UPDATE ON MELVIN JONES LIONS INTERNATIONAL MEMORIAL

On behalf of the MJLIM we thank all those who have donated funds to the memorial. I know some you hear this repeatedly but we are lacking funds to maintain the memorial. I also keep hearing that we do not do anything for the community. The board of director's primary job is to preserve the area where our founder Melvin Jones was born in Fort Thomas.

The following is a letter to the State Convention (Year Unknown) by the Safford Lions Club:

It has been suggested and pushed by the Lions of Arizona to have a memorial of some sort for our founder, Melvin T. Jones, West of Safford in Graham County. A tentative plan and artist's connection of a Memorial for Melvin T. Jones will be presented at the Cabinet meeting Thursday evening April 14, in Mesa during the State Convention. Melvin T. Jones wants this memorial in the valley where he was born—since the Safford Lions Club is the closest Club to the birth place, we are accepting the responsibility of getting the ball rolling at the State Convention in Mesa, April 14, 15, 16. Any suggestions that your club might have can be presented at that time.


We have a picture of Melvin Jones standing at the location of the memorial in 1955 stating this was the place he was born. He visited Graham County several times in connection with the proposed Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial.

There are other articles in the museum which state that Melvin wanted the memorial in Fort Thomas, so please read them when you visit the memorial.

Below is what the State of Arizona wrote on the historical marker placed below the Spire.

If possible, let us understand that this is the location of the memorial and that we need to preserve the birth place of our founder.

On June 7, 2017 the MJLIM had the honor to fly the official Lions Flag in honor of PIP Joe Wroblewski, which was sent back to LCI for the presentation to PIP Joe Preston in honor of LCI's 100th Birthday.

BUCKEYE LIONS CLUB VISION SCREENING

A multitude of thanks to 21-A DG Phil Whitaker, Dave & Ann Roberts, Gary & Cheryl Seat, and David & Karen Pryce for assisting us, and especially to John Lozano and Jim Cox who assisted all 3 days. In all, we screened 428 high school students (and some parents & younger siblings) in all three Buckeye Union High School District schools. 42 were referred for follow-up examinations.

As this was the first attempt at screening high school students during their registration process instead of taking them out of class, some bumps along the way were expected. Uncooperation, however, was not. That issue will be addressed with the appropriate person at a later date.

Students are in class for 180 days, and English is the only mandatory class each must take. As such, when testing hearing, vision, or other things required for all students, the English classes are used to catching all of the students. In discussing this with the new assistant principal (promoted from English

teacher) at one of the high schools, he said my estimation of students missing 12-15 classes a year was low. Some students, he said, have to miss additional classes for additional testing. When you combine those missed classes with 5 to 10 other absences, students miss 15% of English class time. Anyone wonder why reading and comprehension scores are down?

Overall, the feedback received was excellent, as almost all expressed gratitude for Lions providing this service to the students. This process is very viable and will become the preferred method for vision screening of high school students. We feel this was more successful than we thought it would be, thanks in great part to the volunteers from the other clubs and the willingness of most school officials to help. We would be remiss if we didn't give a special thanks to Youngker High School's new principal Rob Roberson and new Asst. Principal Joe Kenney, for it was a wonderful experience working with them.

As this was a great first attempt at this, it

is worth sharing. We will write up this process in a proposal to submit to the National School Boards Association so that we can present this during their National Conference in April 2018 in San Antonio, Texas. Our hope is that the school districts around the nation will reach out to their local clubs for vision screening services.

We also did screenings at the back-to-school backpack event on July 22 for Buckeye Elementary School District. We screened 125 people and referred 24. We screened a 3-year old boy whose results were so bad, I did it a second time to be sure. When I told his mother, she and the 9-year old sister looked at each other and said at the same time, "That must be why he is always running into things!" The mother said that he hadn't ever said he couldn't see. I explained to her that he did not know anything was wrong, as that is how he always has seen things. So to him, that was normal.

All told between July 21 & July 25, we screened 553 individuals and referred 66.

ORIENTATION - IS IT WORTH THE EFFORT?

"This is my second Lions Club meeting. At my first meeting they said the Governor was coming to this meeting – I was IMPRESSED! I sure was wrong. This is some Lion Governor and I haven't the slightest idea what he's the governor of!"

Let's start by saying that the person who brings in the new member doesn't have

to be the one doing the basic orientation. Someone on the Membership Committee or even the Club President might be the right person for your club. Pick a time for orientation away from the regular meeting. Try and make it soon after the new member joins. Some clubs have orientation before the new member is sworn in as a Lion (not a bad idea).

Lions Clubs International (LCI) has a program where you can fill in the blanks with your club name, officers, events, etc. You can add pictures to make it more interesting. If

you contact me, I will send you an addition to this program with our state projects on it. I will also send you a hand-out sheet with basic Lion facts and the State Projects on it (LionAnnR@aol.com).

If your club is good enough to get new members, make sure you are good enough to keep them!

VISION SCREENING TRAINING IN SOUTHERN 21-B

Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation of Arizona sponsored a State Vision Screening Certification class for Lions of Southern 21-B and their clients. We received the support of Tucson Unified and Sunnyside Unified for the materials and classroom, with Kim Fenderson, RN, from TUSD teaching the class. This is an example of the benefits of partnering between Lions Clubs and our client school districts to serve our children. 17 Lions from Casa Grande, Catalina Oro Valley, North Tucson, South Tucson, Safford and Sierra

Vista as well as 7 staff members from client schools attended the training. This 6 hour class, including a written exam, is required to become a State Certified Vision Screener to screen in Arizona Schools. Additionally we provided hands-on training with the Plusoptix and SPOT vision screening devices. Lions Sight and Hearing is working with the Catalina Oro Valley Lions and the Sierra Vista Lions to vision screen in their local schools. HOW CAN LIONS SERVE A SCHOOL DISTRICT THAT COVERS 1/3 OF ARIZONA?

The Tucson Catholic Diocese School District, with 26 schools and 7,000 students, stretches from Yuma in the West to Douglas in the East, and from Nogales in the South to San Carlos in the North. How can a Lions Club vision screen this district? The South Tucson Lions tackled this challenge, and the answer is to work together as a team with other Lions Clubs.

The first thing to do was to develop a plan and gain the approval of management of the Diocese and the Lions. This involved defining specific procedures and determining workable solutions with limited resources. Next we researched ways to ensure that all children would receive exams and glasses, if needed, and if the parents could not afford them. This involved making VSP vouchers available for some children and committing to pay for exams and glasses for others, as necessary, on a best efforts basis. Our use of the NASN/VSP program and a debit card to pay for exams and glasses ensured that we could do this at a low cost throughout the State. We then contacted local Lions Clubs near outlying schools to see if they could vision

screen the school. Casa Grande, Nogales and Sierra Vista accepted this challenge. In areas where local Lions could not do this, they were invited to participate as the host club. Next, we offered a vision screening State Certification class for school personnel to ensure that they could carry on after we leave. Lastly, we established Fall screening dates for 24 of the schools that requested us to screen them, where we will screen all of the children in each school. At the end we will provide a specific statistical analysis of our results to discuss with the District Health personnel, and adjust our program as necessary. Then, we will do it again next year.

SIERRA VISTA LIONS KICK OFF VISION SCREENING AT FORT HUACHUCA

July 17th was the back to school event for the schools at Fort Huachuca. Children from Colonel Johnson K-2, General Myer 3-5 and Colonel Smith 6-8 showed up to kick off the new school year and be vision screened by the Sierra Vista Lions Club. The administrators and school nurses were able to see the Lions Vision program and understand the value of using Lions for their vision screening requirements. I think I gave out all 150 “district governor” pins that I’d taken to the event.

Lion Laura Wonderly discussed the plan to create a “Club Service Expo” as a way for Lions to “toot our own horn!” This public event will coincide with our District Convention in March 2018, and highlight what each club is doing to “serve” its local community. The public Expo will allow the public to discover the scope of how Lions engage and share the “We Serve” message locally. More details next month.

The evening before the Kickoff, we reinstated the Presidents’ Advisory Council and had a successful dinner event whereby district leaders – from cabinet to club – had a chance to

establish priorities, redefine our local mission to serve, and focus our attention on collectively solving our challenges.

At least 15 Club Presidents attended, plus all levels of district leadership, from zone chairs to PIP Joe Preston, as our special guest.

What impressed me most about the event was the commitment of all to work together cooperatively as we embrace all the new changes on our horizon – which includes the new LCI Forward initiatives, the five focus areas of service, the new organizational changes at the club and district levels, the redistricting initiative, and the engagement of youth into our ranks.


Yes, I mentioned five service ‘focus’ areas – the added being Diabetes.

LCIF Grant for Diabetes projects...

District 21-C was awarded an LCIF grant to initiate a series of pilot projects for diabetes awareness, the fifth focus area for Lions globally for the new year.

Specifically, these projects involve developing and implementing a series of support group programs throughout the district. Local club members working in cooperation with the American Diabetes Association, Arizona-New Mexico chapter will be conducting this pilot program of information, education and mentoring with teens and adults who have contracted this disease (either Type 1 or Type 2).

This grant initiative is especially significant to Lion Karen and me because our 26-year-old son Jeff suddenly developed Type-1 Diabetes late last year. We were collectively and suddenly in a daze trying to cope... how did this happen, how does one deal with the disease and change one’s lifestyle to manage it, where

to get information, support, and counseling -- the entire gamut. A support group pilot project might have helped our son (and us) to better understand this overwhelming change. That’s why our commitment is to make the service project available to every club in the district... and have all 45 participate in the grant.

Final thoughts...

We live in a technology-dominated society, but some of us are technologically challenged and have not fully embraced its opportunities. That’s why I’m personally committed to helping every Lion in the district to “make our net work” – i.e., our network of service, our network of communications, and our net-based tools for working together cooperatively.

Delivering the Lions program to our communities is not a one-man-band approach. We need to work together as team players... all-the-while doing something we want to do. The district could utilize your knowledge, skill and attitude by being a part of one of the many project committees already instituted in Lions.

I’m not in the business of appointing people to be a committee-of-one. That doesn’t build anything, regardless the credentials of individuals nor the promises to recruit others.
