we are having those replaced. It takes approximately \$25,000 a year to maintain the museum, spire and grounds. The grounds are used also for some of the locals to have family picnics and social events so we are serving the community.

We are the only state project or foundation that does not have paid personnel all the directors and volunteers are just that...they VOLUNTEER their time and efforts. There also is some misunderstanding that we get funding from LCI or LCIF. The only money we have ever received from LCI is a \$2,000 P.R. Grant but we have not received this funding for the past two years.

Please ask any director for a rack card and support our Vanguard project, you will hear more about this project when you ask one of our directors to present a program to your club. Please contact me to make arrangements for a director to attend your club meeting. We also have a new Historical committee with PDG Donna Anderson acting as chairperson.

We keep hearing from some Lions that we need to change the location of the memorial. Melvin Jones stated: Ft. Thomas is the place where I was born and have two brothers buried. It is already a historical site as a Fort, and while Safford is only 18 Miles from Ft. Thomas, Ft. Thomas is only 18 miles from Safford; this is the location of the memorial that I want and do not want it at any other location.

There is a continuing misconception in regards to the Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial re-dedication. It is very important to remember that each year we re-dedicate ourselves to Lionism we are not re-dedicating the Memorial as it was previously dedicated in 1965. If any clubs have Lions that want to be inducted please bring them to the re-dedication for the ceremony.

We will be making more announcements about the future of the memorial in the coming months. We ask all Lions for their continued support and donations. When you are planning your budget for next year please remember the Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial.

The Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial has been approved by Lions Club International for solicitation of funds. The Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial is a 501(c)3 Corporation therefore all contributions given in the United States are fully tax deductible. Again thank you for all your donations and help to keep the memorial up to date and in good condition.

### **A Special Project**



Vision Center is a long time project for Arizona Lions. Founded by Camelback Lions, the Phoenix office opened in 1964, the Sun City office opened in 2001, and the Tucson office opened in 2010. The Vision Center Mission: "To provide eye examinations and eyeglasses to those members of the general public who could not normally afford such services or products." The Mission has expanded since:

### Vision services through three offices:

Approximately \$500,000 annual budget

12,000 pair of eyeglasses provided in 2013

Examination, lenses, frames, and fitting: \$65 Single Vision - \$85 Bifocals

Only latest generation lenses are used – no old technology

Frames from quality, recognized manufacturers

More specialized lens options available at upcharge

Open to club's clients and Arizona Lions

Offices operate at near break even

Club donations welcomed to defray operating costs to keep prices low

Prices show little profit

Most employees are part time

Office hours and costs are closely managed

#### **Mobile Vision Screening Unit**

Mission is to provide ophthalmological exams on reservations and underserved rural areas of Arizona Missions accomplished with exams furnished by volunteer Arizona Ophthalmological Society members

Trailer and equipment donated to Lions in 2004 by Oddfellows and Rebecca's of Arizona

Trailer unit is mid-70's vintage – now in poor condition

Fund raising now underway for replacement unit – Approximately \$300K cost for 2 lanes (Grant submitted LCIF)

Tractor replaced by donation from Arizona Ophthalmological Society in 2013 (\$50K)

#### KidSight Arizona preschool vision screening – Spot devices

KidSight Arizona Vision Screening

Part of LCI national program

Utilizes current state-of-the-art screening devices like Spot

Vision Center has eight Spot machines funded by grant from Humana

Primary emphasis on preschoolers

Six anomalies can be detected

Some eye issues very difficult to correct after five or six years of age

3,400 licensed preschools in Arizona

Lions are SCREENING - not diagnosing
