### So What's your project? 21-B Centennial Chairperson – Steve Ravenkamp

Two years ago LCI launched the Centennial Challenge for Lions Clubs to perform 100 million acts of service by our Centennial Celebration in June 2018. Lions worldwide stepped up and have already met that challenge. The challenge has been revised. Our goal is now to perform 200 million acts of service by June 2018.

District 21B is a large part of that challenge. So far this year, 33 of the district 43 clubs have reported 519 acts of service serving 109,091 people through 11,350 Lion hours.

There is another part of the Centennial Celebration where we are not doing so well and that is identifying and completing Legacy Projects. Legacy Projects serve as a reminder of just how important your club is to the community. While none of us became Lions for recognition, it is important to continue to bring in new members who want to SERVE. Legacy Projects are visible gifts to our communities that can entice others to join our service efforts. Each Lion member serves an average of 50 people per year, so the more members we have the more people we can serve.

There are three levels of Legacy Projects, so there are opportunities for all clubs to get involved:

- Level 1 projects are designed to Raise Community Visibility. These include projects such as:
  - Posting new Lions signs
  - Donating a park bench with a Lions plaque on it
  - o Dedicating a statue
  - Sponsoring a fountain in a local park

Level 2 projects provide a Community Gift.

- Refurbish a park or playground
- Build a footbridge over a busy road
- Fund resources for the visually impaired
- Donate a vehicle to a community organization
- Level 3 projects Make a Community Impact.
  - o Build a clinic
  - Expand a library or school
  - Develop a training center
  - Equip an area hospital

To date only one club, Gold Canyon, has completed a Legacy Project. I encourage every club to identify, plan and execute at least one project to leave a legacy on your community. When you complete your project - showcase it. Have a dedication ceremony or ribbon-cutting and invite your community and local media. Share your project through photos on social media. Share your project on the LCI Facebook page by using the hashtag #Lions100. Send out a press release or ask a local reporter to help tell your story. Finally, REPORT YOUR LEGACY PROJECT using the MyLCI Service Activity Report under the Community and Culture activity type.

We have a tendency to recruit only those we know. We need to make an effort to expand our recruiting base. Legacy Projects are one way to do that. Remember, MORE HANDS MAKES MORE SERVICE. 2

# Lions' new flea market about ready

For you, Flea Market fans - there's good news! The La Salida Del Sol Lions Club of Sierra Vista is back in business with a new, much larger Flea Market out east on Highway 90 a mile and a half from Buena High - just past Young Block Company.

Over lunch last Wednesday, Dale Lopshire, chairman of the Flea Market committee, and Dave Schlesinger, secretary of the "Breakfast Club," filled me in on the latest developments.

The La Salida Del Sol Lions have been sponsoring a Flea Market in Sierra Vista for the past 10 years. They started on a small parcel of land on Fry Boulevard, moved a time or two as more space was required, and for the past six or seven years were located on the corner of Charleston Road and highway 90.

They lost that space in March when the ground was cleared to make way for the Wal-Mart Shopping Plaza. In the interim, the club has been without a Flea Market operation and it's taken time to obtain a lease for 10 acres of state owned land out alongside highway 90.

(There are five Lions Clubs in the Greater Sierra Vista Area. The La Salida Del Sol Lions meet for breakfast; the High Desert Lions enjoy luncheon meetings; the Sierra Vista Lions Club, Coronado Lions and Huachuca City Lions meet evenings. It's the La Salida Del Sol Lions, however, who sponsor and manage the Flea Market — the only Lions Club in this vicinity to conduct such activity. Each Lions Club has its own separate fundraising projects - Bingo, etc.)

The new location will be totally fenced in with a "range fence" around the entire property, a drive-through gate and a pedestrian entrance. The Flea Market will feature 112 spaces for vendors, a 320-foot driveway for automobiles and vehicles to keep traffic from congesting on the highway,

parking spaces for shoppers and a center aisle between vendor spaces to allow more room for customers to move about.

The Lions plan to open the new Flea Market the weekend of Jan. 7 and 8gates open to vendors at 6:30 a.m. Saturdays and Sundays — open to the public from 8 a.m. 'til 3 p.m. each day. Large dumpers will be provided for disposal of waste and Porta Pot portable toilets will be conveniently located on the site.

Members of the Lions Club will be manning the gate — as in the past and the charge for vendors is \$5 per day for a 20-by-30-foot space. Vendors may sell from their trucks, tables or display units - whatever they have.

One vehicle allowed per space. Of course Dale and Dave reminded me to tell one and all that the vendors are responsible to abide by all local, state and federal laws. Also, the fact that food inspectors from the Health Department and plainclothes law enforcement officers will make routine rounds of the Flea Market to make sure stolen goods are not being offered and that food-dispensing units meet health standards and regulations.

The land being leased to the Lions for the Flea Market has been acquired under a special land use permit and the payment for the lease of land goes to the State Public School Fund.

In the past — when the Flea Market was located along Charleston Road -

2,500 adult customers made up a good day. Of course, with more than three times as much space at the new location, the Lions expect to do considerably more business. Just what has that meant to the local

community? Ninety percent of what the Lions take in goes to charity and health-related worthy causes; hearing aids, cataract operations, eye examinations, eye glasses for youngsters, health fairs, wheelchairs and wheelchair repair, plus donations to the drug abuse program, the Crisis **Center and Cochise County Children's** Center, Boy Scouts and scholarships to Cochise College. A hotline telephone — 458-1236 — is in operation around the clock for health-related emergencies.

In the past the Lions have bought xray equipment for Sierra Vista Community Hospital, donated to the Palominas-Arispe, Mexico, goodwill field trips, the Lions of Arizona Crippled Children's Camp, Arizona Lions Eyebank Inc., Lions Foundation of Arizona and of course, all of the Lions Clubs contribute to the very worthwhile Lions Club International Foundation.

As the new Flea Market location takes root and shapes up, the Lions plan on building a picnic area where people can eat in comfort and perhaps a fenced-in playground area for children.

Good news for those who have stuffthat's too good to throw away but for which they have no use, plus other vendors and for the public at large that enjoys shopping at flea markets. Most of all, the La Salida Del Sol Lions are extremely happy to have the new flea market operation so they can continue to give to worthy charities and support their valuable programs that help those in need.

Congratulations "Breakfast Club" Lions! Here's hoping business will be booming!
