CLUB SECRETARIES

MMR's: This year, just like last year, the membership reports will be filed on the first day of the month with "no change." Please put this on your calendar like a doctor's appointment – any changes can be done as they occur during the month. This way if you go on vacation or called out of town on an emergency of whatever comes up - like Mylci being down or overloaded at the end of the month - it is done and we have practiced good club management.

MAR's: OK, the centennial is right around the corner and this year our district will shine in reporting our service activities. Please report your service WEEKLY - because we tend to FORGET what we did yesterday – it is so important do report accurately. Unless you have a great written way to gather the activities your club members do – please report your activities weekly so you don't forget. This is a good way to grab that new member you just brought in and get them familiar with your club activities and help you, the club secretary, get your reporting done promptly and accurately. Remember, we are Lions 24/7 and that means anything that you do for anyone is reportable service. If you take your elderly neighbor to pick up their prescriptions - that is service; if you take your friend grocery shopping - that is service; if

you serve meals to shut-ins – that is service and reportable as a Lion.

MAR's year end for 2015-2016 – please make sure that you have input all of last year's activities by July 15th – that is the year-end reporting date to do so. So if you are a continuing secretary from last year – please make sure all activities have been reported. If you are a new secretary, please ask last year's secretary if all activities have been reported.

Let's meet our International President for 2016-2017

CHANCELLOR BOB CORLEW, INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



Chancellor Bob Corlew, from Milton, Tennessee, USA, was elected to serve as president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 99th International Convention held in Fukuoka, Japan, June 24 through 28, 2016.

President Corlew is retired as chancellor for the State of Tennessee and a professor of law.



A member of the Murfreesboro Noon Lions Club since 1978, he has held many offices within the association, including charter club president, zone chairperson, district governor, cabinet secretary and council chairperson. He has been instrumental in the chartering of a number of new clubs. Most recently, he worked to charter a new club comprised of lawyers and judges, which gained more than 75 members during its first year.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards, including the Leadership Award, the Builder Key Award, three International President's Awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is also a Vanguard of the Melvin Jones Memorial, a Progressive Lindsey-Jennings Fellow and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lions activities, President Corlew has been active in the Boy Scouts of America, the Jaycees and the American Red Cross. He has also served as a councilman in Milton and was a Major in the U.S. Army Reserve.

President Corlew and his wife, Dianne, also a Lion and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have five children and five grandchildren.
